#### Louisiana nondiscrimination order declared unconstitutional

Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards' executive order protecting state LGBT employees has been declared unconstitutional by State District Judge Todd Hernandez

Hernandez ruled Edwards' order created or expanded state law, something only the legislature can do

The state's Republican attorney general filed the lawsuit challenging the Democratic governor's order. Edwards plans to appeal.

While Edwards' order included a non-discrimination provision for contractors, it contained an exception for religious organizations contracting with the state

Hernandez bought the argument that Edwards' executive order tried to create new protected classes of people that don't exist under current state or federal law. In his decision, he called it, "an unlawful usurp of the constitutional authority vested only in the legislative branch of government."

#### Cherokee Nation legalizes same-sex marriage

OKLAHOMA CITY — The Cherokee Nation's attorney general legalized gay marriage for the country's second-largest Native American tribe, saying its same-sex marriage ban violates a tribal requirement for all of its citizens to be treated equally.

Attorney General Todd Hembree's opinion, which was issued Dec. 9, says parts of a 2004 tribal law that defined marriage as "a civil contract between one man and one woman" and prohibited marriage between two persons of the same sex violate the Cherokee Constitution, which requires the equal treatment of tribal citizens.

"The right to marry without the freedom to marry the person of one's choice is no right at all," Hembree wrote in his opinion.

Tribal Assistant Attorney General Chrissi Nimmo said Monday, Dec. 12, that the opinion carries the

force of law and legalizes same-sex marriage and adoption by same-sex couples who are members of the Oklahoma-based tribe, which has about 300,000 members.

The Cherokee Nation was among 11 of the nation's 567 federally recognized tribes that had explicit bans on same-sex marriage.

## LGBT Texan of the Year

Resource Center CEO Cece Cox took her agency to new heights in 2016, but family, friends and coworkers praise her dedication to family as much as to community

This has been a banner year for Resource Center. And CEO Cece Cox is the one who has been waving that banner all along, leading the way in creating an agency continually striving to find new and better ways to meet needs in every segment of the North Texas LGBT community.

And so, in recognition not only of her six years as head of Resource Center but also her more than 30 years as an advocate for LGBT equality, Dallas Voice has chosen Cece Cox as our 2017 LGBT Texan of the Year.

Resource Center — first incorporated as the Foundation for Human Understanding in 1983 — officially opened its new \$8.7 million LGBT Community Center at 5750 Cedar Springs Road a in May. Less than a month later, that new center was the site of an emotional gathering of hundreds of people mourning the massacre at Pulse nightclub in Orlando.

Resource Center continued operating its Nelson-Tebedo Clinic, 4012 Cedar Springs Road, as usual, while moving its food pantry to the former headquarters at 2701 Reagan at the same time the Reagan Street facilities were being remodeled. The remodeled — and renamed — Simmons Health Campus facilities were rededicated in mid November.

Dallas Voice spoke to Cox earlier this week about Resource Center's milestones this year, under the guise of writing a year-end wrap-up on local LGBT and HIV/AIDS agencies. In that interview, Cox said that since she first took over as CEO, the task of building a new facility was what she feared most, and what most compelled her.

Her goal, she said, has always been for Resource Center to better serve the community, and with the opening of the new center in May, "we fulfilled our promise to do that."

Cox described the new community center as a dynamic piece of architecture with "movement" and "an interesting visual. Six months after it opened, she said, she still gets excited to see people using the building.

Cox said the young LGBT people she has talked to tell her they are happy to have a place to come, and she said the building's large expanse of glass does exactly what she had hope — project an image of an open and welcoming home. "We are,"



she said, "inspiring. We're a beacon."

Cox said she is also happy with how the remodel at the Health Campus — which houses the food pantry, the hot meals program, the insurance program and an expanded counseling program — has turned out. "We transformed [the facility] while honoring its past," she said.

Cox said she is grateful for the support that allowed her to lead the effort to build the new facility, renovate the older buildings and thus provide the space and opportunities the community needs. But her friends, family and coworkers said this week it's Cox's leadership, spirit and dedication that make them grateful as this year comes to an end.

"I've known Cece since the 1990s, when she was president of [Dallas Gay and Lesbian Alliance] and I was working in radio," said Rafael McDonnell, communications and advocacy manager for Resource Center for the last eight years. He said that the construction of the new community center and renovation of the Health Campus "is the fulfillment of a dream we've had, as a community and as a center, for so many years. It's taken a lot of work to get here. It's been a long journey, and Cece is the captain of our ship."

McDonnell credited Cox with having the stamina and the dedication to not only see the center through this massive construction phase, but to "at the same time remain engaged with the community." He pointed to her role in the vigil for the Orlando victims and her meeting with Dallas Police Chief David Brown to express the community's concerns when the Rev. Robert Jeffress, anti-gay pastor of First Baptist Church of Dallas, announced his church would be "counseling" police officers.

She has also maintained her position and duties as co-chair of the board of CenterLink, a national network of LGBT community centers. As the CenterLink board co-chair, Cox is "the face and the voice of the LGBT community of Dallas, and she is always very much aware that she represents us to the rest of the country that way," McDonnell said

And here at home, he added, "she is our vision person, helping us set our standards and our goals, and helping us reach them. Cece is our champion, and she is our cheerleader."

Linda Moore, an attorney who served on the Resource Center board for more than 15 years, said she still gets an incredible thrill each time she drives by the new Community Center. And it was Cox, she said, that pulled together the capital campaign that made it possible, by reaching out to "a broader footprint of people" than anyone else could have done.

"Cece has the ability to inform and educate people about all the things Resource Center does," Moore said, adding that she was glad Cox chose to keep the Reagan Street property and renovate

it, rather than selling it. She said that the building there is "iconic," and that "I hope it continues to be a special place for the people who use those services."

Moore also had high praise for Cox's work as an activist as well as an administrator. "She's been an advocate at a lot of critical times" for the LGBT community, Moore said of Cox. "She's never been afraid to say when something's not right. She's not afraid to talk to any audience."

A prime example, Moore said, was when Cox began hearing that even though the Dallas Independent School District had a comprehensive antibullying policy in place, some DISD officials were telling principals not to enforce the policy. Cox went before the school board members, quickly convincing them of the necessity of enforcing the policy already in place.

David Chard is now president of Wheelock College in Boston. But he met Cox when he was dean of the Simmons School of Education at her alma mater, Southern Methodist University, before she took over as CEO at Resource Center.

Chard, who is openly gay, said he and his department at SMU wanted to do something that would benefit the school and the LGBT community, and "we thought of mental health support." Cox stepped forward to help make that happen.

Chard said the program wouldn't have happened at all without Cox's help. "Her credibility at SMU was well ahead of me," he said. "The university didn't ask any questions. I'm not sure I could have done it without Cece."

Through that program, SMU began offering counseling internships at Resource Center, and Chard brought Cox onto the Simmons advisory board. While most advisory board members are major donors, most aren't what Chard calls "doers." But Cox was a doer, he said.

"Her contributions there have been enormous," he said. "She really gives substantive advice.

"Nonprofit leadership is really a tough job," Chard continued. "It doesn't always attract savvy people like Cece. I've worked with many, but she's at the top." he agreed that while the opening of the new community center was a transformative milestone for Resource Center, he said Cox's leadership through the years has benefited not just the LGBT community, but Dallas as a whole.

Cameron Hernhold has been the Resource Center's director of development for three years and seven months. Shortly after she took the job, the agency redefined its goals for the new community center project, setting new goals for the capital campaign intended to fund it.

"When you work in development, you know you'll either have a fundraising CEO or executive director, or you have someone who focuses on other aspects of the job. When you've got a fundraising CEO, it makes projects like our capital campaign easier," Hernholm said. "With Cece Cox, I got both. I can tell you, Cece is responsible

for the success of this capital campaign. In 2013, the board decided to allow her to focus on fundraising, and that's what made us able to do it."

Hernholm said Cox is not just a boss, "she's also a mentor. She is so strong, and so inspiring. Her success leads to success for this agency. She's a real door opener, for Resource Center clients and for her staff, too. She's just a rockstar."

But Cox is also "a whole lot of fun," Hernholm said. "She's just a total joy to work for and work

It's a sentiment that McDonnell echoed, saying that he thinks of Cox not just as an outstanding boss, but as an outstanding friend, too. He recalled the day of the massacre at Pulse, saying that in the midst of planning for the vigil happening that same evening, it was Cox who reminded him "that we're still human, and that our reactions are human. She's the one who reminded me to stop, take a breath and have that human moment, then get back to work. She helped me get centered into what we had to do that day."

McDonnell said that Cox was there for him as a friend when he lost his mother and, just this month, we he lost his friend and fellow activist, David Mack Henderson. He was at work when he got the news of Henderson's death, McDonnell said. "I called Cece and told her, and she said, 'I'll



## **Promise House** opening LGBT facility

New group home in Oak Cliff will supplement other services offered to LGBT and other youth

Promise House, the Oak Cliff agency that houses homeless teens, will soon be opening a house for 18-to-21-year-old LGBT youth. Promise House CEO Ashley Lind doesn't yet have a specific opening date, but she said the new house should open sometime over the next month.

While few youth-oriented shelters offer a program like this anywhere in the country, Promise House staff members did visit similar facilities in California to make sure the Dallas agency is providing the programs needed for new LGBT house to be successful.

Nationally, about 40 percent of homeless teens are LGBT. Lind said her agency's internal survey showed only about 10 to 12 percent of Promise House residents fall into the category. Working on the assumption that Dallas isn't taking dramatically better care of its LGBT youth than other cities are, the agency chose to take responsibility for that number being so low.

"That led us to believe either our kids are not comfortable in self-identifying upon entry or our services are not conducive to their immediate needs," Lind explained.

Promise House recently received a grant that will allow the agency to set up the new group home for LGBT young adults, allowing the youth to live there and receive services for up to two

"That age was chosen because we can intervene in a way that allows them to be independent and self-sufficient adults," Lind said. Child Protective Services is often involved in cases with younger

Programs will help the LGBT youth access community resources, find employment and get an apartment. Through counseling, they'll work through prejudice they've encountered and other problems they face.

The grant is for a demonstration project, because there are very few programs like this anywhere in the country, Lind said. The house will be staffed with people with an understanding of the issues LGBT youth face. Counselors will be available for weekly sessions as well as foe crisis intervention. Mentors who have had similar experiences growing up LGBT will be there for the residents to look to for advice and as role models.

Staff members are connecting to medical resources to help youth through situations specific them from HIV prevention or treatment to transitioning for transgender teens, and collaborating with other organizations to offer referrals to other community resources.

"We'll let them make the decision what they'd like to participate in to fulfill their needs," Lind

In addition, residents of the new LGBT house can take advantage of other Promise House pro-

Education is an important piece for all Promise House residents. If the LGBT residents don't have their high school diplomas, they can either finish in a local DISD school, the Dallas Can Academy, which is just a few blocks away, or get a GED. Then many Promise House residents continue on to college.

Promise House not only works to help its residents earn scholarships, the agency also has a scholarship program of its own to help the youth continue their education.

## 6 months later

49 killed at Pulse remembered in memorials in Orlando

ORLANDO, Fla. — Relatives, friends and survivors of the June 12 Orlando nightclub massacre stood outside Pulse where candles were lit behind stars with the names of each of the 49 patrons killed, as they remembered the six-month mark Monday, Dec. 12, of the worst mass shooting in modern U.S. history.

They hugged one another outside the shuttered gay club, and at 2:02 a.m., the exact time gunman Omar Mateen started shooting inside, a moment of silence was held. Then they read the names of each of the deceased patrons.

Many wore black and others wore rainbow-colored "Orlando United" T-shirts and ball caps.

More than 50 other patrons were seriously injured during the Pride month massacre.

"Time really does fly," said Orlando Torres, who hid in a bathroom when the shooting started. "It was very somber and very touching."

Torres spoke to reporters after the early morning remembrance, which was closed to the public and media.

"This morning was very emotional. To the beautiful 49 we will never forget and continue to keep your pulse," the official Pulse Twitter account read Monday.

Two other services were held in Orlando for the Pulse victims later in the day. Across the metro area, some buildings were lit up in the rainbow colors of gay Pride.

The gates around Pulse were opened in the evening, again, this time for a public remembrance. Another service was held in the evening

at the Orange County Regional History Center.

After the service, the history center opened an exhibit of digital photos showing Orlando's response to the mass shooting. Tens of thousands of central Florida residents attended memorial services for the Pulse victims in the days after the massacre. They held candlelight vigils and lined up to donate blood. Rainbow flags were hung all over the metro area in support of the gay community.

Also Monday, the city of Orlando launched a program that allows businesses to designate themselves as safe places for gays and lesbians if they feel threatened. Orlando police officers began distributing decals to local businesses to post in their windows identifying them as places members of the LGBTQ community can go if they feel they are in jeopardy.

Mateen was killed in a shootout with SWAT team members after a three-hour standoff. The FBI is still investigating the massacre.

The future of the nightclub is still up in the air. Pulse's owner last week said she is no longer interested selling the property to the city of Orlando which had planned to use it for a memorial.

Owner Barbara Poma says she plans to use the space to create a "sanctuary of hope" and a welcoming area where people can reflect on those affected by the tragedy.

At the history center service Monday, Poma said efforts for a memorial will begin soon, after the holiday season. She said it was essential that what happened at Pulse is never forgotten.

"Where do we go from here? We only have one way to go, and that's forward," Poma said. "We must find a way to defeat evil and find a way that, for generations to come, no one will forget what happened here."

One of Promise House's main goals for its residents, including those in the new LGBT house, is to help find an apartment on their own, once they're old enough. Staff members help the youth look for an apartment they can afford in a neighborhood that's safe.

Although a young adult may be able to afford the monthly rent, their earnings might not be enough to cover things like a security deposit and utility deposits. So to help them move in, Promise House will help with those costs, even subsidizing their rent for a few months and give them some furniture to help them get going.

A specialized program targeting one community is nothing new for Promise House. The agency opened in the 1980s with one house that held 10 residents, and now that building is used for pregnant teens and new moms with their babies. Teens can live there for up to two years. At that point, Promise House helps the young moms move into their own apartments.

Lind said often CPS and law enforcement are involved in cases where the boyfriend of the teen's

mother or a stepbrother is the father of the teen's child. When the pregnant teen is thrown out of her house, often with a mother blaming the daughter, Promise House intervenes and helps the teen through the pregnancy and, if she's keeping the child, the first couple of years of motherhood.

In addition to that original building, Promise House now has another house and has built more housing plus classroom, counseling facilities, offices and space for other programs on adjacent property.

While some youth that come to Promise House were homeless and living on the streets, some of the youth were referred to the agency and others came to the Oak Cliff agency through CPS.

At one time, Promise House could help only 10 youth at a time. The number is now closer to 100. Although Lind doesn't know how many lives Promise House has touched over the years, she said about 500 young people currently are helped by one of the organization's programs every year.



## Bigger, better Pride

Dallas Pride committee announces plan to expand celebration to two days, with the Festival in the Park on Saturday, and the Pride parade on Sunday

The 2017 Dallas Pride festivities are expanding in 2017, with the Festival in the Park moving to Saturday while the Alan Ross Texas Freedom Parade stays at its traditional 2 p.m. time slot on the third Sunday in September.

Michael Doughman, executive director of the Dallas Tavern Guild, the organization that produces Dallas Pride, said there will be "a lot of new changes and additions to make the festival more inclusive and entertaining." He added that holding the festival and the parade on different days gives more people the chance to attend both events

"We feel these changes ... will enhance both experiences for our community and out-of-town guests," Doughman said. He noted that more new features are in the planning stages, and that the Pride committee will be announcing those new additions to Pride weekend in the months to come.

Doughman said that Tavern Guild and Pride Committee members have been made the decision to expand after examining other Pride events and talking with organizers of those events.

"The general consensus is that a two-day event is much more successful," he said. "That way people don't have to decide between going to the parade, or going to the festival."

Doughman said Tavern Guild and Pride committee members had hoped to make the change to two days of Pride this year. But the events of the year forced them to delay.

"We've been talking about it since we moved from Lee Park to Reverchon Park. We have the space now to really expand and improve the festival," he said. "We had wanted to do it this year. But then Orlando happened, and that kind of took over everything. All our attention this year had to be on safety and security."

Doughman said part of the plans to expand and improve the festival include incorporating the annual Teen Pride events as part of the Dallas Pride line-up, rather than it being something separate.

"It looked and felt like the teens were having to have their own thing because they weren't allowed to be part of [Dallas Pride]. We want everyone to be included," he explained. "We already have a safe space set aside for the Family Pride Zone for the little ones and families. Why don't we include Teen Pride the same way?

"So we are going to create a safe space within

the festival, a space away from alcohol and things like that, for Teen Pride to be there and be part of the festival."

Doughman also said that organizers will be focusing on turning the festival into "mainly a music festival. We'll be adding a second stage — there's more information on that to come — and we'll be adding more music, more entertainment throughout the festival grounds all day long. We will start lining up entertainment soon, and we'll be releasing all the details as they become available. People are going to be very excited when they start seeing all we have planned."

Doughman said the new two-day Pride schedule will help alleviate the age-old problem of traffic congestion, too. "That's always been a bone of contention with residents who live along the parade route," he said. "But now, with the length of the parade and where it will end, that won't be such an issue. There won't be any reason for people to file out into the streets and follow the parade to the park. They can stay on the Cedar Springs Strip and there in the neighborhood."

The parade, which had been turning down Cedar Springs and ending at Reverchon Park (and before that, Lee Park), will now end at the intersection of Cedar Springs Road and Turtle Creek Boulevard. Organizers will coordinate with the Lee Park and Arlington Hall Conservancy to allow parade floats to unload at that park, giving participants an easy walk back to the main drag to continue their celebration.

Doughman said the changes are also intended

to help offset the rising costs of producing Dallas Pride each year.

"Costs have escalated just so ridiculously in the last couple of years. We had to do something trim those costs, and we weren't going to be getting any leeway from the city" in terms of what permits were necessary to stage the events, and how much those permits cost, he said. "We had to find a way to make it all affordable, for us and for the people who attend, without damaging or negatively affecting the parade or the festival."

Doughman continued, "I know there are a lot of people out there who think we're getting rich off of Pride. But that's a huge misconception. It couldn't be further from the truth. And there are some who criticize us for taking corporate sponsorships and donations. But it costs a lot of

money to put these events on.

"There are so many costs people don't ever think of. There's the cost of the trash containers along the parade route and in the park, and the liners to go in those containers," he said. "And then there's the cost of cleaning up that amount of trash. And the cost of police security the city and Homeland Security require that we have. The average person has really no clue how much it all costs.

"Ours is one of the few Pride celebrations that has a beneficiary element. Most are able to generate just enough seed money to start working on the next event," Doughman said. "To be able to produce this event for the community, to pay our bills and still have money to give to our charities, we have to generate a lot of money for that. And there are things we want to do that we just think are the right things, socially, to do. Those things come with a price tag."

Doughman acknowledged that there will likely be some disadvantages. But, he said, "the losses are minor compared to the wins. There's nothing self-serving about the decisions we are making. We all work 10 months a year, and I am the only salaried employee. I'm not saying we aren't trying to raise more money. I just don't want people to misunderstand why we want to raise more money. Our books are open to anyone who wants to see them."

could cause some to question their support for the Dallas Pride committee. But he said the problems that had allowed the misappropriation to happen have been addressed, and Berryman has repaid all the money he took.

"David has been removed and has no access to anything to do with Pride any more," he said of Berryman. "We have a brand new CPA in charge of oversight on all the books and finances, and the committee membership will get a full budget report each month. And we've gone to a three part process for all purchases now."

He noted that Pride financial transactions are no longer handled through PayPal, "because we found out that was the portal through which the funds were shunted away. ... We've removed any opportunities for that kind of thing to happen again."

be right down.' She came to my office and we just held each other and cried.

"When you are an advocate, finding a balance between work and life can be hard to do," Mc-Donnell added. "Cece makes sure that the people here [at Resource Center] find that balance."

For Steve Atkinson, Cox's friendship has been as valuable as her leadership and her activism. He said they first became friends in the early 1990s when they worked together on some really big activist battles, including the effort to get the city of Dallas to pass an ordinance protecting employees from discrimination based on sexual orientation.

"I immediately saw that Cece was not only passionate about all the right causes, but that she was also brilliant and immensely talented," Atkinson said. "In all the years since then, she has been one of our community's most effective leaders and advocates. I am so proud she is one of my closest friends, and immensely proud of what she has done to advance equality for LGBT and to help those living with HIV and AIDS.

"Cece has been a stellar head of Resource Center," he continued. "During her tenure the center has grown, thrived and expanded its programs greatly, which means many more people are helped and served by its work. Cece is one of the most visible and respected leaders our community has ever had, and that is a wonderful thing for all of us."

Despite her commitment to her community and her job, Cox is also deeply committed to her family. She is, said her brother Martin Cox, "a devoted and dedicated mother who loves her son, Mateo, and who partners with Mateo's other parent, Lisa Means, to raise him well. She's a fun-loving person with a great sense of humor — a very fun aunt and sister."

Martin Cox said his sister "has the skill of being able to easily relate to and communicate with

many different kinds of people, while being unwaveringly clear about what she believes is right."

Her girlfriend, attorney Shelly Skeen agreed. "Cece is one of the kindest, gentlest, most passionate, unwavering, strong, resilient and persevering souls I have ever known," Skeen said. "I am truly grateful and blessed by how she shows up in the world each day, and that is equally true not just to those close to her, but for everyone she touches with her unending work in and for our community."

Skeen added, "Cece is truly a pioneer. Her courage to be out and open when others were not, her undying work for our community, her passion for the most basic of the qualities that make us human and her willingness to see the beauty in them and then fight for them ... has transcended and shaped at least two decades in the LGBT community, and has left us all better off than we were before."

While her family, friends and coworkers are happy to praise her accomplishments so far, Cox herself is already looking ahead to what comes next.

"I have a huge goal" already set, she said. But she's not quite ready to talk about what that goal is. Still, she has no problem talking about her priorities with and for Resource Center, including "expanding the counseling program. The youth program is coming alive, and so are senior programs."

Texas and the rest of the country are facing some major challenges in the days ahead, as the Trump administration begins its reign next month, and, Cox warned, "We must prepare for what we think will be coming our way, while not getting freaked out or panicked by it all."

And with Cece Cox there to keep carrying that banner high, the way forward may be just a little bit brighter, after all.

#### What is TRUVADA for PrEP (Pre-exposure Prophylaxis)?

TRUVADA is a prescription medicine that can be used for PrEP to help reduce the risk of getting HIV-1 infection when used together with safer sex practices. This use is only for adults who are at high risk of getting HIV-1 through sex. This includes HIV-negative men who have sex with men and who are at high risk of getting infected with HIV-1 through sex, and male-female sex partners when one partner has HIV-1 infection and the other does not.

Ask your healthcare provider if you have questions about how to prevent getting HIV-1. Always practice safer sex and use condoms to lower the chance of sexual contact with body fluids. Never reuse or share needles or other items that have body fluids on them.

#### IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

#### What is the most important information I should know about TRUVADA for PrEP?

#### Before taking TRUVADA for PrEP to reduce your risk of getting HIV-1 infection:

- ◆You must be HIV-negative. You must get tested to make sure that you do not already have HIV-1 infection. Do not take TRUVADA for PrEP to reduce the risk of getting HIV-1 unless you are confirmed to be HIV-negative.

Do not take TRUVADA for PrEP if you already have HIV-1 infection or if you do not know your HIV-1 status. If you are HIV-1 positive, you need to take other medicines with TRUVADA to treat HIV-1. TRUVADA by itself is not a complete treatment for HIV-1. If you have HIV-1 and take only TRUVADA, your HIV-1 may become harder to treat over time.



**Do not take TRUVADA for PrEP if you also take** lamivudine (Epivir-HBV) or adefovir (HEPSERA).

#### ■ What are the other possible side effects of TRUVADA for PrEP?

#### Serious side effects of TRUVADA may also include:

- Kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider may do blood tests to check your kidneys before and during treatment with TRUVADA for PrEP. If you develop kidney problems, your healthcare provider may tell you to stop taking TRUVADA for PrEP.
- Bone problems, including bone pain or bones getting soft or thin, may lead to fractures. Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your bones.
- Changes in body fat, which can happen in people taking TRUVADA or medicines like TRUVADA.

**Common side effects** in people taking TRUVADA for PrEP are stomach-area (abdomen) pain, headache, and decreased weight. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or do not go away.

#### What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking TRUVADA for PrEP?

- All your health problems. Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you have or have had any kidney, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis virus infection.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if TRUVADA can harm your unborn baby. If you become pregnant while taking TRUVADA for PrEP, talk to your healthcare provider to decide if you should keep taking TRUVADA for PrEP. *Pregnancy Registry:* A pregnancy registry collects information about your health and the health of your baby. There is a pregnancy registry for women who take medicines to prevent HIV-1 during pregnancy. For more information about the registry and how it works, talk to your healthcare provider.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed. The medicines in TRUVADA can pass to your baby in breast milk. If you become HIV-1 positive, HIV-1 can be passed to the baby in breast milk.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. TRUVADA may interact with other medicines. Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.
- If you take certain other medicines with TRUVADA for PrEP, your healthcare provider may need to check you more often or change your dose. These medicines include ledipasvir with sofosbuvir (HARVONI).

**Common side effects** in people taking TRUVADA for PrEP include stomach-area (abdomen) pain, headache, and decreased weight.

These are not all the possible side effects of TRUVADA. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any new symptoms while taking TRUVADA for PrEP.

Your healthcare provider will need to do tests to monitor your health before and during treatment with TRUVADA for PrEP.

#### BEFORE TAKING TRUVADA FOR PrEP

#### Tell your healthcare provider if you:

- · Have or have had any kidney, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis infection.
- · Have any other medical conditions.
- · Are pregnant or plan to become pregnant.
- Are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you become HIV-1 positive because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.

#### Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take:

- Keep a list that includes all prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements, and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist.
- Ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist about medicines that should not be taken with TRUVADA for PrEP.

#### HOW TO TAKE TRUVADA FOR PrEP

- Take 1 tablet once a day, every day, not just when you think you have been exposed to HIV-1.
- Do not miss any doses. Missing doses may increase your risk of getting HIV-1 infection.
- You must practice safer sex by using condoms and you must stay HIV-1 negative.

My co-worker, a lovely African-American woman, is often asked for on the phone or up front in the lobby as "the black woman." While technically that's accurate, she does actually have a name. And it would surely be a lot more polite to simply ask for her by name.

But too many of us are, frankly, too lazy to remember names. So instead we refer to people in ways that can be borderline offensive — though no offense is intended.

I get an occasional taste of that as well. Just this week, I was asked to come up front because a woman was there to see me. They said I'd know her as soon as I saw her.

I walked up front and — nope. I'd never seen

She looked at me and said, "That's not her. She used to work in the food pantry."

I then asked her if she was looking for the woman who worked in the food pantry, referring to that woman — who also happened to be transgender — by name. She perked up and said "Yes, her. Do you know where she went?'

I didn't, and we ended our conversation. I walked back to my desk knowing — not

Hell, I'd settle for "the tall girl." Except, where I work, they'd say, "Oh, you mean Cece Cox."

I did it again — something I've done too many times. Each time I do it, I instantly regret it. But then next year, I do it again.

I'm referring to stopping at the grocery store on the day before Thanksgiving. If that's not the busiest day of the year for grocery stores, it has to be right up there.

It was around 5 p.m., and there were no parking spots, no shopping carts available (I had to swipe one near a check stand) and getting through the aisles was like merging from I-35 onto Woodall

Rogers at 7:30 a.m. on a Monday. Good luck! I escaped with my life — vowing never to do that again, until next year.

for the first time — that they had called I was planning a trip to Atlanta to me to come see my kids and I needed a dogsitter. I called my friend Peter, who has done this for me in the past (as I for have him). He said he'd love to. but he's moving Cincinnati. That sucked

a dear friend and important person in my life.

Peter and I worked together at CBS Radio. I programmed Jack-FM and Peter was the program director at KLUV (maybe you've heard it it?) He and I became fast friends and would occasionally have lunch together.

Peter is a wonderful man, about my age, and we both spent most of our lives on the radio, so we could relate. He has a wicked sense of humor, exceeded only by his compassion and sense of humanity.

Peter is also an out Gay man.

Peter left CBS in the fall of 2012, but we kept in touch and would still have lunch occasionally. Keep in mind that in I was still deep in the closet about the whole transgender thing. I was still married and living in Flower Mound, about as far from the gayborhood as one could get — Denton County, for Pete's sake!

At that point, I didn't even know there was a gayborhood in Dallas.

We would usually eat at Lucky's, or Black Eye's Pea, Hunky's or Snookie's (a favorite of Peter's). When I came out to Peter, he — of course — was a rock for me and was thrilled for me.

When I was escorted from the CBS building in 2013, Peter was one of the first calls I made. He said, "We are going to drink! Meet me at the Round-Up at 6:30."

I had never heard of The Round-Up and didn't even know it was a gay bar. I figured it was a redneck country bar and thought it odd that a gay guy and a trans girl would meet at such a place. But I trusted him.

That day — April 11, 2013 — was the day I decided I would live my life 100 percent as my authentic self and never look back. Peter was holding court in the back bar with our bartender, Harold, who made me feel so special and so wel-

It was a night I will never forget.

It was Peter's kindness, acceptance and friendship that helped give me the confidence I take with me every day now. He is such a good friend and such an important person in my life. So when he texted me about having lunch on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving at JR.'s I had to accept.

We shared laughter and some really good burgers, but all too soon, I had to get back to work. I hugged him close and kissed his cheek and tried to tell him how important he is to me before the tears made it impossible to speak.

He told me, "This isn't goodbye."

I sure hope not. Friends like him, I can count on one hand.

## You got the right Band Victor Band the Draw Grant State of the Draw Grant Stat 'Drag Race' victor Bob the Drag Queen, on confidence,

n reality competition shows, viewers usually have to wait until the finale to know who won. But aficionados of RuPaul Drag Race had some clairvoyance during Season 8 — they knew who won by Episode 3: That's when Bob the Drag Queen owned the challenge — RuCo's Empire, a spoof of the nighttime soap — like no queen has ever done. We mean ever. You weren't watching just drag; you were experiencing an artist in full control of their medium. The remaining episodes were merely busy-work until the crown was awarded.

It wasn't like it was easy, either: Bob defeated viewer fave ChiChi DeVayne, bombshell Naomi Smalls and conceptual makeup master Kim Chi to take the title — not with better costumes, or smoother lip-sync, or great verisimilitude, but by the sheer force of talent. Bob had "star" written all over him. And he knew it.

"I always thought I would be around for the long haul," he admits. "I don't think I ever thought I was the best [drag queen] there, just that I was the 'most qualified' for the job at hand — in terms of what they are asking or, I think I rose to the occasion the best."

Confidence might be Bob the Drag Queen's secret weapon, but it wouldn't mean squat without the chops to follow through. "It's one of those things as an artist: You have to believe in yourself to expect people to pay to sit in a room a listen to you talk for an hour," he says. The wild card appearing on Drag Race was being apart from a support system. "You do think, 'What if I messed up on that one?'

because you don't have my network of people to bounce ideas off of. It was a little bit nerve-racking." (In fact, he didn't know he was in the Top 3 for sure until about a week before the episode aired — they film multiple ejections with each queen sashaying away.)

All of this excitement has happened just in the past year; since he was crowned, Bob has contin-

ued to expand his profile: He has released a video with Todrick Hall ("Wrong Bitch," with nearly 2 million views on YouTube) and toured, currently emceeing A Drag Queen Christmas, featuring fellow contestants Naomi, Thorgy

Thor, Milk and more. (It comes to Dallas' House of Blues on Wednesday.)

That's a great career arc for the 30-year-old, who only got into drag after watching the Season 1 of Drag Race.

"I was really inspired watching the first season — I thought Bebe Zahara Benet was beautiful and elegant and funny," he says. "But I was also influenced by non-drag performers like Whoopi Goldberg and Chris Rock and Carol Channing — more as a performer than a queen." Indeed, Bob sees the title of "drag queen" as the beginning of the conversation, not the end of it.

"Saying 'I'm a drag queen' doesn't really say what you do — it's like saying, 'I'm an entertainer.' There are visual artists and dancers and comedy queens and performance artists. Drag is just [starting the conversation] by blurring gen-

But Bob isn't simply using drag as a gimmick; he's committed to a long career in and out of stilettos.

"Without sounding corny, I really just wanna be Bob the Drag Oueen — to create something new and not imitate what someone else has already done," he says. "I don't have any intent of

quitting drag because I'm really good at it — it suits me and I have fun doing it. But I just did a show on HBO out of drag because acting is also a passion. Sketch comedy is [also] one of my loves, and my standup comedy [which, he concedes, has become more political since the election]. Making people laugh is one of my favorite things ever. And I really enjoy making music, which sort of surprised me."

Bob the Drag Queen might be the only one surprised — his fans have known he had it all in him, whatever he wanted to do. Stars are like that.

#### **HOLIDAY CD: 'A Pentatonix Christmas'**

If you were listening to pop music in the late '70s and early '80s — or are just a fan of the era — you probably recall a group called The Manhattan Transfer, most famous for their song "The Boy from New York City." Their sound was a blend of doo-wop and jazz, adult contemporary and a cappella vocal melding. No one else on the record scene was quite doing what they did then; they were followed by groups like Boyz II Men and Wilson Phillips (also known for their close harmonies and reliance on more vocals then backing tracks), but genuine humanonly music-making? Well, that died with the advent of Janet Jackson... or at least it went on life-support. You'd have to find a barbershop quartet for that kind of music.

But now we have Pentatonix, the Arlingtonbased quintet of vocal magicians, to scat and bebop their way through deeply-layered vocal arrangements on the road to creating a happy, sometimes ear-defying musical sound all their

Pentatonix's first commercial release was a 2012 EP of Christmas songs; they go full-bore on the holiday with their latest album, A Pentatonix Christmas, in which they revel in bringing up the holiday spirit in 11 tracks.

Despite the uniqueness of their sound, they start off with some fairly traditional selections. "O, Come All Ye Faithful" launches with a guttural back-beat that calls to mind a Caribbean flavor; that's followed by "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," which goes upbeat with a doubletime tempo and ends with a flourish that could come from a Russian folk dance. Deeper in, you get to relax not just in the harmonies, but in the strong vocal clarity of individual voices. "White Christmas" could have come off a World War II-era album from a crooner in a cardigan,




but there's something modern and refreshing about it as well — they aren't just rehashing Bing Crosby, they're trying to lay their own groundwork. By the time they get to "I'll Be Home for Christmas," the album begins to closely resemble the delightful Ally McBeal Xmas CD that came out nearly 20 years ago.

Not all the songs are straight-up carols. Track 8, a beautiful version of Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah," captures the song's darkness, but the title is the only knee-bend to anything in the sacred canon of a holiday carols. "Goodbye My Friend" refers to winter, but otherwise doesn't seem all that Christmas-y; "Feels So Good to Be Bad" stakes more of a claim to the season, but it's really just a chance for some fun and entertaining musical numbers

Some of the songs try too hard. "Up on the Housetop" aims for a hip-hop version of what Christmastime is, but does so with one of the most annoyingly trite of all secular carols. But this retro CD - part Carpenters, part familyaround-the-yule-log cornpone - really hits the right chords.

# Oh, boy!

Jake Papadakos took a leather title this summer, but it's the leather community that has given much back to him

t is called a collar," Jake Papadakos, 41, explains of the locked cable he wears looped around his neck. "Technically, it is not my collar. It is my Sir's collar. It is a symbol of ownership ... that my Sir owns me. Basically it allows other people, especially those who are in the [leather] community, to know that I am taken."

Papadakos is "taken" by fellow Dallas resident David "Tug" Whitehead, and together, they form a kind of North Texas leather power-couple: Whitehead was International LeatherSir 2015, and Papadakos earned his title, International Leatherboy 2016, over last Labor Day weekend. (The competition also includes a title for International Community Bootblack, a male or female who works on and cares for leather.) For the reigning Papadakos, he looks forward to fulfilling his title commitments in the coming months. He is also proud of his Sir's accomplishments over the last year. (Their one regret: Both didn't hold their international titles simultaneously.)

"I was bartending all the time, and he was travelling all the time," Papadakos recalls of Sir Tug's reign. "I rarely got to see him. I was extremely remiss that I didn't run for Leatherboy at the time to be by his side. After I won, about a week later, a friend said to me, 'You do realize that you and your Sir were International LeatherSir and International Leatherboy at the same time [on stage] for about three minutes?' [That put] a smile on my face."

Papadakos has been active in the leather community for a little more than four years. He won his first regional leather title three years ago as a bootblack. He advanced to an International Mr. Leather contest in Chicago, where he was second runner-up, competing against eight other bootblacks. More recently, Papadakos took the South Central Leatherboy regional title, a win that qualified him for the International Leatherboy competition last summer.

"I've always been interested in the [leather] scene," Papadakos says. "Without going into too much detail, it got to the point that it was the only kind of porn I could watch that gave me a rise. While I was living in Panama City, Fla., I heard about an event in St. Petersburg — the International Puppy Contest. I thought it sounded like fun. I got to see leather first hand, so to speak."

It was there Papadakos met Brenda Cothern, an author who writes BDSM novels — surprisingly, most featuring gay romance. The two became friends. Papadakos witnessed Cothern flogging someone over that weekend and desired to feel leather across his bare skin as well. Cothern agreed to flog

"I found it became very therapeutic," says Papadakos, who submitted to flogging more than once that weekend. "It was the cheapest therapy session you could possibly get. It allowed me to release emotion that I had bottled up inside of me. When I was finally was able to release a lot of the stuff from my past, I started to grow emotionally, spiritually and mentally. I became a stronger person because of it."

Papadakos believes the general public holds several misconceptions about the leather community, the most common being that it is "all about sex and kink." To the contrary, Papadakos describes the community as a fraternity of sorts, complete with fellowship and philanthropic activity. For example, Papadakos hosted fundraiser benefitting Legacy Counseling Center just last week.

"Believe it or not, it's more about the brotherhood and the family... the relationships," he says. "I have never met a more well-rounded, emotionally stable, giving community than the leather community. There are people I have never met in the leather community who reach out to me on a daily, weekly, monthly basis to chat, to tell stories, whatever. That to me is extremely powerful. You don't get that anywhere else."

Papadakos understands that some people have reservations about exploring their leather curiosity. But joining in, he insists, is not as scary as all that. He compares an initial leather scene visit to one's

"You can go to the Dallas Eagle on any given night and you can spot the virgins, so to speak," Papadakos says. "It's amazing how quickly these new people are embraced and brought in and taught and mentored. Some of them decide it's not the right scene for them for whatever reason, but a lot of them decide that it is."

As a founding member of local boys' social group the Lone Star boys of Leather, Papadakos is committed to educating those who wish to join the leather scene, and especially mentoring other leatherboys. And don't make the mistake of believing only young men can be leatherboys. The position is one of mindset, not of age.

"I've seen 80-year-old boys," Papadakos chuckles. "Boy is a mentality of service, typically of submission to a Sir, daddy or master. But really for me, being a boy is all about the service aspect ... not only to my Sir, but to the leather community at large."

Rugby — especially women's rugby — takes centerfield, and Dallas' Lady Harlequins is enjoying the moment

t seems like every Olympics, whether summer or winter, has its fair share of lesser known sports suddenly coming to the forefront in the midst of the usual fare. *Whoa*, we all suddenly think collectively as a nation, *archery's cool*.

This year's Summer Olympics were no exception. The 2016 Rio Games certainly provided the expected shining moments — the brilliance of the U.S. Women's Gymnastics team, the earth-shattering dominance of Michael Phelps — but the glint of gold cast a spotlight on a first-time Olympic sport that might be the next emerging sport for women: Rugby.

Even a quick glance at a rugby match gives some insight as to why it's fun to watch... and to play. Molly Whitman, one of the cofounders of the Lady Harlequins, Dallas's only women's Division 1 rugby club, explains how the uniqueness of the sport lends to its appeal. "The athleticism of the game is unlike any other sport," she says. "You've got 80 minutes — two 40 minute halves — and it's just constant game play."

Unlike American football, she notes, there are very few stoppages in play during a rugby game.

"A tackle does not stop anything," she says. "If there's a tackle, it causes a ripple effect of things very important to the game."

Whitman says the Lady Quins, who are associated with the long established men's club the Dallas Harlequins, did get a boost

from the Summer Games. "Two weeks after the Olympics, we got contacted by more interested people than we have in a whole year," she says. She's quick to point out that it's not just the Olympics effect. While the exposure certainly helped, women's rugby has already been on the rise in the U.S. for a few years now. More and more colleges offer women's teams, and several adult league teams have popped up over the country. The result for the Lady Quins has been a big boost in interest. The team started the season in mid-March with around 11 players; that list now tops out at 64.

Whitman says the team has seen the uptick "partially because of the Olympics, but also just because positivity breeds more positivity. We're getting so much support and we're so thrilled with the girls we're bringing on, it's had this ripple effect."

Played without pads or helmets, rugby is a full-contact sport that combines many elements of football — including tackling, passing and kicking. The physical nature of the game has given it the reputation as being a bit rough. While it may intimidate some people, Whitman says, it's rugby's ragged edges that help make it fun. "Too often people try to sugarcoat the physicality of it," she says. "The truth is, one of the things that makes rugby great is that you are doing a full contact sport with nothing between you and the other player besides a mouthguard."

That's not to say it's a complete, dangerous brawl. "We don't use our head to tackle," as often seen in football, she says. "One of the first things you learn as a rookie is the safe way to fall and the safe way to tackle. But there will always be bumps and bruises and scrapes."

The Lady Quins' stamina has paid off.

The fun expands off the pitch as well. Whitman says most games are followed by a few pints at a local bar, as the team bands together singing traditional rugby songs, some of which can get a little randy. There's a unique bond that forms between rugby players, she says, and while members of opposite teams may battle on the pitch, they often develop friendships off it, even with people from different cities and countries.

While rugby may not quite be ready to usurp softball and other traditional sports as queen of the North Texas rec league games, the significant uptick in interest bodes well for the sport. The social aspect of it, as well as the camaraderie, make it a good match for LGBT locals looking to meet new people.

"There's this amazing sport right here at your fingertips," Whitman says. "It's so accessible, we don't have tryouts, and the camaraderie and the confidence you will gain from being on this team of strong women is unparalleled."

Holiday Edition: Tamales, tacos and spreading hope during the season

The holidays are upon us, and calorie counting decreased with the thickness of sweaters. Here are some foodie events, items and ideas that will make you jolly — and perhaps even get a belly like a bowl full of jelly.

Anastacia Quinones (AQ to her friends and followers) took over the kitchen at Bishop Arts' Oddfellows last summer after stints at Komali and Kitchen LTO. She'll be back in Trinity **Groves** on Dec. 19 for an event close to her heart: A fundraiser for Genesis Women's Shelter. AQ was so impressed by the services the charity offered, she enlisted a dozen fellow chefs around town — including those from Hattie's, Uchi, Cedars Social, Parigi, CBD Provisions, Resident Taqueria and more — to participate in a foodie-centric Ugly Christmas Sweater Party. Master mixologist Leann Berry will be conjuring

up some cocktails recipes. It's a great way to have fun and do something important for people in need during the holidays. The event runs 6-9 p.m.; advance tickets are \$60.

If you're from Texas, you know that while Thanksgiving is about turkey, Christmas is about ... tamales. Yes, that's a tradition that I never grow weary of. Cantina Laredo offers to-go orders of their house-made chicken or beef tamales every day through Christmas Eve, for \$16.95/dozen. Just give them six-hours notice and you can celebrate this centuries-old delight. Available at all North Texas area locations.

The hot new Uptown joint Shake Shack is just as famed for its milkshakes as its burgers, and it's rolling out a new lineup of designer nogs for the holidays (each for \$5.79). A trio of season shakes are now available. The chocolate peppermint tastes like an indulgent candy cane, while the sugar cookie (topped with sprinkles!) reminds you of mom baking in December. I was less impressed by the take on pumpkin pie, but instead, try the brownie hot chocolate (ask them to over-foam it for a moussier version) and you'll be full of Christmas cheer.

If you wanna get warm — physically, spiritually and culinarily — two-step into Stampede 66. Stephan Pyles' accessibly upscale Uptown eatery has a great deal weekdays, with a taco bar and happy hour from 4–7 p.m. Better yet, Music Mondays offer live bands performing while you sip finely-crafted cocktails and dine on discounted bites at the bar.

Cedar Grove at the ilume is gussying up brunch this weekend, with a pop-up cocktail cart of Cointreau on Dec. 17 and 18. We're used to checking out Bread Winners for brunch... during brunch hours. But the local institution also offers that brunchy feel at dinnertime. Items introduced this fall bring the homestyle feeling to the evening hours, with items like salt-and-pepper chicken wings, a decadent brisket-based meatloaf (also made with pancetta!) and a blackened redfish topped with a rich crab beurre blanc. Toss in a cocktail (like a classic Manhattan or Leo's Old Fashioned) and and a few shady friends, and you've got the makings of brunch at sunset.

#### It's a trap! Fangasm prequel 'Rogue One' fails to light up the sky

The adage "vou always hurt the ones you love" applies as much to movies as paramours. Devoted Star Wars fanatics, especially those who grew up with the series starting a long time ago in a galaxy far, far away (i.e., the 1970s), have long complained about two notable flaws in the original: First, Luke kisses Leia, which is gross, because they are siblings; and second, the mistake in the design of the Death Star that allows the rebels to blow it up seems pretty glaring. Nevertheless, Adm. Akbar asserts that many rebels died getting these plans to the Alliance.

Believe it or not, Rogue One is entirely about the backstory of that design defect... and the rebels who passed it along to Princess Leia before Darth Vader commandeered her ship.

We are deep in fanboy territory, people.

Indeed, Rogue One feels almost more like fan fiction than a true part of the series (the fact the words "Star Wars" do not appear, officially, in the opening titles signals that they consider it a cousin-by-marriage more than the favorite son) — an explanation of a minor plot point that no one except die-hard devotees would have even noticed, not to say cared about. (It also casts Adm. Akbar as a bit of a liar, since in Episode IV he says they discovered the flaw once they got the plans, when clearly it was spoonfed to them. Not that I care or nuthin'.)


George Lucas has said he based Star Wars on The Hidden Fortress, but Rogue One more closely resembles another Kurosawa film: Seven Samurai. Set between the events of Episode III (Revenge of the Sith) and the original (A New Hope), the plot involves assembling a crew of outcasts to do the dirty work of saving the universe. It employs a mostly-new cast of characters who, for the most part, had never been mentioned in the series previously - among them a kind of female Han Solo (Felicity Jones) and a guerrilla leader, who seems to be included solely to give Forest Whitaker a strange cameo. These new folks, and tons of new locales, muddles the story considerably. Meanwhile, we get glimpses of several over canonical characters, most notably a digitally-recreated Peter Cushing as Grand Moff Tarkin. The problem is, he (and at least one other) look as waxy and artificial as museum statues — a noble effort to flesh out some characters, but hardly effective.


On the other hand, Rogue One does benefit some from the historic shorthand build around the Star Wars mythos, as well as the backing of the studio which clearly wants to capitalize on owning the property, but doesn't want to trash it... at least not too quickly. There's a slickness and a familiarity to the score, the sets, the style. We know what the Force is, so explaining it doesn't take up any time.

The film trots along, but it's hard to imagine it attracting many new devotees. This is the Inside Baseball of scifi, a side show to entertain the masses while the headliners relax backstage.
