WHAT IS ODEFSEY®?

ODEFSEY is a 1-pill, once-a-day prescription medicine used to treat HIV-1 in people 12 years and older. It can either be used in people who are starting HIV-1 treatment, have never taken HIV-1 medicines before, and have an amount of HIV-1 in their blood ("viral load") that is no more than 100,000 copies/mL; or in people who are replacing their current HIV-1 medicines and whose healthcare provider determines they meet certain requirements. These include having an undetectable viral load (less than 50 copies/mL) for 6 months or more on their current HIV-1 treatment. ODEFSEY combines 3 medicines into 1 pill taken once a day with a meal. ODEFSEY is a complete HIV-1 treatment and should not be used with other HIV-1 medicines.

ODEFSEY does not cure HIV-1 infection or AIDS. To control HIV-1 infection and decrease HIV-related illnesses, you must keep taking ODEFSEY. Ask your healthcare provider if you have questions about how to reduce the risk of passing HIV-1 to others. Always practice safer sex and use condoms to lower the chance of sexual contact with body fluids. Never reuse or share needles or other items that have body fluids on them.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information I should know about ODEFSEY?

ODEFSEY may cause serious side effects:

- Buildup of an acid in your blood (lactic acidosis), which is a serious medical
 emergency. Symptoms of lactic acidosis include feeling very weak or tired,
 unusual muscle pain, trouble breathing, stomach pain with nausea or vomiting,
 feeling cold (especially in your arms and legs), feeling dizzy or lightheaded, and/
 or a fast or irregular heartbeat.
- Serious liver problems. The liver may become large and fatty. Symptoms of
 liver problems include your skin or the white part of your eyes turning yellow
 (jaundice); dark "tea-colored" urine; loss of appetite; light-colored bowel
 movements (stools); nausea; and/or pain, aching, or tenderness on the right side
 of your stomach area.
- You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or serious liver problems if you
 are female, very overweight, or have been taking ODEFSEY or a similar medicine
 for a long time. In some cases, lactic acidosis and serious liver problems have
 led to death. Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any symptoms
 of these conditions.
- Worsening of hepatitis B (HBV) infection. ODEFSEY is not approved to treat
 HBV. If you have both HIV-1 and HBV and stop taking ODEFSEY, your HBV may
 suddenly get worse. Do not stop taking ODEFSEY without first talking to your
 healthcare provider, as they will need to monitor your health.

Who should not take ODEFSEY?

Do not take ODEFSEY if you take:

- Certain prescription medicines for other conditions. It is important to ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist about medicines that should not be taken with ODEFSEY. Do not start a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider.
- The herbal supplement St. John's wort.
- Any other medicines to treat HIV-1 infection.

What are the other possible side effects of ODEFSEY?

Serious side effects of ODEFSEY may also include:

- Severe skin rash and allergic reactions. Skin rash is a common side effect of ODEFSEY. Call your healthcare provider right away if you get a rash, as some rashes and allergic reactions may need to be treated in a hospital. Stop taking ODEFSEY and get medical help right away if you get a rash with any of the following symptoms: fever, skin blisters, mouth sores, redness or swelling of the eyes (conjunctivitis), swelling of the face, lips, mouth, or throat, trouble breathing or swallowing, pain on the right side of the stomach (abdominal) area, and/or dark "tea-colored" urine.
- Depression or mood changes. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you: feel sad or hopeless, feel anxious or restless, have thoughts of hurting yourself (suicide) or have tried to hurt yourself.
- Changes in liver enzymes. People who have had hepatitis B or C or who have certain
 liver enzyme changes may have a higher risk for new or worse liver problems while taking
 ODEFSEY. Liver problems can also happen in people who have not had liver disease.
 Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your liver enzymes before and during
 treatment with ODEFSEY.
- Changes in body fat, which can happen in people taking HIV-1 medicines.
- Changes in your immune system. Your immune system may get stronger and begin
 to fight infections. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any new symptoms after you
 start taking ODEFSEY.
- Kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider should do blood
 and urine tests to check your kidneys. Your healthcare provider may tell you
 to stop taking ODEFSEY if you develop new or worse kidney problems.
- Bone problems, such as bone pain, softening, or thinning, which may lead to fractures.
 Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your bones.

The most common side effects of rilpivirine, one of the medicines in ODEFSEY, are depression, trouble sleeping (insomnia), and headache.

The most common side effect of emtricitabine and tenofovir alafenamide, two of the medicines in ODEFSEY, is nausea.

Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or do not go away.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking ODEFSEY?

- All your health problems. Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you have or have
 had any kidney, bone, mental health (depression or suicidal thoughts), or liver problems,
 including hepatitis virus infection.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Other medicines may affect how ODEFSEY works.
 Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist.
 Ask your healthcare provider if it is safe to take ODEFSEY with all of your other medicines.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if ODEFSEY can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant while taking ODEFSEY.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed. HIV-1 can be passed to the baby in breast milk.

Ask your healthcare provider if ODEFSEY is right for you, and visit ODEFSEY.com to learn more.

ABOUT ODEFSEY

- ODEFSEY is a prescription medicine used to treat HIV-1 in people 12 years of age and older
 who have never taken HIV-1 medicines before and who have an amount of HIV-1 in their blood
 ("viral load") that is no more than 100,000 copies/mL. ODEFSEY can also be used to replace
 current HIV-1 medicines for some people who have an undetectable viral load (less than
 50 copies/mL), have been on the same HIV-1 medicines for at least 6 months, have never
 failed HIV-1 treatment, and whose healthcare provider determines that they meet certain
 other requirements.
- ODEFSEY does not cure HIV-1 or AIDS. Ask your healthcare provider about how to prevent passing HIV-1 to others.

Do NOT take ODEFSEY if you:

- Take a medicine that contains: carbamazepine (Carbatrol®, Epitol®, Equetro®, Tegretol®, Tegretol-XR®, Teril®), dexamethasone (Ozurdex®, Maxidex®, Decadron®, Baycadron™), dexlansoprazole (Dexilant®), esomeprazole (Nexium®, Vimovo®), lansoprazole (Prevacid®), omeprazole (Prilosec®, Zegerid®), oxcarbazepine (Trileptal®), pantoprazole sodium (Protonix®), phenobarbital (Luminal®), phenytoin (Dilantin®, Dilantin-125®, Phenytek®), rabeprazole (Aciphex®), rifampin (Rifadin®, Rifamate®, Rifater®, Rimactane®), or rifapentine (Priftin®).
- · Take the herbal supplement St. John's wort.
- · Take any other HIV-1 medicines at the same time.

ODEFSEY can cause serious side effects, including:

- · Severe skin rash and allergic reactions.
- · Depression or mood changes.
- · Changes in liver enzymes.

- · Changes in your immune system.

These are not all the possible side effects of ODEFSEY. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any new symptoms while taking ODEFSEY.

Your healthcare provider will need to do tests to monitor your health before and during treatment with ODEFSEY.

Tell your healthcare provider if you:

- Have or have had any kidney, bone, mental health (depression or suicidal thoughts), or liver problems, including hepatitis infection.
- · Have any other medical condition.
- Are pregnant or plan to become pregnant.
- Are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take:

- Keep a list that includes all prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements, and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist.
- Ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist about medicines that should not be taken with ODEFSEY.

HOW TO TAKE ODEFSEY

- ODEFSEY is a complete 1-pill, once-a-day HIV-1 medicine.
- · Take ODEFSEY with a meal.



Gay man attacked outside Target on Haskell

Theater director/actor Derek Whitener remains hospitalized in Dallas after being attacked by two masked men outside the Target store on Haskell on Saturday night, Jan. 14.

Friends confirmed to Dallas Voice that Whitener is a member of the LGBT community and that he was not robbed in the attack. Some of his friends are calling the attack an anti-gay hate crime.

Dallas Morning News reports that Whitener, 33, stopped at the Target on his way home after performing as Leaf Coneybear in The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee at Firehouse Theatre in Farmer's Branch, where is he is artistic and education director.

Reports say that one of the men was wearing a ski mask and the other was wearing a monkey mask. One of them hit Whitener on the head with a pipe, fracturing his skull. Friends said he has undergone brain surgery.

North Texas' music and theater community has stepped up to support Whitener.

At its weekly rehearsal, the Turtle Creek Chorale raised more than \$1,000 when it passed the hat to support Whitener. Executive Director Bruce Jaster said the Chorale is open to collecting more.

"We're glad that there's something we can do, joining with others in the arts community, to help,"

A GoFundMe account has been created and has brought in more than \$74,000 so far.

Whitener recently became executive director of Firehouse Theater in Farmers Branch, where he was currently appearing in The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee. A portion of ticket sales for the show through the end of the week will go towards Whitener's medical expenses.

WaterTower Theatre in Addison, Mama's Party at Uptown Theater in Grand Prairie and OnStage Bedford are among the theaters that have already announced they're helping defray medical costs.

Obama commutes Chelsea Manning's sentence

President Barack Obama has commuted the sentence of Chelsea Manning, the U.S. military servicemember who was convicted of leaking information to Wikileaks and sentenced to 35 years in Leavenworth. She will be released in May 2017.

Manning is transgender, and began her transition while in prison.

Manning deployed to Iraq in 2009 and worked as a security analyst. While there, she copied hundreds of thousands of military incident logs that documented abuse of detainees by the Iraqi military and suggested Iraqi civilian deaths were much higher than had been reported.

At her trial, Manning confessed and apologized, although she hadn't accepted a plea deal.

Most previous leak cases resulted in one- to three-year sentences. Manning received 35 years and will be released after serving seven. Over the past year, she attempted suicide twice. Although she asked for a pardon, which would wipe out the sentence, a commutation releases her for time served.

Pulse killer's wife arrested

Federal authorities have arrested the widow of the man who killed 49 people and injured more than 50 others at Pulse nightclub in Orlando last June 12 before being killed himself by officers responding to the scene.

Noor Salman faces federal charges including obstruction of justice and aiding and abetting her husband's material support to ISIS, according to a law enforcement official. The law enforcement official said that despite Salman's claim that she was coerced by her husband's abusive behavior, authorities believe she acted of her own free will and knowingly obstructed the investigation into what was the worst mass shooting by a single gunman in modern U.S. history.

Authorities believe Salman acted of her own free will and knowingly took steps to obstruct the investigation into the massacre, according to a law enforcement official.

The official said Salman's claims that she was coerced through her husband's abusive behavior did not stand up. Another official says the evidence will show that she was complicit and knew her husband was going to do something bad.

Neither Salman's attorney nor her family in California have commented on the arrest.

Orlando police Chief John Mina said he is glad Salman was arrested and that "we are grateful that they have seen to it that some measure of justice will be served in this act of terror that has affected our community so deeply."





A fond farewell

North Texas LGBT community members talk about working with the country's most LGBT-friendly First Family ever

Patti Fink came home from the 2004 Democratic Convention, where she was a Howard Dean delegate, raving about an up-and-coming senator from Illinois. Her wife, Erin Moore, heard the keynote speech Barack Obama delivered on television, but she saw him in person a year later when he appeared at a Democratic Party event in Lee Park, with Sens. Harry Reid and Joe Biden.

"I remember thinking he was inspirational," Moore said. "He said things Democrats hadn't heard for awhile."

She was so impressed with Obama that as the 2008 election approached, Moore worked to become an Obama delegate to the Democratic convention. But it wasn't until the 2012 election approached that she spoke to the president, at a fundraising reception in Dallas.

Moore said the line was long and the president's handlers were pressing him to move quickly, but she got one line in as they shook hands: "Thank you for all the work you've done for our community."

He replied, "I couldn't have done anything else."

Moore said the president even leaned down so Fink, who is much shorter, would be in the picture with them.

During the primaries that year, Moore served on the Texas Democratic Party's platform committee and wrote marriage equality into the platform. The Obama campaign called Moore and asked her to serve on the national platform committee where she then helped put that plank into the national Democratic platform.

Describing the president, Moore said she felt more than just listening to the LGBT community, Barack Obama embraced it.

"We weren't just a special interest group," she said. "We were a part of this nation for the first time."

'Most inspirational'

Don Maison, CEO of AIDS Services of Dallas, called Obama "the most inspirational president in my lifetime."

Maison represented the National AIDS Housing Coalition when he attended a White House conference to set a national AIDS policy, something the U.S. never had before.

"It was clear Obama was committed to creating a strategy to address AIDS nationally," Maison said. "He wanted something solid and in writing and he has been updating it ever since."

Obama showed an interest not just in AIDS policy, but in a wide variety of issues affecting the LGBT community.

Cannon Flowers, founder of Coalition for Aging LGBT, said he's thought quite a bit about what he'll miss when the Obamas leave the White House.

Flowers visited the White House three times during the Obama administration — once as an advocate for same-sex partner immigration equality and twice to bring awareness to and discuss services for members of the LGBT community who are aging. The most obvious change that Flowers sees is access.

"We have enjoyed eight years of unprecedented access to the White House," Flowers said. "I will miss the ability to simply call the White House Office of Public Engagement for a range of LGBT issues and concerns around immigration and aging."

He said that after eight years of advancement, the community's progress will now be tested.

"I believe this testing is a necessary part

of forging and galvanizing permanent change in this country," he said. "While the testing can be frightening, it is absolutely required."

'His full attention'

For Waylon Tate, the issue was education. Tate owns a public relations firm, and while he was leading the local chapter of GLSEN—the Gay Lesbian Straight Education Network—he was invited to the White House several times, working with White House LGBT liaison Gautam Raghavan on two ed-

ucation bills that were pending in Congress.

Tate said that when talking to the president, you have his full attention: "The president looks you dead in the eye."

He said Obama is graceful, astute, composed and incredibly friendly, and Tate has high praise for the first lady as well.

"All heads turn when she walks in the room," he said. "She's down to earth, witty and quick on her feet."

Tate said his visits to the Obama White House were like walking in to his generation's Camelot, and that he others who

Packed up to go

WASHINGTON — They line up near the Oval Office, down the hallway toward the Cabinet Room, trailed by their spouses and young kids in their finest clothes. When it's their turn, the White House staffers enter for a few private moments with President Barack Obama, a photo and a farewell hug from the boss.

There was a mass exodus underway this week at the White House. As Obama held his last news

conference Wednesday, Jan. 18, his staff was busy packing up their offices and turning in their BlackBerrys. For some who joined Obama's team right out of college, it's the end of the only professional experience they've ever known.

The finals days of any president's administration are always bittersweet and heavy on nostalgia, as officials face the transition back to being "civilians" who will no longer have their hands on the nation's levers of power. Yet there's added sadness this time for Obama staffers who are mostly horrified by the incoming administration of President-elect Donald Trump.

"You're always aware that it's a special privilege to work there and not something to take for

granted," said Nate Lowentheil, who worked on Obama's National Economic Council for the last three years. "It's particularly hard knowing the next wave of people coming are going to be working to reverse the things you were working to advance until your very last hour."

There were tears on the faces of some White House aides on Tuesday, Jan. 17, as press secretary Josh Earnest appeared in the James S. Brady Press Briefing Room for his final press briefing — his 354th as press secretary, Earnest said. Even former staffers were invited to return to the White House to witness Earnest's last round of jousting with reporters.

"I'm going to miss it," Earnest said. "It will

take some getting used to seeing somebody else standing up here doing it.

"Or not," he added, in a nod to the prospect that Trump's team may make changes to the daily briefing.

In between closing out final projects and typing up reports on the work they've done, White House staffers were packing away their knickknacks, coffeemakers and photos. The boxes stacked up in offices already vacated by staffers who had departed over the past few weeks.

By Thursday night, all had to be gone to make way for Trump's team. Before they left the building for the final time, they were all prepared to go through a checklist that completed their formal



separation from the White House: cell phones handed in, computers locked and papers properly filed to be archived. The last step, aides said, is the hardest: handing in the badge that provides access to the complex day or night.

"It's been an honor to be a part of it. And yeah, I'm interested in what happens here. And I'll continue to follow it," Earnest said. "But I will be relieved to not have the burden to follow it as closely as this job has required over the last two-and-a-half years."

A few White House staffers have found new jobs already, but most are taking some time off to ponder next steps. Some are going home to visit family they haven't spent much time

with in years. One said he was spending two months driving across the country, unsure of what he'd do next. Others are taking long vacations to places like New Zealand and Iceland, unencumbered by the need to constantly check in with the office.

"This is the only world I've known," said Clay Dumas, who took time off from college to work for Obama's 2008 campaign, then interned at the White House before being hired four years ago. He said he was searching for a job that would allow him to continue advancing values and policies he worked on in the White House. "Whatever I do next will be a huge continuation of that

A legislature divided

Dan Patrick says his bathroom bill is a top priority this legislative session; House Speaker Joe Straus says otherwise

Some of Texas' top officials refuse to back down from the bathroom battles currently dominating the legislative session. That is despite a budget shortfall, a broken school finance system and an "unconstitutional" Child Protective Services agency.

In fact, speaking to the Texas Association of Business on Tuesday, Jan. 18, Republican Attorney General Ken Paxton urged attendees to get behind Senate Bill 6. Commonly known as the "bathroom bill," it would require people use bathrooms, locker rooms and other public accommodations according to their sex at birth and not gender identity.

Sen. Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, authored the bill at Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick's behest

To Paxton, the largely skeptical crowd of

business owners needs to listen to parents "concerned about the safety of their children."

Speaker of the House Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, wasn't having it.

The diplomatic, soft-spoken leader of the 150-member state House expressed grave concern about the bill. So far, only Rep. Matt Shaheen, R-Plano, has filed similar legislation.

"There's been a lot of work put into our state's economic success," Straus said. "Contrary to popular myth, it is not a miracle. We want to continue that success and we want Texas to keep attracting the best and the brightest. One way to maintain our economic edge is to send the right signals about who we are."

Residents of his San Antonio district have told him the bill could negatively impact not just their community but the state as a whole.

"Many people where I come from get concerned about anything that could slow down our overall job creating machine. They're also watching what happened in North Carolina and they are not enthusiastic about getting that type of attention," Straus said.

"So, I think we should be very careful about doing something that could make Texas less competitive for investments, jobs and the highly skilled workforce needed to compete."

Straus also urged Republican Gov. Greg Abbott to articulate his opinion on the legislation.

"The governor's opinion on this can make a big difference too," Straus said.

Abbott last publicly spoke about the bill in December, saying he was unsure about the legislation and needed to look more into

it. A week before, the Texas Association of Business rolled out its "Texas is Open for Business" campaign denouncing SB6 and other bills seen as potentially harmful to the LGBT community.

While few bills directly targeting the LGBT community have been filed, there's still time. The last day for legislators to file bills for consideration is March 10, 2017.

Hardline social conservatives, who historically have opposed Speaker Straus and supported Lt. Gov. Patrick, will gather on March 16 for "Texas Faith and Family Day." But to understand the difference between Patrick and Straus requires looking at the chamber's priorities.

Straus this session has prioritized reforming CPS and the Robin Hood school finance system and promoting entrepreneurship.

The difference between the two chambers of the state legislature could not be starker. It's not just the bathroom bill dividing the chambers.

Even their budget priorities are different: \$8 billion different, in fact.

On Tuesday, Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, filed Senate Bill 1, the biennial state budget. According to a statement from Nelson's office, the \$103.6 billion budget includes additional resources for transportation, Child Protective Services and mental health.

Straus' office is markedly different, doling out \$108.9 billion for the 2018-19 biennium.

"We put an emphasis on public education, child protection and better mental health care. The Members of the House, beginning with the Appropriations Committee, will now have the chance to shape this budget and decide how best to allocate resources during an economic slowdown," Straus said.

"This is the first step toward producing a balanced budget that reflects the priorities of the Texas House and does not raise taxes."

worked on that school legislation talked about their experience working with administration.

"We talked about how incredibly lucky we were to be in that place and time," he said.

Celebrating Pride

While some leaders in the community

remember the Obamas for their concern on issues, Resource Center Communications and Advocacy Manager Rafael McDonnell was invited to the White House for a celebration — Pride 2014.

Recalling the event, McDonnell said the timing was interesting — a year after the *Windsor* decision, which struck down parts of the Defense of Marriage Act, and a year before the *Obergefell* decision, which ex-

tended marriage equality nationally.

McDonnell said it was hard to describe the rush of emotion as he entered the White House for a Pride event. After passing through security, he was greeted by a Marine guard who said, "Welcome to the White House, sir."

He said hearing an Illinois couple speaking in the White House about their legal marriage — a year before marriage became legal in Texas — was very emotional.

McDonnell noted the significance of the Pride event being held in the historic East Room where President Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights bill into law, where Lincoln's body laid in state and where Abigail Adams hung the family's laundry before the White House was completed.

Obama gave attendees an official copy of the Pride Month proclamation he had signed, which McDonnell framed and now hangs in his office.





Taking back our story

Today more than ever, we need to remember the adage: United we stand, divided we fall

t has taken me several attempts to avoid just venting my anger and instead actu-**L** ally write something coherent regarding our current political situation. I suspect that is a common thread for many people, especially ones who spread their opinions across publications and websites.

I get that the election is over and done, and that though the popular vote showed Hillary Clinton as the clear winner, she lost. I get that our system of democracy is filtered by the Electoral College, and it is that body that actually decides the winner of the election, not the popular vote.

I get it. And I get that because of this system we have ended up with the man that will take the oath of office today (Friday, Jan. 20) and become the president of the United States.

He is the president we get!

Now, as unhappy as I am with the outcome — and believe me, I am very unhappy — what can I do? What can I do to help, in some small way, prevent our nation from becoming a kleptocracy? What can I do to start some kind of healing process to help us move forward?

Well, first I can realize an important lesson I learned recently from reading Trevor Noah's wonderful autobiography, Born a Crime. He details his childhood in pre- and post-apartheid South Africa, and it is an enjoyable and compelling read.

He explained the genius of apartheid as a means of keeping a country in the grip of a white minority government. A system that diabolically managed to keep an overwhelming majority from rising up and demanding not just equality but control, which by all rights should have been theirs.

It is a lesson we can take to heart today in the United States of America.

You see, in South Africa, the ruling white majority created a system of classification that separated all citizens based on their "perceived" race: If you were an indigenous African with very dark skin, you were classified as "black." If you were of mixed race, with lighter skin, you were classified as "colored." If you were from India, you were "Indian," unless you were very darkskinned and then you might be considered "black."

And of course if you were of European descent, you were classified as "white."

Each "race" was given different privileges, and because of that they were constantly suspicious and jealous of each other. Add

to that the many languages spoken in the country both by the indigenous people like the Zulu, Xhosa, Tswana, Pedi, Venda, Ndebele, Pondo, Swati — and the Afrikaners of European descent, and you have a population that is neatly divided. And easily manipulated.

Apartheid was the ultimate "divide and conquer" strategy, and it worked for many

Why is this important? Because right now we are in danger of falling into the same

We are about to be a nation with a ruling minority, a country that has successfully taken power by dividing us into smaller and smaller special groups. There are the blue-collar white workers from the Midwest who somehow believe that the GOP is going to give them a better deal than the Democrats. There are the white-collar "elite" from places like New York and California, who look down their noses at the uneducated rabble.

There are the southern whites that are still waving Confederate flags and cleaning their guns, indignant that a black man has occupied the White House for the past eight years. There are the Southern blacks that had the audacity to believe they had a voice

There are the young, college-educated Bernie Bros that are participating in politics for the first time, possibly because they are saddled with debt and saw a way out. There are the farmers who live from harvest to harvest and hate big government except for the subsidies for their crops.

There are the "evangelicals," who can ignore any injustice as long as it isn't abortion or being gay. And there are "the gays," the LGBTQ community — some of whom might have disposable income, but all of whom still don't have equal rights.

We have been convinced that we are a nation of warring factions, each seeking their own "special" rights. The narrative has worked so well that the Democratic Party is splitting into factions and warring with itself over who has the politically correct message that will magically win back America's heart.

The narrative has worked so well that we have a man who was wildly unpopular with the Republican Party insiders and long-time conservatives now poised to put his hand on the Bible and become president.

We have all bought into the story and by

doing so, we are creating a feedback loop that and intensifies encourages the continued vide.

It's time we stopped, took a breath and looked closely at that narrative.



It's based on half-truths and outright lies, but we have read, listened to and repeated it so many times it has become what we perceive as reality.

But it is not reality. It is a sham a big lie, told over and over enough times to make it sound true. And we are all guilty of repeating it. All of us, myself included.

It's time we took back the American story. It's time we changed the narrative. It's time we returned to a country where electing a "reality TV personality" as president would be not just unthinkable, but laughable fic-

We can start by writing our own stories as Americans. We can start by remembering that we still control the strings that run the country. We have the power for now to do something about it. We can do it at the ballot box and in our daily lives.

Yes we can!

I implore you to stop believing that we are just a nation of separate warring camps, that we are a nation divided along racial and ethnic and economic lines.

We must start finding similarities with each other. We must start building alliances and working together — or we will die separately.

For LGBTQ people, that means finding ways to support other minorities and reaching out to disenfranchised groups. It means refusing to be excluded from the American experience. It means telling our story as part of a great epic that binds us closer rather than separating us from one another.

It will be hard work, and it will take organizing at all levels. It will take money and it will take time and — most of all — it will take each and every one of us refusing to believe the narrative that we are separate.

We must remember our country's original motto, "E Pluribus Unum" — out of many, one. Otherwise we will all fade into history as a failed experiment.

I believe we and our ancestors have invested far too much to allow that

Double the dirt

Queen of Mean Lisa Lampanelli talks unamused lesbians (a thing of the past!), her drag idol and how an insult comic survives in the Era of Trump

If you know her racy sense of humor, you practically expect Lisa Lampanelli to hurl a slur at you when she calls. Once, she wanted to know "if this was the same cornholer I talked to the last time," and because she's Lisa Lampanelli, I took that as a compliment.

Known for her stereotype-mocking comedy routines and hilariously foul roasts (during 2011's Comedy Central roast of Donald Trump, Lampanelli called the now-president a "bloated, stinky douche"), the 55-year-old Connecticut native acknowledges that her interview persona is either a version of her exaggerated standup self or the "real" Lisa.

Both versions showed up to our interview. Lampanelli — currently on a national tour (she'll arrive at Dallas' Majestic Theatre on March 31) — spoke about Oprah's bread obsession, why she would have performed at Trump's inauguration and how drag icon Miss Coco Peru inspired her to consider becoming a motivational speaker. And about those dual personalities: "It's like I'm becoming two people merging into one, so enjoy the double-ended dildo interview."

Dallas Voice: Hey, Lisa. Three minutes late — ook you long enough. Lisa Lampanelli: Listen, bitch, you're lucky I wasn't 12 months late. Wuz up?

Explain to me how you decide who you'll be during an interview, because I've only ever been on the receiving end of crass, standup Lisa, but I've also read interviews with you where you come across much softer. Yes, it's like, you kind of have to combine them for an interview, usually because that's who we [comedians] are anyway. Sometimes you just wanna have fun, and then you interject some serious stuff, or you wanna be serious and you interject some fun stuff. So it's kind of like, whatever mood I'm in. Like your interview today is based probably a lot on the fact that the guy before you was not a dick.

When did you first feel like you'd "made it" in the gay community? It sort of built. I remember being able to make fun of everybody and have them not get mad, except the occasional guy or girl who has no sense of humor. I never felt until recently like the lesbians understood me, but in the last 10 years, which for me is recent, I'm like, "Oh, they get it, they don't hate me." Because it used to be, when I started, I had played a few places that lesbians were not happy, honey.

Why do you think it took longer for the lesbians to come around? Oh, because those bitches used to take themselves too seriously. Couldn't stand it! I'm like, "Listen!"

What changed? They stopped being a bunch of clams with no sense of humor. I mean, honestly. I almost feel like the younger lesbians coming up kind of were like, "This is cool; she doesn't mean anything she says." You know, I'm sure there are plenty of people out there who hate my act, and it's fine, and they're allowed to, but I can no longer say the lesbians don't have a sense of humor — they do!

How does the current political climate and racial tension in the country affect your comedy? I push more because I think my push has always been in the direction of making fun as love, so I think it's like going, if I sort of stop pushing hard, people could go, "She has some hate or prejudice behind it now." It's like putting up a light between how I say it and how true racists or homophobes say it. They see such a difference between me saying horrible things and those people saying horrible things. Thankfully my audience gets it and understands why.

What's scary are the people who may not get the difference between real bigots and a comedian who's mocking bigots. I'm lucky that I really don't get any feedback like that. I really don't have people coming up after shows saying, "Thanks for those faggot jokes." I'm lucky people get it on the level it's intended. Also if they don't, like Cher says, she only answers to two people: herself and God. And I can look in the mirror and say, "I'm just answering to me because I get me."

From what I've read, your act these days is more self-reflective. I mean, I'll be just more vulnerable onstage, meaning I'll tell you real stuff from my life. A lot of the past life was over-exaggerated sexual stuff that either just didn't happen or were funny stories that I blew out of proportion for humor's sake. Now, I just tell the truth behind my divorce [from Jimmy Cannizzaro in 2014], behind my weight loss, behind the struggle to keep it off, behind the self-help journey I've gone on. So yeah, I just tell the truth more.

So, wait: You didn't have sex with all those black men like you claimed?

Well, I mean, I had a black boyfriend, and we dated for three-and-a-half years, which I thought was pretty good! He cheated on me with another white bitch, so I cut him loose.

Wanda Sykes was recently booed at one of her shows for calling Donald Trump a "racist, sexist, homophobic president."

She shouted expletives at the audience and gave them the middle finger. By the way, who's coming to see her not believing that? Exactly. How would you have handled Trump hecklers at your show? I do a whole Trump roast now. I wrote this really funny Trump roast — an updated one for Howard Stern — and I'm doing even more Trump jokes. But I get away with that kind of roast humor all the time. Nobody gets mad, even Trump supporters, if I say something serious about Trump, which I hardly ever do because I don't talk politics much. Not my thing. Once people booed something and I go, "Oh, shut up. I'm a comedian, not a senator. Shut the fuck up." And they

I have no political agenda, and I think they know Wanda really has that strong belief, so maybe that's why they booed, and it's fine. But people know I'm not, like, all serious about stuff, so that's probably why I don't get a hard time.

You say you stay out of politics. I don't care.

Do you not care that Trump is now the President of the United States? I mean, what am I gonna do? No — really. What exactly am I gonna do? I still will donate to the charities I want to which have nothing to do with him, I'll still do shows or appearances for the charities I like, I'll still sign petitions for women's rights and



various charities and different causes that have clearly opposing views. But what am I gonna do? Am I gonna get him un-elected? Am I gonna sit here and cry and go on my swooning couch? Nothing's bugged me more than my friends after the election going, "I couldn't get out of bed for a week." Really? How about you go online and create a charity and get some petitions out there? How about that instead of lying on your swooning couch?

I have a friend — this little homo — who, after one day of mourning, created an entire website where you go to donate time to different charities that Trump doesn't support, and I'm like, "You did the right thing." Take action. For some reason we have been saddled with this president and we have to figure out what to do despite it. Maybe it's to make people more united. But whatever's gonna happen is gonna happen.

Look, if I'm dead tomorrow because of a nuclear bomb — what, did I worry about it the day before? No, I had game night and dinner with my mom and my friends and went out on a nice note because we didn't stop our lives. I can't cry about this.

You've crossed paths with Donald Trump several times. You roasted him on Comedy Central, and you competed in the fifth season of the *Celebrity Apprentice* in 2012. Would you perform at his inauguration? Absolutely ... but only if I could roast him. You understand, there's a fine line of what I would do. Like, if they asked me to be the White House Correspondents' Dinner host to perform, I'd be like, "in a second," because I could reaaaally do a good roast on him and that's the best, so it would be a way of sticking it to him a little bit and it'd be fine. I would absolutely have a clear conscience about making fun of Trump. I always do.

Maybe that's your "in" for his cabinet. I wanna be the minister of gay affairs! You totally need me to be in there making sure you faggots can get married even though I don't know why you'd want to.

You wanna get married again, don't you?

Nooo. I was. Honestly, I don't even think about dating or men because I've been working so hard on myself. When I got a divorce, I was like, "I'm free of being with somebody who isn't my spiritual equal." So I never even think about that. It's weird, but such a gift. I'm so happy all the time. It lifted this weird pressure off of me to be myself.

As someone who has dealt with food issues throughout her life, can we please talk about Oprah's "I love bread" Weight Watchers campaign? I am so angry with her. And I'll tell you why I'm angry with her. First of all, it's idiotic. It's the dumbest thing. The biggest joy in her life is bread? Then, bitch, you've been preaching wrong for all these years, and you tricked us. Because I thought her biggest joy was helping people; I thought her biggest joy was about self-improvement. I would've taken anything except the name of a food, so I was like, "Dude, show us some enlightenment here." I just




can't stand the un-self-awareness of her putting that out there, but it's her journey. It's none of my business. I don't like to watch that one, ever. I always flip right by it. I'm like, "ackkkk!" I'd rather watch those poor dogs with the one eye from the "Angel" ads and I hate those.

My thing is, how can anyone be that obsessed with bread and keep the weight off? 'Cause she's not keeping any weight off.

I heard that a drag queen inspired you to move into humorous motivational speaking. Oh, Coco Peru! The best, best, best. She does this routine, and there is such a real great sort of emotional and spiritual element to it that you don't see usually with drag queens. When I saw that, I said, "I am definitely going to make sure more of that vulnerability is in my act." I frickin' love her. It's like, you never know what you're gonna learn when you go and see something, and that was the last thing I expected from a drag performer. I'm so glad I went to that.

What can we expect from you in the new year? I wanna write about different issues with women. I don't want to just stick to the food one. I also wanna do one about these four women — the same four characters and their love relationship. I wanna do another play about them and anger, and them and grief, and then maybe test the waters and start seeing what's out there as far as what I wanna talk about if I were ever going to do a motivational [speaking] thing. Gonna have to see in my gut what feels right, but I think the plays are a bridge to really doing that.

I love that you, insult comic, have now become this emblem of empowerment not just for women but men. It was funny how gay men really responded to the play, because I think gay men, unfortunately, have just as big of a problem with body image as women do. So, I'm so lucky that they really responded to the show, because, man, who doesn't have a problem with the way they look? It's just so hard. It's nice that they would actually come to me and be like, "I went through that too," which I'm pretty grateful for.

Vhat a Kroc

THE FOUNDER Michael Keaton, Laura Dern, Nick Offerman. Rated PG. 115 mins.

Who cured polio? Jonas Salk, right? No — Albert Sabin's oral vaccine was easier to give, had longer-lasting effects and was more widely used almost from Day One. And Eli Whitney invented to cotton gin, yes? Well, scholarship suggests his

landlady, Catharine Greene, made the most significant contributions to the idea. but women couldn't hold patents in the 18th century so Eli got full credit. And

don't ask Robert Gallo who discovered the pathogen we now call HIV. Who gets credit for a thing often pivots on what the "thing" is we're giving credit for.

So who created McDonald's: The Mc-Donald brothers of San Bernadino, Calif., who started the first pop-and-pop burger stand with their name on it; or Ray Kroc, a spit-and-shoe-leather salesman from the Midwest who saw their concept's potential and turned it into a business juggernaut,


second only to Coca-Cola worldwide as the single most identifiable brand since the Holy Roman Empire? That's what *The* Founder tries to convince you of.

You might think the film's title — singular Kroc (Michael Keaton), not plural Mc-Donalds (Nick Offerman and John Carroll Lynch) — makes its position clear, but oh, you would be missing the irony and misdi-

rection that storytellers love. And the Mickey D's story is a great and compelling one: Their own drive and ingenuity; their innovations in design, menu and work-flow; their quality


control standards. Even their decision to get rid of the then-popular drive-in model and throw away cigarette machines to cut down on the riff-raff (i.e., teenagers) and help them market their first store as family-friendly. But they were slow to change, hesitant to grow.

Kroc did not share their timidity. Already 52 when he met the brothers, he saw the potential for a coast-to-coast chain the McDonalds may have invented "fast

food," but Kroc was intent on inventing "the fast food industry."

There seems little doubt that without Kroc, we wouldn't be talking about Mc-Donald's today. The question is: Would that be a good thing? The conundrum of *The* Founder is its split personality: It spends the first 80 percent convincing us to root for Ray (played with leprechaunish mischief by an energetic Keaton) and the last 20 percent showing us what a cutthroat bastard he could be. He introduced powdered "milk" shakes; turned his franchise-restaurant business into a real estate business that ruled with an iron fist; and if you know his widow was named Joan, then knowing that Laura Dern's character is named Ethel gives you a hint at his personal life. But rather than a warts-and-all biopic, *The Founder* is more a case study in business ethics ... and one that concludes "good business" and "good citizenship" rarely intersect.

It's an interesting message to digest this week in particular, as a self-proclaimed real estate mogul with a history of cheating his vendors rises to the highest office in the land: Selfless stewardship and corporate greed clashing in the Oval Office. It makes The Founder resonate in a way I don't think it fully intended — as a cautionary tale of how the American Dream can cost a nation its soul.





CABARET IS MAKING A COMEBACK ... IF DENISE LEE HAS HER WAY

When Simon Cowell used to criticize contestants on American Idol for being "too cabaret," many in the gay community cocked their heads. Cowell made it sounds like a bad thing. Gays have long loved their piano bars, their cabarets and the divas who make them live... probably because, for decades, that's how we gathered for entertainment.


But cabaret has gone more mainstream and will continue to grow... at least if Denise Lee has anything to say about it. Long one of North Texas' top talents and a consistent draw, Lee is returning for her third season of the Life Is a Cabaret Series, and it's the biggest yet. And there's not even a cover charge.

"Cabaret has taken off," Lee says. "When I started this journey about five years ago, very few venues offered this type of entertainment. Now you see the word 'cabaret' listed on the schedules of several music establishments. Engaging with the audiences is part of the magic."

The season is actually two seasons. The mainstage series returns to the spacious Women's Building at Fair Park. It launches Tuesday with a show entitled "Together We Can - Love Is the Key," which reunites frequent co-stars (and best buds) Denise Lee and Gary Lynn Floyd, pictured below. It continues approximately monthly with Lee returning on Valentine's Day, followed by Terry D. Loftis (Feb. 28); Angie McWhirter (March 28); Paul J. Williams (April 25); Heather Paterson (May 23); and Sheran Keyton (June 27).

A second, more intimate series will take place right in Uptown, at Two Corks and a Bottle in the Quadrangle. Lee returns for that on Feb. 21, followed by Anton Shaw (March 21), Shelley Kenneavy (April 28), a surprise guest in May and Stephanie Riggs (June 20).

The series will be topped by the Second Annual Dallas Cabaret Festival, July 27-29. The lineup will include already-named headliner Cynthia Scott, as well as performers to be revealed later.


I don't have a whole lot on my mind today. I'm all hopped up on allergy medication so I feel a little discombobulated. It's like my mind is working
