



Grindr must be sold on national security grounds

The U.S. government is forcing the Chinese owner of West Hollywood-based hook-up app Grindr to sell off the company on grounds of national security.

In 2016, Chinese gaming company Beijing Kunlun Tech Co Ltd. purchased a stake in Grindr for \$93 million. Two years later, the gaming company acquired full ownership of the dating app. The Grindr owner recently made comments about disliking gay men, and now it's been revealed that the app may be using personal information to blackmail users here

and identify dissidents in China.

While the U.S. government isn't interested in whether someone in a gay bar on Cedar Springs Road is hooking up with someone else in that bar, it may be interested in whether the Chinese government is using the information on phones of U.S. military personnel to tip off that government about troop locations or movement.

And there's no fix to the app. Letting other people know exactly where you are is the whole point of Grindr.

So Beijing Kunlun is seeking to sell Grindr. The company had been preparing for a public stock offering, but according to Reuters, Kunlun is now planning to auction the division off.

As of 2017, Reuters reports, the app had 27 million users.

Prosecutors drop charges against Jussie Smollett



County prosecutors announced Tuesday, March 26. that they are dropping all 16 charges filed against actor and **Empire** star Jussie Smollett in connection

with an alleged hate crime attack against him in January in Chicago.

"We believe this outcome is a just disposition

and appropriate resolution to this case," a prosecutor said, according to the Chicago Tribune. Smollett, 36, told police he was walking home from a sandwich shop to his apartment at about 2 a.m. Jan. 29 when he was attacked by two men who threw bleach on him, put a noose around his neck and yelled racial and anti-gay slurs at him. Two brothers who had worked on the set of Empire were arrested in connection with the attack, but when they told police Smollett had paid them to stage the attack, the police turned their attention to Smollett himself, eventually saying he had staged the attack to get attention.

Smollett, who has consistently denied the allegations against him, reportedly agreed to forfeit the \$10,000 he had paid against the \$100,000 bond set by the court when he was arrested.

In a statement released after prosecutors announced they were dropping charges, Smollett's attorneys said: "Jussie and many others were hurt by these unfair and unwarranted actions. This entire situation is a reminder that there should never be an attempt to prove a case in the court of public opinion. That is wrong. It is a reminder that a victim, in this case Jussie, deserves dignity and respect. Dismissal of charges against the victim in this case was the only just result."

Jesse Neal Wait, 47, died of an apparent heart attack on March 6 at his home of Dallas.

Wait was born March 4, 1972, Patricia Ann VanGorkum Wait May and Ralph Leon Wait. He grew up in

Springfield, Colo., graduation from Soringfield Junior High in 1986. He then moved with his mother to Amarillo, where instead of going to high school he chose to go to work as a floral designer at The Flower Gallery. He also made custom house numbers and signs from reclaimed wood. He also began working at Maggie's Disco, an LGBT bar in Amarillo, eventually becoming manager of the club.

When he decided to go back to school, Wait got the deal of Amarillo College to agree that he could attend the college without finishing high school if he could pass the college entrance exams. When he aced the exams, he was awarded his certificate of high school equivalency, then went on to earn Amarillo College Honors Convocation recognition and the Academic Excellence Award for maintaining a 4.0 grade point average. He also attended West Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas, where he studied information technology.

After moving to Dallas about 19 years ago, Wait became manager of the Studio Bar on Cedar Springs Road before moving into a career in banking. He worked for Chase Bank, then Frost Bank before going to work at North Dallas Bank and Trust Co. until he was forced to retire due to health reasons.

Wait's partner, Al Daniels, said Wait was "a kind-hearted and generous man [and] the love of my life." March 9 would have been their third anniversary as a couple, although they had been close friends since 2005. Wait was known as a fashionable person and a loving man. He adored his dog Roxi. Wait had held an event to raise funds for the Dalmation Rescue of North Texas on his 47th birthday, and after his death, the DRNT placed Roxi with a family in Houston.

Wait was preceded in death by his mother, Patricia VanGorkum Wait. He is survived by his partner of three years, Al Daniels of Dallas; his brothers, Eddie Wait of Phoenix, Ariz., and Dale Wait of Tempe, Ariz.; his close friends, Lee Dickerson of Garland and Jerry Nicholson of Plano.

A celebration of life will be held Saturday, March 30, at 1:30 p.m. at the Cathedral of Hope Interfaith Peace Chapel, 5910 Cedar Springs Road. Wait's ashes will be interred in a niche in the Cathedral of Hope Columbarium.



On the council and enjoying the show

Scott Prescher is the first out person elected to a suburban DFW city council, and the town is cheering for him

cott Prescher is the first out person elected to a suburban city council in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. And he didn't just squeak in; he won in a landslide. In fact, in a four-way race in November, he received more than 50 percent of the vote to avoid runoff.

Since then, Prescher's fellow city council members have shown disdain for the research he does on issues and annoyance at the questions he asks. But his constituents love him.

Attendance at city council meetings went from three or four people before he was elected to an average of 100 so far this year. About 25 people showed up to one meeting just because they heard a

reporter was coming to do a story about Prescher; 150 people total attended the meeting that night.

Of course, not everyone was there because of the publicity. Most were there because they were interested in the issue Prescher was bringing before the council that night — chickens.

Less than two years ago, Prescher and his husband, Cody, moved to Watauga, a small city in northeast Tarrant County, wedged in between North Richland Hills and Haltom City. Last summer, developers proposed a zoning change that would allow apartments to be built inside the city limits of the four-and-a-half-square-mile town.

Apartments that bring heavy traffic isn't why the Preschers moved to Watauga.

"Watauga is a real estate hotspot," Cody explained. "Schools, crime, property trends. Scott drew a map and the zones kept overlapping in Watauga."

So when talk turned to apartment complexes, neighbors met to discuss how to keep them out of their city. Prescher said he doesn't know how he became the leader of the opposition to apartments. After all, when he showed up to the first

meeting, he was the only one in the room who didn't know anyone else there.

"He had all the ideas," one person at Watauga City Hall explained. Another added, "He's a natural leader." "We love Scott," one after another said as everyone crowded around to praise him.

"They're like family," Prescher said about his neighbors. And by that, he's not just being a politician hoping to garner votes. He meant regularly-going-to-their-houses-for-dinner family.

Jan Duncan Weir, who said she met Prescher during the apartment fight, loves him because he took the time to drive to Dallas for a premier of a film she was in. "Scott is a go-getter," she said. "Up front. Dedicated. He prides himself on being ethical."

While Prescher said he has no political dreams beyond city council, Weir said, "I have aspirations for him — much higher aspirations."

One neighbor said she'd lived in Watauga for 28 years, and when Prescher ran she voted in a local election for the first time.

Prescher said he never thought he'd get into politics. As a child, however, his

idea of fun on the weekend was watching *Meet the Press*, and his favorite reading material was the weekly political polls in Newsweek.

Mersedez Berry block walked for Prescher during his campaign. "You can't beat his passion," she said.

And you can't beat the passion of his supporters. Like Berry's mom, Lovey Downey, for example. "Scott woke up the beast in this city," Downey said.

The beast that night was chickens. Watauga has zoning against residents raising chickens. Prescher heard from residents that wanted to be allowed to keep them.

So he did what he always does — he did his research. He read ordinances from cities around the area. He called an agricultural extension agent from Texas A&M, who helped Farmers Branch work out their comprehensive chicken ordinance. He spoke to veterinarians. He talked to people in other cities that keep chickens.

Then he wrote his new ordinance. Some of the provisions included a requirement to keep at least three and no

vices of Dallas, Big Brothers Big Sisters Lone Star, Cathedral of Hope, Celebration Community Church, Equality Texas Foundation, Lambda Legal, Legacy Counseling Center, Northaven United Methodist Church, Promise House, Rainbow Roundup, Resource Center, Trans Kids & Families of Texas, Turtle Creek Chorale and Uptown Players.

New to the beneficiary list this year is Planned Parenthood of Greater Texas.

Black Tie Dinner also officially unveiled the theme for its 2019 Dinner: "Be."

Co-chair Jeremy Hawpe noted, "We chose this year's theme for a few reasons. One, it's an acknowledgment that for members of our community, sometimes just 'being' yourself is an act of bravery and inspiration.

"'Be' also gives us an opportunity to build on that idea throughout the year and provide a call to action to our supporters and community to be supportive, to be welcoming and to be involved as we continue to push for equal rights and equal dignity for the LGBTQ community," he added.

Black Tie officials will be announcing more details in the months to come, including award winners, special guests, speakers and more.

more than six, because chickens are social animals and may become aggressive if they live alone. They require a certain minimum amount of space, and they must be properly housed and need to be protected from other wild animals getting into their coops.

Prescher's proposed chicken ordinance would require a fee and a training class on taking care of the birds that he arranged to be taught by a woman from Watauga with a degree in zoology. And she'd teach others to teach the class so it would cost the city nothing.

So Prescher and his chicken supporters packed City Hall the night of the vote. Debate ensued. Other council members repeatedly asked questions he had already answered.

At one point, Prescher said to them, "I don't know how to communicate with you people. Do I need to use props?"

Apparently he did need to use something because the ordinance failed and his supporters were furious.

In a tweet, one Watauga resident wrote, "So we got this new city council

member in our little town, and he's trolling the city when they impose stupid rules, and fighting for the right to raise backyard chickens. I really don't want to like politicians but this guy is making it hard."

Another fight was over a boarding house a megachurch in town wanted to build. Opponents of the zoning change to allow the boarding house said it skirted ordinances about leasing property and would add unwanted traffic in the neighborhood.

This fight was different than the apartment fight. Prescher was on the council now, and he made sure the item was posted on the agenda with plenty of notice. He said that didn't help him make friends with supporters of the church on the council. And it may have contributed to the demise of his chicken ordinance.

And, in the upcoming election, to the end of their own political careers.

So how does Prescher live a very out life in a very small town?

"They aren't OK that I'm gay, but I'm authentic about our life," he speculated.

Prescher makes no bones about being

"Cody and I hold hands in the neighborhood," he said. "I don't care. What are they going to do?"

But he really does care. He explained that when he was 16, growing up in the town of Clifton, northwest of Waco, he almost killed himself. He typed up a will and a goodbye letter.

"It makes me cry to even type about it now," he said in a text message explaining the incident.

He placed a bag over his head with a rubber band around his neck, because he did not want the bag to fall off. At the last minute he changed his mind and pulled the bag off before passing out.

"It was two years before I ever told anyone I did that — and the first person I told was my mom when I came out to her when I was 18," he said.

Since then, he feels responsible for preventing other LGBT teens from feeling they needed to end their lives.

"As a gay person, you have a huge responsibility to be yourself all the time,"

he said. "You never know when you're going to have a 14-year-old see you, and that saves his life."

Prescher is responsible for some procedural changes at council meetings as well. Citizen input used to be at the beginning of a meeting, then voting on the issues they addressed came at the end of the meeting — usually after most people had left. Now residents may speak on an issue just prior to any votes on that

For these and other similar offenses, the council will be discussing Prescher's ethical violations at its April 8 council meeting. Prescher said he's looking forward to attacking their lies with actual evidence.

He invited anyone who'd like to enjoy the show to join him at City Hall that night. "Sit in the back with Cody," he said. "He is bringing the popcorn for the show."

And he's looking forward to election day in May, where he's supporting a slate of candidates that includes none of the incumbents.

History on the move

20 truckloads of exhibits arrive and installation begins at new Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum

hen Dallas Holocaust Museum opens in its new location across the street from its current location in the West End — on Sept. 17, it will become known as the Dallas Holocaust and Human Right Mu-

Museum Board Chair Frank Risch said the new museum will include exhibits on 10 major genocides in addition to the Holocaust. The human rights part of the galleries will focus on slavery, child labor, women's rights, LGBT rights and more.

Genocides from around the world will be covered by exhibits, including Stalin taking food from the Ukraine so Russians could eat while Ukrainians starved to death and the U.S. government wiping out an American Indian tribe in South Texas.

The goal of teaching about the Holocaust and other genocides is to wipe out hate, Risch explained.

"You only need to know five [Dallas police] officers were shot and killed a few blocks from [the museum's new location] to understand the hate," he said. "Take lessons we've learned — or not learned — and apply them to what's going on today."

One new focus for the museum will be a presentation on the Nuremburg trials. Risch said those trials were the first time in history that war criminals were brought to trial rather than simply being declared guilty and executed. The lasting effect was the beginning of what we understand as international law.

The new museum is the third location for the Holocaust Museum, which began in 1984 in the basement of the Jewish



Community Center in North Dallas. At the time, it was one of the first Holocaust museums in the country.

In 2005, the museum was renamed Dallas Holocaust Museum/Center for Education & Tolerance and was moved into an old warehouse building across the street from the old Dallas Schoolbook Depository in the West End.


The current museum has only 6,000 square feet of exhibit space. Because of limited space, the exhibit concentrated on three events that took place during the Holocaust on one day - April 19,

1943. Using many artifacts and pictures from Dallas residents who survived the Holocaust, the current museum tells the story of the day the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising began, the attack on a transport train from Belgium and the Bermuda Conference where world leaders met and decided to play golf rather hold the planned talks on the Holocaust.

Most of the exhibits in the new 55,000-square-foot museum are new, and they began arriving by truck this week. One centerpiece of the new museum will be a floor-to-ceiling replica of

One major exhibit that has been with the museum since it opened in 1984 a Belgian boxcar — has already been moved to the new building.

The boxcar was built in Germany and given to Belgium as reparations after World War I. The Dallas Holocaust Museum was the first museum in the U.S. to have a Nazi transport boxcar in its collection.

To fit in its original space, part of the boxcar was disassembled. In that space, all visitors entered the museum by walking through the train.

The boxcar was reconfigured in the

current museum. As DART passed by right outside the creaky old building, the sound of the modern light rail cars gave an eerie impression of the sound of trains in motion, transporting people to their deaths in the concentration camps, as visitors walked through.

Now, the boxcar has been moved into place on the third floor of the new museum and is currently being restored to its original size. Holocaust Museum President and CEO Mary Pat Higgins said pieces of the train that weren't used in the original exhibit have been in storage.

"It's like putting together a jigsaw puzzle," she said of the reconstruction effort.

But some of the original pieces were missing. So the restorer found a hundred-year-old barn made of wood of the same vintage as the boxcar. Planks from that barn are being used to fill in gaps where original pieces were missing.

The new museum's focus on human rights will include exhibits on LGBT equality, and Higgins said special programming will include LGBT topics. She said she hopes Jim Obergefell, one of the plaintiffs in the Supreme Court case that resulted in marriage equality, and plaintiffs in the Texas marriage equality lawsuit would be available for one of those presentations.

The partnership between the museum and the local LGBT community goes back almost a decade to when members of Westboro Baptist Church came to Dallas to picket both the museum and Congregation Beth El Binah, Dallas' primarily LGBT Jewish congregation.

While staff at the museum were quite apprehensive about the visit and warned Holocaust survivors in Dallas to avoid the area that day, the mostly LGBT synagogue took the visit as a challenge. They rallied about 200 counter-protestors that showed up outside the museum with a variety of signs bearing stupid slogans to counter the bigoted signs from the right-wing religious group from Kansas.

Westboro's protesters stayed about 15 minutes. The museum gained more new




Museum CEO Mary Pat Higgins stands in the boxcar explaining its restoration. (David Taffet/Dallas Voice)

members on that day than they had ever before signed up in one day, as the line to get into the museum wrapped around the building after Westboro left.

The museum and Beth El Binah later joined forces again to bring in a traveling exhibition created by the U.S. Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C. entitled "Nazi Persecution of Homosexuals 1933-1945."

Higgins said she was delighted with the change removing "tolerance" from the museum's name, because she believes we can do better than simply tolerating each other. With the new museum's focus on human rights, Higgins said she hopes the partnership between the LGBT community and the new museum will grow.





LGBT are making use of subscription sex work services to supplement their incomes, and sometimes as their only means of income

n the state of Texas, there are no laws to protect LGBT people from workplace discrimination. That means it is not illegal for an employer to fire an employee simply for being gay, queer or trans. With the • future of LGBT rights uncertain in our nation's current political climate, having something to fall back on in the event of a firing is essential.

Across generations, the phrase "sex work" has become more broad, and by way of modern technology, receiving money for sex acts has seemingly become easier. That means for some people, sex work has become their "something to fall back on."

Ric, who is gay, is an avid user of Just

For Fans, a subscription service that allows people to share sexually explicit videos and charge a fee. He said he "started doing porn in my freshman year of college as a way to make easy money. I feel that I've done well for myself. I have enough subscribers [now] to quit my job, although I never did end up leaving my day job."

Ric believes that even though sex work is still stigmatized, younger generations are becoming more accepting and supportive of such work.

"Being a sex worker is not something to be ashamed of," Ric said. "I feel that, on one hand, the older generations have viewed sex workers as taboo for a long time. But on the other hand, as the younger generations find their voice in the world, I've seen that sexuality is more openly spoken about with a positive view."

Tyler uses OnlyFans, a service similar to Just For Fans, to share homemade videos he makes with his partner, Wes. Although Tyler has a day job and mainly uses the video sharing service for an "exhibitionist thrill," he said he is aware that sex work is some people's only means of making a living.

"I've followed some [sex workers] on Twitter who felt they needed to defend themselves for making money off of their sex work," Tyler said, adding that it



is not easy work. "It takes some training to put yourself in a mindset to stay excited while you are trying to find a good camera angle or just that hot moment.

"I've come to appreciate those who are truly professionals and can keep the interest going for well over 30 minutes," he added. "Those really are performers."

Cate, a trans woman who is also an advocate for sex worker rights, said she believes that all forms of sex work between consenting adults should be destigmatized and decriminalized.

"Every facet of comfort that most people use — whether it be religion, the media or our own government — tells us that sex work is abominable," Cate said. "It's really no one's business what a woman decides to use her body for.

"Most sex workers I've talked to deal with middle aged men, typically divorcees looking for some solace in the company of another woman; someone who will listen and smile and laugh at their stupid jokes," she added. "The stigma is an ancient misconception."

Although Cate personally has never engaged in sex work, she said she is invested in helping create a safe landscape for sex workers.

"[Sex work] should have the right to be recognized as a legitimate institution," Cate said. "There is such a lack of oversight in places where sex work is illegal that it's hard to imagine feeling safe in that position.

"Sex workers are not just 'loose women' or 'frilly queers.' They are therapists, healers, and most of all, people like you and me trying to pay their utilities in a broken economy."

With the 2020 election drawing ever closer, sex work is becoming a hot-button issue. While many Democrats have announced their candidacy, only Kamala Harris and Tulsi Gabbard have been vocal on their stances on decriminalizing sex work. Truthfully, advocates say, it would behoove people of all races, genders and orientations to support the decriminalization of sex work, especially the LGBT community. Because being a sex worker isn't easy, and oftentimes, members of the LGBT people are using sex work to make for the income they lose by not being able to find a job or because they were unjustly fired because the are LGBT.

As society becomes more accepting of sexuality, it's not unlikely that future generations will think of sex work as a valid line of work, and the LGBT community can get ahead of the curve by working to protect sex workers and affording them the respect professionals in any other line of work get.





House passes resolution condemning Trump's trans military ban

he U.S. House of Representatives on Thursday, March 28, passed a resolution condemning Trump's efforts to ban openly-transgender men and and women from serving in the U.S. military. The vote was 238-185, with every House Democrat and five House Republicans voting in favor of the resolution. Texan Will Hurd was one of the five Republicans.

Rep. Joe Kennedy III, D-Mass., led the effort to pass the resolution. He chairs the Equality Caucus' Transgender Equality Task Force.

The vote came just two days after a federal court lifted an injunction barring implementation of the ban. President Barack Obama had lifted the ban before he left office, but Trump re-instated the ban in the first year of his presidency. Trump's administration had announced that men and women enlisting in the military would have to serve as the gender they were assigned at birth.

Officials at the Department of Defense announced earlier this year that the ban will go into effect on April 12.

Transgender advocates praised the vote while acknowledging that it is not a


binding vote and is unlikely to see any action in the U.S. Senate.

The top three LGBTQ military organizations in the U.S. — the American Military Partner Association, OutServe-SLDN and SPARTA — issued a joint press applauding passage of the resolu-

AMPA President Ash-Broadway-Mack said the vote on the resolution "sends a powerful message to our transgender service members and their families that the United States House Representatives

stands with them in the face of this administration's unconscionable discrimination."

OutServe-SLDN Executive Director Andy Blevins described openly-trans servicemembers as "selfless patriots, who happen to be transgender," saying they have "proven time and again that





Intersex activist Pidgeon Pagonis to speak at 9th annual Louisiana **Queer Conference**

hicago-based tersex activist Pidgeon Pagonis will be keynote speaker for the ninth annual Louisiana Queer Conference weekend at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, La. The conference begins at 8 a.m. and runs through 5 p.m. at the university's Business Education Complex.

Pagonis works with the interACT Advocates for Intersex Youth, produces informational videos and writes for the blog Everyday Feminism. They appeared on the cover of National Geographic's "Gender Revolution" special issue in January 2017 and were honored by the Obama administration in 2015 as an LGBT Champion of Change.

The Louisiana Queer Conference is a free, statewide, student-run event that aims to provide networking opportunities, education and social support to queer people and their allies. It provides an annual venue for individuals to discuss ideas and collaborate on projects while building a statewide network to advance the LGBTQ+ movement.

The conference schedule includes pan-

els, workshops, a keynote speaker, a resource fair and free lunch for attendees.

Conference organizers chose Pagonis as keynote to represent one of many possible queer identities and educate attendees on an identity outside of the typical "LGBT." The conference will host discussions geared toward and about people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, asexual, intersex and more.

interACT defines intersex as "an umbrella term that refers to people who have one or more of a range of variations in sex characteristics that fall outside of traditional conceptions of male or female bodies."

Both interACT and Pagonis aim to promote awareness of intersex people and protect intersex youth from medically unnecessary surgeries. Pagonis is intersex, and uses the pronouns "they" and "them" to reflect the fact that they were born neither male nor female.

Besides discussing ending intersex surgeries on children, the conference will tackle issues like sex education in Louisiana, the history of HIV/AIDS and the Lafayette Drag Queen Story Time case. About 250 people from across Louisiana and the Deep South are expected to participate.

he second UNT College of Law legal clinic created in conjunction with Resource Center will focus on wills, estate planning, power of attorney, medical directives and transfer on death deeds. An earlier clinic focused on name and gender marker changes for the trans communi-

Resource Center Communications and Advocacy Manager Rafael McDonnell said anyone can participate, and many should. While the Obergefell marriage equality decision gave couples who marry certain rights to inheritance they didn't have before, wills are still a good idea. Couples who are not married

are still particularly vulnerable when it comes to inheritance.

Angela Downes, assistant director of experiential education at UNT's downtown Dallas law school, will do a presentation. She'll then refer participants to third-year law students for those who qualify based on financial need. Others will be referred to local LGBT attorneys that will assist either with a free or reduced rate consultation.

McDonnell said he hopes to schedule several more legal clinics in conjunction with UNT's law school through the year. Each session will focus on one particular legal need.

Eventually, McDonnell said, he would like the legal clinic to be something offered as a regular Resource Center service, with students supervised by law





Texas Digital Libraries recognizes the LGBT history group's oral history project and Instagram account

he Dallas Way will receive Texas Digital Libraries Outreach Award on May 21 in Austin. Nino Testa, secretary and board member of The Dallas Way, submitted the application highlighting the group's Instagram account that promotes the history collection and its oral

But applying for an award from Texas Digital Libraries wasn't Testa's idea.

history project.

"They reached out to us," he said. "They said we should consider choosing a category and applying for an award.

Founded in 2011, The Dallas Way collects, organizes, stores and presents the history of the LGBT community in Dallas. The collection of photos, stories, audio, video and artifacts is maintained at University of North Texas in Denton, and digitized pieces are stored on the school's Portal to Texas History, which can be found at TexasHistory.unt.edu.

In addition to items The Dallas Way has collected, Resource Center donated its Phil Johnson Collection and Dallas Voice donated its archives. Together, these pieces make up UNT's North Texas LGBT Collection.

Texas Digital Libraries is a consortium of Texas higher education institutions that provides online space for preserving, managing and providing access to digital collections of enduring value.

Dreanna Beldon, assistant dean for external relations at the UNT libraries, said UNT is a member of Texas Digital Libraries. But UNT has such a massive collection itself, she said, most of the information is kept on its own system.

In his application for the Outreach Award, Testa wrote about two projects of The Dallas Way including the Instagram page Testa started to help create interest



in the collection.

"That way people can easily see what's in the collection," he said.

Testa said he encourages people to look at the pictures on the Instagram page as well as in the LGBT collection on the UNT site. Many photos are without captions or without the subjects identified. Adding a comment or identifying people in photos helps UNT archivists better identify and classify the photo, he

Testa said he got the idea of using Instagram by following some similar archival accounts.

"We have more than 2,000 followers who like, share and comment on our content," Testa wrote in the application.

Texas Digital Libraries is also honoring The Dallas Way for its new oral history project. In addition to its Outrageous Oral program, the group is now recording longer oral histories of community leaders that are being archived on the UNT portal.

Several Outrageous Oral programs are staged each year. Usually three sto-





The implausible success of Pete Buttigieg's campaign

penly-gay Democratic presidencandidate Buttigieg has leapt into surprisingly strong position in the latest poll of Iowa Demo-

cratic caucus-goers: Third place, right behind former Vice President Joe Biden (in first with 25 percent) and U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders (in second with 24 percent).

Buttigieg (pronounced "buddha judge"), the mayor of South Bend, Ind., came in third with 11 percent, followed by U.S. Sens. Kamala Harris (10 percent) and Elizabeth Warren (nine percent).

The news, though based on a relatively small sampling, marks an astonishing milestone for an openly-gay candidate for the presidential nomination of one of the two major parties. Only one other openly gay person has ever tried to run for a major party presidential nomination — Fred Karger, who ran for the Republican nomination in 2012. Karger beat eventual nominee Mitt Romney in one New Hampshire college straw poll, but he never made it onto a nationally-televised debate stage, and he appeared on the primary ballot in only six

Buttigieg's bid for the Democratic presidential nomination has fared much better, so far. He's been the subject of many mainstream media profiles and opinion pieces. The New York Times said Buttigieg has "generated more buzz" than New York City's well-known Mayor Bill de Blasio," who is also running for the Democratic presidential nomination, and the Washington Post said he's drawn "enthusiastic crowds of hundreds" in South Carolina.

Buttigieg has appeared on numerous nationally-broadcast political programs, including a one-hour CNN Town Hall on March 10. His performance at that event prompted former President Obama's chief campaign strategist, David Axelrod, to post on Twitter, "I have rarely seen a candidate make better use of televised Town Hall than [Buttigieg] is on [CNN].... Crisp, thoughtful and relatable. He'll be a little less of a long shot tomorrow."

Fighting for the national stage

There's another nationally-televised stage serious candidates want to be on: the Democratic presidential primary debates. The first one is in June, and the party wants to limit the number of candidates on stage to 20, possibly spread over two different nights. To be included on the stage for the debates, a candidate must, in the next three months, achieve support of at least 1 percent of respondents in at least three national polls approved by the Democratic National Committee.

Buttigieg's gotten two: Fox News's poll of 403 Democratic primary and caucus voters March 17-20 (margin of error plus-or-minus 5); and CNN's poll of 456 Democrats and Democratic-leaning independents March 14-17 (margin of error plus-or-minus 5.7). In both, he got 1 percent.

In the Fox poll, he did as well as Sen. Amy Klobuchar. In the CNN poll, he did as well as Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand. (At the top of both heaps was former Vice President Joe Biden and Sen. Bernie Sanders.)

Though it is not a national poll, a poll by Emerson College of 249 Iowa Democratic caucus-goers between March 21 and 24 found Buttigieg in third place, with 11 percent their support. (The margin of error was plus-or-minus 6.2 points.)

Emerson Poll Director Spencer Kimball called Buttigieg's third-place finish "the biggest surprise" of the poll, noting that "last week we saw him inching up in our national poll, and now he's in double digits in Iowa."



Buttigieg was a zero when Emerson polled caucus-goers in January.

More than 200 people have notified the Federal Election Commission of their intention to seek the Democratic nomination. Pollsters cannot survey the public about all 200 candidates, so they have to choose which candidates' names to include in their surveys and which to leave off.

This year, the Democratic National Committee said it would use an additional gauge to determine who reaches the debate stage: those candidates who report getting contributions from 65,000 people, from at least 20 different states and with a minimum of 200 donors per state.

Buttigieg said on Twitter on March 16 that his campaign has received contributions from more than 76,000 individuals. And campaign spokeswoman Lis Smith told CNN the campaign has raised at least \$1.6 million since the CNN Town Hall.

But the Democratic Party plans for the debates also noted that, if more than 20 candidates meet just one criterion, the DNC will pare down the number to those candidates who meet both criteria. And if there are still too many candidates, the debate slots will go to the qualifiers with the highest polling averages.

So, even if Buttigieg gets 1 percent in a third poll and has 76,000 donors, he could potentially be barred from the stage. But his unusually successful campaign to get the media's attention thus far could well put him among the highest polling candidates come June.

Meanwhile, March 31 is the next deadline for presidential candidates to report to the Federal Elections Commission how much money they have raised for their campaigns. Many media organizations will use those dollar figures to assess how much traction each candidate is getting.



the opportunity to meet unbiased standards and then succeed or fail based on our own merits. The moral arc of our military and our nation must continue to bend towards justice and opportunity for all who are qualified, capable"

Dremann said that while trans people and advocates are "filled with sorrow as the military we love takes steps to discriminate against transgender servicemembers," the vote in the House offers a sign of hope: "Today we watched the U.S. House of Representatives recognize the value of a diverse military which attracts and retains the best and brightest our country has to offer, including brave transgender Americans. We are hopeful that a similar effort will be shown by the U.S. Senate to recognize those same contributions and that once again transgender people are able to wear the sacred cloth of our Nation, receive medically necessary care, and be in position to continue their distinguished service as proud, proficient warfighters."

The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and Lambda Legal also issued statements praising the House's vote on the resolution.

"Trump claims to value our military

but treats it with disregard and contempt," said Leadership Conference President and CEO Vanita Gupta. "From diverting military funding, to supporting his vanity wall project, to banning brave and patriotic transgender Americans from serving, his actions speak louder than his words. The transgender military service ban not only undermines military readiness and national security, it is a violation of fundamental American values of fairness and equality. We applaud the House for speaking out and urge Trump to support all qualified individuals who volunteer to serve in our armed forces."

Sharon McGowan, legal director and chief strategy officer of Lambda Legal, said, "We are so happy to see the ... House pass a resolution strongly rebuking the Trump administration's ban on transgender service members with bipartisan support. This important resolution is a helpful step towards showing President Trump that the public overwhelmingly opposes his discriminatory ban, which not only hurts our fellow Americans, but also our national security. ... We urge the Senate to take up a similar resolution immediately" ■

rytellers detail an event in Dallas LGBT history. For example, Mica England, who sued the Dallas Police Department to change its hiring policies to include LGBT recruits, returned to Dallas to tell her story at an Outrageous Oral presentation last year.

Now, volunteers are recording longer interviews of people throughout the community to compile more of the community's history.

"We are training 20 volunteers to conduct oral history interviews so that we can make even more progress on our long list of intended interviews with a wide range of LGBTQ people who have lived in Dallas," Testa wrote in his nomination letter.

He said the hope is for community members to see themselves as instruments of historical preservation.

After the first training session, which was held at Cathedral of Hope, interviewers recorded conversations with a number of people who had been part of the church for a number of years. Now, any papers and photos from the church are supplemented by a much fuller oral

The Dallas Way President DeAn Roper said she was honored for Dallas Way to have been chosen from among all of the nominees from around the state.

"We're honored to be recognized for the important work of collecting, preserving and presenting our history for the LGBT community," Roper said. "This level of recognition is great for our mission and brings more attention to our work."

She said she was glad to be honored this year in particular, because it is the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall rebellion. Women who have been active in the LGBT community will be recognized in an exhibit that will be mounted in June for Pride Month at Dallas City Hall.

The implausibility and the difference

To some extent, Buttigieg's success in getting media attention — and thereby the attention of the public — is due to his being gay. He is — apparently — the only openly-gay candidate among more than 600 people who have filed notice of wanting to run, either as a Republican, a Democrat, with another party or as an independent candidate. Nowadays, almost everything gay gets attention from the mainstream media and, for a candidate who was virtually unknown three months ago, such attention generates more attention.

But Buttigieg's success so far seems to be fueled by his very serious, very intelligent and very down-home likeable personality. When MSNBC's *Morning Joe* asked him to "tell us about your faith," he noted that he's Episcopalian, that his church takes seriously its role in the urban community of South Bend, and that he thinks candidates should "have the option to talk about our faith.

"Don't get me wrong: I believe strongly in the separation of church and state. I think any [candidate] needs to demonstrate how they will represent people of any faith, people of no faith, "Buttigieg said. "But I also think the time has come to reclaim faith as a theme. The idea that the only way a religious person could enter politics is through the prism of the religious right — I just don't think that makes sense."

Buttigieg said he thinks it is time for "more of a religious left to emerge in our country."

At the CNN Town Hall on March 10, nationally televised from Austin, the first question out of the chute from the audience was why Buttigieg thinks he is qualified to run the country when he's not held elective office at even the state or congressional district level. Buttigieg has been asked that many times, and his answer is consistent: being a mayor of a city of any size is the "best kind of preparation you can have." And, he noted, "I have more years of government experience under my belt than the president," "more years of executive government experience under my belt than the vice president," and "more military experience than anybody to walk into that office on Day One than since George H.W. Bush."

Buttigieg was the first Democratic candidate to appear on Fox News Sunday with Chris Wallace. There, he said "I'm not like the others," noting his age (37) and generation, being from the Midwest, and having served in the military. When prompted to say another Democratic candidate was "wrong" about an issue, he said, instead, "I'd do it differently."

In each venue, Buttigieg has moved easily through a wide range of topics — from job security and training, income supplements, Venezuela's political unrest, and transitioning veterans into civilian life to the power of businesses to grow the economy, the war in Afghanistan and whether Congress should regulate Facebook and impeach President Trump.

(On the latter, he said he would prefer voters remove Trump from office.)

Buttigieg neither avoids nor insists on acknowledging his sexual orientation and makes a point to introduce his spouse, Chasten, to most audiences, though most moderators find a way to broach the subject.

And then there is his biography, detailed in *The Shortest Way Home* (W.W. Norton): He is a veteran of the war in Afghanistan, a Rhodes scholar to the University of Oxford, a business analyst for a global management consulting firm and a popular mayor of South Bend, Indiana's fourth-largest city.

"Why are you in such a hurry?" asked Fox's Wallace near the end of his March 17 interview, which — oddly — did not once bring up Buttigieg's sexual orientation. "Why not wait a few years, get more experience, build a bigger record, get better known and run for president at, say, the ripe old age of 41?"

Buttigieg said he has taken into consideration both "the moment" in American history, "what is called for" in this moment, and "what I bring to the table."

"I see it as a very unusual moment. Look, it's unusual for it to be even plausible that a 37-year-old Midwestern mayor is giving national interviews for a possible candidacy for president," said Buttigieg. "But there's something that's happening right now that calls for something completely different than what we've been seeing — generationally different, regionally different, somebody with a different story and a different background."

demand of their items as soon as they hit runways. Nowadays, you see brands doing live streams and instantly making their collections available online to anyone in the world, literally minutes after they present! The consumer is changing every day, and the best way for the fashion industry to keep up is through e-commerce.

The Mavs Fan? They see an image of Luka Dončić on Instagram with the new City Edition Jersey, and they immediately want to purchase it. Now, they can seamlessly tap the Instagram image and instantly add it to their shopping cart. It is my job to make that happen.

Tell me about what it's like working for the Dallas Mavericks? How does the organization support its employees, especially its LGBT employees? Working for the Dallas Mavericks is such enjoyable experience! There's definitely a sense of excitement to work for a sports organization. Every day calls for new projects and different tasks for me to do. My team and I work hard, and it is incredibly rewarding to see the end results of our efforts.

However, to be completely honest, I was a little skeptical to work for a sports organization when I first interviewed for my current position. You watch the news, and you see players being bashed by fans of their respective teams, and even being downgraded by people in their leagues, all just for being LGBTQ. Even after I got hired, I was a little nervous to see how I would fit in as a gay man in an industry with a culture that I am not familiar with.

But the Dallas Mavericks have proven to stand out in the sports world. Within my first month, I participated in a "Respect in the Workplace" training, required of all new hires in the company. In one part of the training, we were all asked to work in small groups to discuss a list of work scenarios in provided hand-outs, and how we would - and should - react to them.

The scenarios brought out moments in the work environment that a lot of people might not see as problematic or might not take action against. These include the derogative treatment of women and minorities, PDA, disrespect of others' religious practices and - what stood out to me — homophobia.

It was then that I realized that The Mavs as an organization, and the NBA as a whole, finds it meaningful to shine light on these issues, and it showed why it is important to make them a part of our everyday conversations.

On top of that, The Mavs have Employee Re-

source Groups, and theme and celebration nights dedicated to minorities (Pride Night, Los Mavs, African-American Heritage) and make efforts to bring all communities together for their love of sports.

All these qualities make working for The Mavs a safe, enjoyable and rewarding experience.

Oh! And did I mention that we are the only professional sports organization in Dallas to participate in the Pride Parade? You can't get any more supportive than that!

How do you advocate for inclusivity? What are some of the organizations/ events you are involved in? I think the biggest way that you can advocate on inclusivity is through your everyday life and the people who you interact with every single day, even expressing it through the work that you do. One way that I do is through our DallasMavs.Shop social media. We did a couple of photoshoots in the beginning of the season to create content to use throughout the year. Under the direction of my boss, Alison Panasik, vice president of Brand Identity and Merchandising for the Mavs, the merch team plans and merchandises what items we are going to shoot as well as where it takes place and who will wear them.

Our social media is on fire, and we are inspired to cast an even broader group of people for our future shoots!

On top of that, when working with local vendors, the merchandising team puts a heavy focus on business owners in one of our five protected categories, including owners with disabilities, women-owned, minority-owned, veterans, and LGBTQ. That alone gives me motivation for the organization that I work for; they hold these values that I deem incredibly important.

What else do you want people to know about you or about the Dallas Mavericks? To me, it is incredibly important and meaningful to work for an organization that holds the same morals and values that I do, and to be in a place where I can be my genuine self while feeling safe and appreciated. The Dallas Mavericks are just that, and I couldn't be happier to work here. I know my future here looks very bright, and I'm very excited to see what is to come. 'Undetectable' equals unconstitutional legal requirement

ndetectable equals untransmittable." This has been the anthem of independent HIV activists and the brave researchers behind an international movement. But what does that catchy phrase mean?

U=U means that someone on HIV treatment living with an undetectable viral load will not transmit the virus to a sexual partner — even in the absence of other prevention measures, including PrEP or condoms.

It's a campaign and movement, first started by Bruce Richman with Prevention Access Campaign, supported by nearly 800 organizations in 100 countries, and it is championed by government agencies and researchers at the National Institutes of Health, Centers for Disease Control and the Department of

that I must unfairly disclose my HIV status since I am undetectable. What it does justify is my belief that consensual sexual activity between two adults is a matter best kept out of court and maintained in the privacy of the bedroom between those two individuals.

Will I disclose? Of course. I am someone that shares too much anyways.

Should I be held to a legal requirement for that disclosure to happen? I say no. And I think I have the Constitution as my defense.

Sex is an activity that bears equal responsibility on both parties to equally share risk. U=U is life-changing because it is interrupting HIV stigma in our lives. It's time that U=U interrupts my biggest fear — that some crazed person accuses me of not disclosing, and I have to face a

Naturally, as someone living with HIV, this scientific fact has even deeper implications to me besides just the epic news that I am incapable of transmitting HIV to a sexual partner. Why then, must I still disclose that I am living with undetectable HIV to a sexual partner?

Before you attack me about how unethical it is not to disclose, let me ask: Is it really ethical to require me to disclose something that will have absolutely no impact or effect on a sexual partner? I'd argue it is not ethical.

In Tennessee, it's a requirement of law that I disclose my HIV diagnosis or face business. I suspect some people will begin to question if I really know that I am undetectable, and I'm guessing those same people would trust someone who claims they are negative without giving it a second thought.

I suspect that the 30-plus years of HIV stigma may lead people to not believe every leading expert in the world on HIV transmission and instead rely on their own misinformed opinion. I also believe that some may even use scare tactics to try and continue to marginalize those living with HIV.


None of this justifies, in my opinion, the now over-reaching requirement jury, despite being innocent and despite it being impossible for me to transmit since I am undetectable, and then having to put the next 15 years of my life in 12 peoples' hands.

h, the 1970s, when disco was still king, bell-bottoms were considered cool and nobody had heard of a mobile telephone. Some might say the fashion, the music, the politics, the whole culture was a disaster... which may explain

why disaster films — starting with 1970's Airport (hijacker) and continuing through The Poseidon Ad-

venture (tidal wave), The Towering Inferno (fire), Earthquake, The Swarm, Meteor, When Time Ran Out (volcano) and a host of other films dominated at the box office. They were our superhero movies, all-star extravaganzas that, as cheesily enjoyable as they were at the time, haven't exactly held up.

Except in Seth Rudetsky and Jack Plotnick's musical *Disaster!*, now onstage at the Kalita courtesy of Uptown Players, which does send-up with spectacular success.

All the tropes are there: The builder (Greg Hullett) who cut corners on safety; the scientist (Josh Bangle) who rings the alarm of danger as man disregards nature's warning signs; the couple (Linda Leonard, Randy Pearlman) finally ready to retire; the famous singer (Chimberley Carter Byrom) who's

secretly on the skids; the single mom (Cara Statham Serber) who's hooked up with the wrong guy. Rather than feeling like bad ideas

conspiring together, though, Disaster is a potluck stew, seasoned perfectly.

Like all great spoofs, the comedy works best when everyone in the cast realizes that overacting is all but impossible, and holding a straight face in the presence of insanity only makes the laughs harder. Kyle Igneczi leads the way on that score as the horny but heroic Kyle Rubik, a player who still carries a torch for the woman who ditched him at the altar (Alyssa Cavazos). Leonard,

almost unrecognizable under a frumpy wig, gets to twitch and thrust and tap-dance her way through fatal symptoms as a woman possessed. Nevertheless, her duet with Pearlman to the bubbly hit "Still the One" ends up being both campy and touching.

But even they can't hold a candle to the explosive dynamite of Laura Lites and Quin Solley. Lites, as repressed nun Sister Mary Downy finds herself tempted by the allure of gambling — a temptation to which she eventually succumbs. Lites gyrates and writhes against a slot machine to the strains of "Never Can Say Goodbye," mugging with such total abandon that the audience burst into a frenzy on opening night. Solley plays 9-year-old Ben and his twin sister Lisa with little more than the addition of a baseball cap with braids, yet there's so much more to the performance than it sounds. Solley toggles between the characters even when a rag doll onstage serves as a placeholder for the other twin. If Lites is channeling Carol Burnett, Solley's muse is Tim Conway.

The fake doll is only one of the sly jabs at the ridiculousness of it all that really helps sell *Disaster* as parody and not just a poorly-executed jukebox musical. It is precisely the things that don't go right that make the whole thing work. Director B.J. Cleveland hits all the bits head-on, not missing a single visual gag or cliche that can be turned upside down. Yet within the construct of the show, he also delivers a slick production, with energetic and engaging choreography by Trevor Wright.

And of course there are the songs
— wonderful/awful hits shoehorned
brilliantly into the plot, among them
Donna Summer's "Hot Stuff," "Saturday Night," "Sky High," "Three Times
a Lady" and (as an old K-Tel ad might
have promised) many, many more.
You'll be toe-tapping with nostalgia...
or perhaps realizing that when it comes
to disasters, the '70s were nothing compared to today.




SOLUNA FESTIVAL RETURNS

Milk' and 'Sugar'

2 books to quench your reading needs

Sugar Run by Mesha Maren (Algonquin Books of Chapel Hill 2019) \$26.95; 320 pp.

She'd been told she'd spend decades behind bars. But there she was, ready to leave after only 18 years inside Jaxton Prison, a ticket in her hand and \$400 borrowed from her brothers. Jodi McCarty was going home to West Virginia.

But first, she had to find Ricky. He was in Georgia, and she had time.

Ricky was the brother of Paula — Jodi's lover and the woman she killed. It had always been Paula's dream to get him far away from their abusive father. Jodi knew that was something she had to do now, so she headed to Chaunce-

loraine before re-starting her life on her grandmother's farm. And in her search for Ricky, Jodi found Miranda.

When Miranda left her husband, she really only wanted attention but she got a surprise instead: He took their three boys and left her with no money. With no home, she was staying at the rundown motel near where Jodi had landed. Half-drunk one night, she ended up in Jodi's room — and stayed.

Days before her first meeting with a parole officer in West Virginia, Jodi gathand the boys she'd helped steal back, and she headed home, having talked Ricky into leaving with her. Jodi loved Miranda.

and the cabin where she'd grown up was a good place to raise kids. It was in rough shape, but it was home.

As it turned out, it was someone else's home: the land was sold for back taxes while Jodi was in prison, and fracking miners were buying up the area. Jodi didn't know what to do and, as the pressure to care for her makeshift little family grew, she realized that she didn't know Ricky or Miranda very well,

With the slam of a door, Sugar Run starts out with a stunned shiver and it sprints. Author Mesha Maren perfectly captures the surrealness of being snatched from an unwanted reality and hurled into one that doesn't make sense. Even if you've only just driven past a prison, you'll know the crush of it.

Back and forth the story goes, as we learn what happened when Jodi was 17. That's a mandatory part of the tale, and it's also, sadly, the cause of some disorientation since things begin to unravel as it's populated with more and more people. Readers are rewarded with a gauzy, delicate ending but the last dozen pages make it tough getting there.

And that's too bad, since there's more overall-positive things to say about this book than not. Try Sugar Run, linger,




and you might love it, but beware: you might also just as soon wish you'd left it

The Children of Harvey Milk: How LGBTQ Politicians Changed the World by Andrew Reynolds (Oxford University Press 2019) \$34.95; 354 pp.

In the latter part of June 1978, Harvey Milk, known to locals as the Mayor of

Castro Street, called former Army nurse Gilbert Baker and asked him to make something special for the upcoming Gay Freedom parade. At that time, the rainbow flag was a rebel flag,



but Baker subsumed it into a symbol of Pride.

By the end of that year, Milk was dead and rainbow flags were still "rare and exotic" ... as were openly-gay politicians. Just a handful of "LGB" people were in office around the world at that time; it would be years before the first openly-trans individual would be elected.

Andrew Reynolds tells their stories, beginning with a battle in New Zealand's Parliament that was narrowly won, followed four years later by a marriage equality victory in nearby Australia. He writes of two gay politicians who squared off in Great Britain, noting that laws against buggery were still on the books when they ran. He tells of a Dutch politician who, by mere months, preceded Harvey Milk as the world's first openly-gay man to serve in office. And he shares a story of politics in Ireland, "the first country in the world to pass gay marriage by popular referendum."

Closer to home, Reynolds writes about Barney Frank, his first political battle for civil rights, and the "undercelebrated" woman who inspired him. Reynolds recalls the beginning of the AIDS crisis, and what it was like to be active in politics then. He writes of trans politicians Sarah McBride and Danica Roem, and the fierce but highly ironic story of Pauli Murray, whose great-aunt's land donation helped



build a university that ultimately denied bathroom access to trans individuals.

If you see *The Children of Harvey Milk* on a shelf somewhere, you may be confused by the title. Reynolds is referring to Milk's spiritual descendants in political office who happen to be gay.

Fully half of Reynolds' book is about politics overseas, and some of it won't make sense unless you've got basic knowledge of how other governments work. Without it, you may not fully ap-

preciate the significance of what you'll read, though Reynolds is a good teacher. Here, readers will easily learn, and what they learn is absolutely inspiring.

For political animals, this book is an easy choice. For the slightly clueless, it's a know-your-history book that doesn't dwell strictly domestically. For a casual reader, it may be challenging but in the end, *The Children of Harvey Milk* could be the most informative book you'll lay eyes on.
