



Reward offered for info on whereabouts of Alan White

There is a \$10,000 reward being offered for information leading to the known whereabouts of James Alan White, a Dallas man who has been missing since early Thursday morning, Oct. 22.

White was last seen around 6 a.m. on Oct. 22, driving out of the LA Fitness City-Place parking lot on Haskell in a 2020 black Porsche Macan with silver wheels, dealer tag 8F4972. He is 5'11" tall and weighs 160 pounds. He was last seen wearing a light gray tank top and dark gym shorts, and carrying a maroon-and-navy two-tone sling

His husband Rusty Jenkins filed a missing person report, #188623-2020, with Dallas police Detective Carrington.

Anyone with information regarding the whereabouts of Alan White is asked to contact the Missing Person Squad at 214-671-4268 and talk to the detective assigned the case.

Nondiscrimination rules reinstated in social workers' code of conduct

The Texas Behavioral Health Executive Council on Tuesday, Oct. 27, voted unanimously to restore protections for LGBTQ and disabled clients to Texas social workers code of conduct. The move came following widespread backlash when, two weeks prior, the council voted to remove those protections at the suggestion of Gov. Greg Abbott's office.

According to a spokesperson from Abbott's office, Abbott had suggested the council remove the protections for LGBTQ and disabled people because those protections are not included in state law. But Will Francis. executive director for the National Association of Social Workers, Texas Chapter, noted immediately after the vote that the change violated the national association's code of conduct and ethics.

Will Redfield's re-open?

It appears that news of Redfield's Tavern's demise last weekend was premature. Even though the name and other exterior signage on the building was painted over and the locks on the doors changed on Saturday, Oct. 24, a message sent to employees on Monday, Oct.27, indicates the

same owners are hoping to re-open, possibly as early as Halloween weekend.

Redfield's, located at 2213 Butler St. in the Medical District, has been closed since Wednesday night. Oct. 21, after word first broke that former manager Lindsay Schmidt had a recording of a conversation with co-owners Joe Tillotson and Scott Cecil in which they complained that she

had hired too many gay men and that she needed to hire more women.

In response to a message from an employee asking about the restaurant's status, co-owner Joe Tillotson wrote on Monday, in a message provided to Dallas Voice by someone who asked to remain anonymous: "All, we apologize for the delay in this message. Wednesday evening we were informed by the staff working that they had received threatening phone calls and so they were sent home. Since that time, operations have been temporarily suspended. We have received mixed information from our manager regarding who has quit and who has not. If you would like to continue working please respond [to the message or by email]. Regardless, if you have questions or want to discuss further then we would like to meet with you in person so please email a time you can come by the tavern."

Dallas Voice's source also disputes Tillotson's claims that Redfield's was closed early on Oct. 21 and has been closed since because of threatening phone calls, based on what employees

A separate source told Dallas Voice talks between the current owners and an unidentified prospective new owner have been suspended, at least temporarily.

Mansfield ISD introduces new LGBTQ discrimination policy



Mansfield ISD's Board of Trustees on Tuesday night, Oct. 27, introduced the district's new diversity and inclusion officer and its new policy that discriminates against its LGBTQ employees.

In July, the U.S. Supreme Court issued its Bostock v. Clayton County ruling saying that, in employment, sexual orientation and gender identity are included in the protections against sexual discrimination in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act.

The state of Texas issued new wording that has been widely adopted by ISDs around the state. The section on discrimination reads: "Discrimination against an employee is defined as conduct directed at an employee on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability or any other basis prohibited by law, that adversely affects the employee's employment."

In accordance with law, discrimination on the basis of sex includes discrimination on the basis of biological sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, gender stereotypes or any other prohibited basis related to sex.

Mansfield ISD adopted the state's wording but omitted the second sentence that specifically protects LGBTQ employees from discrimination. The Rev. Katie Hays of Galileo Church in Mansfield said, "They're determined to be on the wrong side of history."



On our 2018 Halloween cover, Jenna created a special effects makeup that lifted away the outer skin to show what lies beneath. And in this year's "Harley Quinn" creation, what lies beneath is bursting to the surface.

But what is it that makes Halloween so special not just to Jenna, but to drag performers in general (other than, you know, it being the Gay High Holiday, of course). "Halloween is essentially a drag queen's profession," Jenna explained. "We're conceptualizing, dressing up and costuming all year long."

But if it's Halloween all year long,

there's a risk that the actual Halloween ends up not being all that special. It's a risk that Jenna is familiar with. "There was a point in my career that I found myself asking off at Halloween because the magic of the night seemed to be diluted," she said. "It was more exciting for me to see the crowd than trying to compete to entertain them.

"But then I realized that Halloween offered me an opportunity to 'Trick or Treat' with my makeup," Jenna continued. "I could try new looks, new concepts, optical illusions — be far more adventurous than I normally would. It's chance to take a risk — and possibly fail miserably. form on Halloween took all the fun out of it, Jenna said, she has come to realize that working on Halloween provides an opportunity to take her drag to a whole different level.



Unfair and unbalanced

Marsha Dimes presents sequin-spangled election coverage for a COVID-tinged race

ith a pandemic, an economic collapse and, well, a less-than-traditional president, this has been anything but a normal election year. So why should your election coverage be normal?

That's what Marsha Dimes, grand marshal of last year's Pride parade and a political science major in college, thought. Who better to present completely unfair and unbalanced election coverage?

"In 2016, I was sitting at Woody's crying on election night," Marsha said. "Show tunes night was ruined."

So when Marsha was thinking about this year's election, she couldn't stand the thought of watching pundits analyze the numbers to death as they wait to see who will lead the country for the next few years. And she knew just what would be missing. In between, "And we call Alabama and its nine electoral votes for Biden," she knew the evening needed some glamor, sequins and alcohol.

"We can have fun, drink a little and ask the audience to donate to the Victory Fund," Marsha said.

The LGBT Victory Fund trains LGBTQ candidates how to run for office, including how to raise money, and then endorses those LGBTQ candidates with a reasonable chance to win. Money raised by donors like Marsha is distributed to the Victory Fund's endorsed candidates.

So she put together a team of correspondents and has been researching races. Her coverage will lean toward LGBTQ candidates running in Texas and around the country. In Texas, there are a slew of them — 11 people running for the Texas House of Representative and two running for Congress.

Marsha explained why that's so im-





portant: "We can't be seen if we're not at much reading to prepare. the table."

In addition to LGBTQ candidates, Marsha said she'll also focus on the Democrats' attempt to flip the U.S. Senate. This year 35 Senate seats are up for grabs. Of those, 23 are currently held by Republicans. She said she'll particularly be watching the races to unseat Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, South Carolina's "Ladybug Graham," and Texas' John Cornyn.

Marsha said she's been doing way too

"I have to be up on the issues," he said. But much of that reading has focused on which areas of which states will swing that state one way or the other and turn red states blue or keep a purple state in the Trump column. She said she'll be watching where Biden can flip a county and change the electoral map.

Speaking of maps, once Marsha decided to do an election night broadcast, she realized she couldn't be outdone by CNN in technology and graphics. Technology would help her pull up numbers from Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, the parts of the Pennsylvania crucial for a Biden victory in that state. And graphics — she knew she couldn't do any sort of election coverage without graphics that would allow her to turn a state on her map blue or red.

But, she said, she balanced that with another important issue for drag queen election coverage — how much sequin can you actually wear?

As she prepared for the show, she realized she needed to prepare for all possible outcomes. In 2016, network late night talk shows all went live. All they were ready for was a Hillary victory. When Trump won, the talk show hosts had nothing to say. They delivered one of the most lifeless evenings in election coverage history.

So Marsha is preparing for any outcome. Although she described her show as being completely unfair and unbalanced, she'll prepare not only for a Biden victory, but also for a Trump win or, more likely, an uncertain end to the evening if not enough votes have been counted in enough states by the time she leaves the

And rather than just repeat vote tallies, Marsha's ready with other useful information. Aunt Marge will be on hand with cocktail recipes and some election-themed food to prepare. Nippy Peakes will offer some biting political commentary, and Tri Truong, appearing as Thai Mai Shu, will help on the technical side along with Marsha's husband, Clay Kolcak.

What advanced technical equipment will the team by using? Two laptops that they believe can handle it all.

"And a green screen," Marsha said. "It'll be fun to see how well our technical abilities come off."

The YouTube broadcast begins on Tuesday at 6:45 p.m., 15 minutes before the polls close in Texas. Early voting results should begin being released at 7 p.m. followed by a long lag in time before Election Day results are reported and states can be called.

That's when Marsha said they'll mix the real news with some fun along the way.





Election Night Guide

What to watch for and when as the polls close Tuesday

here are an estimated



vote next Tuesday, Nov. 3, maybe more, according to a study by the Williams Institute, an LGBTQ think tank at UCLA. Various studies and polls over many years have consistently found about three-quarters of those LGBTQ voters support Democratic candidates. Other studies have suggested LGBT people tend to be much more engaged in politics than the general population — writing or calling elected officials, consuming political news and communicating about issues through social media. And it's a good bet that many LGBTQ people will be glued to their social media and news venues on Tuesday.

Fivethirtyeight.com, the respected poll analysis website founded and run by openly gay statistician Nate Silver, gives Democrat Joe Biden an 87 percent chance of winning the White House. He gives Democrats a 96 percent chance of keeping the House and a 74 percent chance of taking control of the Senate.

Democrats currently control 232 seats in the U.S. House, Republicans control 197, and six are vacant. A party needs 218 for control. Of the seven openly LGBT members currently serving the House, all are expected to win re-election, though three have some complications. Of the eight newcomers running for House seats, at least one has a very good chance at winning, and at least three others are maybes.

Republicans currently control 53 seats in the U.S. Senate, Democrats 47. Polling indicates Democrats will almost certainly lose one of their current seats (held by Sen. Doug Jones in Alabama). If they



do lose Jones, and if Trump retains the White House, Democrats would need to hang onto every other seat and pick up five more to reach the magical majority number of 51.

In addition to these important contests, the Gay & Lesbian Victory Fund estimates that "at least 574 LGBTQ candidates" are on the ballot Nov. 3. Its website identifies about 300 who have won their explicit endorsement and financial support.

Here's an hour-by-hour guide to how the night will unfold for major LGBT candidates and for the contests to control

the U.S. House and Senate. and the White House:

6 p.m.

U.S. HOUSE SEAT, Indiana 2nd: Most of Indiana will vote until 7 p.m., but South Bend, home of one-time Dem-

ocratic presidential contender Pete Buttigieg, closes at 6 p.m. There, probate attorney Pat Hackett is making her second try at unseating four-time Republican incumbent Jackie Walorski.

Walorski's record on LGBT issues has earned her a score of 7 out of a possible 100 from the Human Rights Campaign. A graduate of Liberty Baptist College and a staunch Trump supporter, Walorski has raised \$2.2 million for her campaign, compared to Hackett's \$770,000. Only \$11,500 of Hackett's support has come from LGBT political action committees (PACs), including the Equality

Buttigieg made a statement in support of Hackett but, as of Oct. 14, his Win the Era PAC had not contributed to her campaign. Hackett has a master's degree in theology from Notre Dame and lives in South Bend with her spouse Rita.

7 p.m.

FLORIDA, two mayoral seats, Fort Lauderdale, Wilton Manor: These are among the most heavily LGBT municipalities in Florida. The Fort Lauderdale Sun Sentinel endorsed openly gay incumbent Mayor Dean Trantalis with a strong editorial supporting a second term. He's seen as having a relatively easy path to re-election.

Wilton Manor City Commissioner Julie Carson, a lesbian and cancer survivor, decided to run for the mayoral seat only last February when incumbent openly gay Mayor Justin Flippen died suddenly of a brain aneurysm. She faces two other candidates, including another former mayor. South Florida Gay News Publisher Norm Kent wrote last week that, while her opponents are worthy candidates,

Carson "galvanized" the community of 12,500 following Flippen's death and has "judiciously integrated our community's social responsibilities" with the town's economic needs.

VIRGINIA, Richmond Mayor Alexsis Rodgers: Lesbian civic leader Alexsis Rodgers, 29, has taken on a steep climb trying to unseat a popular mayor in a five-way race in Virginia's capital city. It's her first bid at elective office, but she's raised the second-largest amount of money after incumbent Mayor Levar Stoney. That gives her a fighting chance to be one of two candidates in a possible run-off come December (Richmond has an odd Electoral College-like system that often leads to run-offs.) The Richmond Times Dispatch reported recently that a poll of likely voters had Rodgers a distant third place, but 30 percent of voters were undecided.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: There are 60 votes in six states on the line at this hour. Four of the six states — Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky and South Carolina, with a cumulative 44 electoral votes — went to Trump in 2016. Two states — Virginia and Vermont, with 16 electoral votes —

went to Clinton. But polling in Georgia is unusually close in 2020; the latest poll, by CBS on Oct. 23, showed a tie. An upset there could ring like the shot heard round the world. At this point, considering the polls are so close and sticking with the historic voting patterns, the Probable EV count will be: Trump 44, Biden 16.

U.S. SENATE RACES: There are three closes races closing out this hour, and Democrats have a decent chance of picking up two new seats.

The two are in Georgia. Both Republican incumbents — David Perdue and Kelly Loeffler — have poor voting records on LGBT issues, and their Democratic challengers — Jon Ossoff and Rapheal Warnock — have support from the LGBT community. The latest polls showed Perdue with only a one-point lead over Ossoff, and Warnock with a six-point lead over Loeffler.

In South Carolina, the Human Rights Campaign scores Republican incumbent Lindsey Graham a consistent zero. When asked in a recent campaign interview about his support for the right of samesex couples to marry, Graham said, "I have tried to be tolerant; I've tried to un-

derstand that people have different life experiences. ... But I can tell you right now, when it comes to South Carolina, I think I've been an effective voice for who we are."

The latest poll shows Graham with a six-point lead over challenger Jaime Harrison. HRC has endorsed both Warnock and Harrison.

7:30 p.m.

LOCAL INTEREST: North Carolina Republican candidate for lieutenant governor Mark Robinson has said he would not support "this mass delusion called transgenderism." In West Virginia, State House Delegate John Mandt Jr., running for re-election, resigned suddenly after news reports drew attention to a Facebook chat posting in which he appeared to ask whether another member of the House was a "homo" and suggested the member was probably bisexual. Mandt's name is still on the ballot, however, and he says he'll serve a new term if re-elected.

In Ohio, lesbian Charmaine McGuffey is running for sheriff of Hamilton County, which includes Cincinnati.

The Notorious RGB's legacy on voting rights:

ustice Ruth Bader Ginsburg understood the importance of one voice, one person's lived experience and how one person can bring about radical change in support of full and lived equality for all.

Jeffrey Rosen, the president and CEO of the National Constitution Center, a non-profit organization chartered by Congress "to disseminate information about the U.S. Constitution on a nonpartisan basis," said of Justice Ginsburg: "In battling illness, sexism and discrimination, she never allowed herself to be distracted

from her path of creating what she called a more 'embracive' Constitution — one that embraced previously excluded groups, including women, people of color, immigrants and the LGBTQ community — not just grudgingly, as she put it, but with open arms."

It was with those open arms that Justice Ginsburg brought her lived experience and her embracive philosophy to her work as a civil rights lawyer and to her opinions — and famous unapologetic dissents — as a Supreme Court Justice.

This legacy is because she knew what it felt like:

- to grow up as a Jewish person in a low-income, working class neighborhood during World War II, when Jewish people were being persecuted and murdered in Germany simply for being who they were.
- to suffer loss early in life when her mother died of cancer the day before she graduated from high school, a gradua-


1956 entering Harvard Law School class, that consisted of 500 mostly white men from wealthy families.

- to be the first female member of the Harvard Law Review and the first female member of the Columbia Law Review.
- to experience discrimination when she graduated at top of her class at Columbia Law School--only to learn that despite her hard work and success, no one would hire a woman, especially one who was also Jewish and a mother.
- to raise a family while going to law school, while at the same time taking

care of her husband, who was battling a life-threatening illness.

- to take a job as a law school professor knowing that she was being paid less than her male colleagues simply because she was a woman.
- to start the Women's Rights Project for the ACLU, at a time when abortion was not legal.
- to write the very first law school textbook on a new area of the law that she helped create — gender equality.
- to fight day in and day out for women's rights as a litigator in a male-dominated profession.
- to win the rights for women to 1. have a job without being discriminated against based on sex; 2. have a bank account without the need to have a male co-signer; 3. be pregnant and still have the right work, and 4. sign a mortgage without the need for male co-signer.
- to win the rights for men to: 1. receive tax deductions for caring for dependents and 2. to receive social security survivor's benefits if their wives died.

Because Justice Ginsburg experienced first-hand what it felt like to experience discrimination on so many levels and in so many situations, she also understood the importance how one person's expe-

riences can shape their perspectives and how that one single person can make a difference in the lives of many.

Justice Ginsburg, writing for the majority in an opinion that upheld the people's right to choose their elected officials, quoted James Madison, "The genius of republican liberty seems to demand ... not only that all power should be derived from the people, but that those entrusted with it should be kept in dependence on the people." Whether we cast a vote or not, whether we participate in our local, state or national government or not and whether we like it or not, the people we elect as our representatives at the local, state and federal level and the judges who sit on our courts do speak for us. And in speaking for us, their decisions impact the most intimate and important aspects of our day-to-day lives and the lives of the people we love and care about.

This happens whether they share our perspectives and life experiences or not.

It is for this reason that Justice Ginsburg fought so hard to ensure that all Americans have the unobstructed ability to cast a ballot.

In her 28 years on the U.S. Supreme Court, Justice Ginsburg championed

the unobstructed right of each of us to vote and to keep the three branches of government dependent upon our voices and perspectives. In her famous dissent in *Shelby County v. Holder*, (which earned her pop culture icon status as "Notorious RBG"), Justice Ginsburg, speaking to the majority that had just gutted a key provision of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, unapologetically explained that the unabridged right to vote is found in no less than five separate constitutional amendments and that each of those amendments gives Congress broad enforcement authority, because the right to vote is "preservative of all rights."

She rebuked the majority for failing to consider the devastating impact their opinion would have on poor communities of color. Justice Ginsburg famously said that for the majority to determine that the key provisions of the act were no longer needed was "like throwing away your umbrella in a rainstorm because you are not getting wet."

As is clearly apparent now, Justice Ginsburg's predictions about the impact of Shelby on the ability to cast a vote have come true many times over in the wake of 1. strict voter ID laws (at least three states enacted voter ID laws

within 24 hours of the majority opinion, including Texas); 2. the purging of voter rolls; 3. racial and partisan gerrymandering; 4. the closing of polling places, and 5. voting lines that last for hours.

In one of her last dissents in support of the unobstructed right to vote, Justice Ginsburg again focused on lived experience of voters in Wisconsin, who were simply seeking to have their voices heard during the pandemic. After the majority refused to extend the deadline for absentee voting by six days, Ginsburg sounded the alarm, saying that the court's "paramount concern" should be with the disenfranchisement of thousands of voters, and that the question was not "a narrow, technical" one like the majority suggested, but rather an important constitutional one.

She unequivocally stated that a meaningful vote was of the "utmost importance to the constitutional rights of Wisconsin's citizens, the integrity of the state's election process, and in this most extraordinary time, the health of the na-

Justice Ginsburg said, "Fight for the things that you care about, but do it in a way that will lead others to join you."

One way we can all work for full and

lived legal equality for all LGBTQ people, those who live with intersectional identities and those living with HIV is to follow Justice Ginsburg's embracive philosophy and life-long legacy by raising our individual and collective voices, by casting our ballots, running for elected office and adding our voices and experiences to the conversation.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: There are 38 electoral votes at stake in three states — North Carolina, Ohio and West Virginia. Trump won all 38 in 2016.

The latest polling has been swinging back and forth. Different polls on the same days in North Carolina showed Trump with a one-point lead and Biden with a four-point lead. Same thing in Ohio, where two conservative-leaning polls showed Trump ahead by three and Biden ahead by one during the same time period.

West Virginia is solidly Trump. Probable EV count: Trump 82, Biden 16.

U.S. SENATE RACES: There's a reasonable chance Democrats will pick up another Senate seat this hour. At latest polling, North Carolina's Senate polling has been somewhat erractic — from a tie a few days ago to a six-point Democratic lead on Octo. 23. The Human Rights Campaign Fund and gay presidential contender Pete Buttigieg have endorsed Democrat Cal Cunningham. Republican incumbent Thom Tillis scores a consistent zero in HRC's Congressional scorecard on LGBT issues.

8 p.m.

U.S. HOUSE SEATS: Of the four LGBTQ candidates for Congressional seats, two seem on their way to easy re-election: Sharice Davids, first termer from the Kansas 3rd, and David Cicilline from Rhode Island's 1st.

In New Hampshire's 1st, first-term incumbent Chris Pappas' Republican opponent last week tried to draw attention to Pappas being gay by drawing attention to his boyfriend, a move the Gay & Lesbian Victory criticized as a "dog whistle" for anti-LGBT sentiments. The media seemed interested that the boyfriend is a former lobbyist for Amazon, but it also seemed interested that the Republican candidate, Matt Mowers, did consulting work for pharmaceutical companies. Fivethirtyeight says Pappas has a 10-point advantage.

In Michigan's 6th, Jon Hoadley has also been hearing the dog whistle in his bid to unseat Republican incumbent Fred Upton. According to the Victory Fund, the National Republican Congressional Committee has posted Twitter messages and sent out a campaign mailer to voters' homes, describing Hoadley as a "pedo sex poet." Upton, meanwhile, has the endorsement of the national Log Cabin Republicans group. RealClearPolitics calls it a toss-up, though Upton has a 4.5-point advantage.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: During this hour, 172 electoral votes are in play. In 2016, Trump won 94. This year, two of those states — Florida with 29 electoral votes and Pennsylvania with 20 — are in play.

Trump's youngest daughter Tiffany spoke to an LGBTQ rally organized by gay Trump appointee Richard Grenell in Florida on Oct. 17. Equality Florida Executive Director Nadine Smith dismissed the event as "a pathetic attempt to hide his appalling record," adding that, "Donald Trump is the worst president the LGBTQ community has ever seen."

At deadline, Biden had about a two-point lead in Florida and a seven-point lead in Pennsylvania. If they split the baby, Trump gets Florida, Biden gets Pennsylvania, the Probable EV count: Trump 155, Biden 115.

But keep in mind, many political number crunchers say that, barring unusual outcomes in Georgia or Texas, Pennsylvania is Biden's must-have ticket to 270.

9 p.m.

U.S. HOUSE SEATS: In Minnesota's 2nd, Angie Craig won her seat in 2018, and polls suggest voters are leaning her way for re-election. But a complication for Craig developed when a third-party candidate for the seat died. Under state law, if a "major party" candidate dies within 79 days of a November election, a special election must be held in February. Craig filed suit and won an order, Oct. 9, from a federal district court judge. But her Republican opponent has appealled to the U.S. Supreme Court, claiming the election should be delayed until February.

In Texas' 23rd, Gina Ortiz Jones appears poised to win a vacant seat from the San Antonio area. She lost by only 1,000 votes in 2018, and the incumbent has decided to retire this year. She's won the endorsement of San Antonio's mayor and the San Antonio Express-News. If elected, she'll become the first openly



LGBT person to represent Texas in Congress.

In New York's 18th, incumbent Sean Patrick Maloney is hoping to win a fifth term. Fivethirtyeight says he has an 18-point advantage.

Three newcomers seeking U.S. House seats from New York are facing tougher battles, but have promise:

In New York's 15th, Democrat Ritchie Torres is hoping to fill a seat representing the Bronx that was left vacant by a Democrat's resignation. Torres beat out a field of 15 Democratic candidates in the primary. He's won the endorsement of former President Obama and Democratic presidential candidate Joe Biden, and his chances are good of joining the LGBT Caucus in Congress.

In New York's 17th, Democrat Mondaire Jones is seen as the frontrunner in a three-way race to replace retiring Democrat Nina Lowey in this seat north of New York City. He is expected to win, but he's faced some dirty tricks from a third party candidate in recent days.

In New York's 23rd, newcomer Tracy Mitrano is having a harder time in her bid to unseat a 10-term Republican who she lost to by 9 points in a 2018 bid. But the latest poll showed her within two points this time.

And in Wisconsin's 2nd, incumbent Mark Pocan ran unopposed in 2018 but has a Republican opponent this year. Still, given that Pocan won 120,000 votes in his primary. and the Republican garnered only 19,000, Pocan seems like a sure bet.

LGBT RACES: First-term Colorado state Rep. Brianna Titone, running for re-election, says she has been targeted with anti-trans attacks in Colorado.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: This hour is both crucial and a potentially crazy. Throwing Arkansas (which closes at 8:30 p.m.) into the 9 o'clock mix, there are 15 states and 162 electoral votes to record. In 2016, 106 of these went to Trump, including Wisconsin (10), Michigan (16) and Arizona (11).

But this year, unlike any time in recent memory, Texas (38) is a down-to-the-wire horse race. Over the weekend, the last polls to come in showed first a tie, then Biden with a one-point lead, then a three-point lead.

Michigan looks to be leaning strong

for Biden; Arizona and Wisconsin look sloppy. Given that Texas Gov. Greg Abbott is taking measures, backed by the state supreme court, to make it as cumbersome as possible to return absentee ballots, the Probable EV count: Trump 238, Biden 194.

10 p.m.

MONTANA: Secretary of State candidate Bryce Bennett has won the endorsement of some key newspapers in the state, and, while his opponent has tried to paint him as a raging "liberal," the papers and many of his colleagues in the state senate say he's got the experience and the temperament for the job. If elected, he will become the first openly LGBT person to win statewide office in Montana. Keep in mind, the latest poll in Montana has given Trump a six-point lead in the presidential race

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: Four states and 21 electoral votes are up this hour. Nevada will break for Biden. Iowa's polling results have been a bit erratic but will probably go with Montana and Utah for Trump, leaving the Probable EV count: Trump 253, Biden 200.

11 p.m.

U.S. HOUSE: In California's 41st, incumbent Mark Takano won more than 100,000 votes in his primary this year,


Getting ghoulish

compared to his Republican opponent's 58,000. He has no impediments for a fifth term.

In California's 53rd, the gueer president of the San Diego City Council, Georgette Gomez, is hoping to win an open seat. But she has been strongly outspent by another Democrat seeking the office.

In Washington's 10th, State Rep. Beth Doglio is hoping to win a vacant seat representing the Tacoma area. She's won some big name endorsements — Bernie Sanders, Elizabeth Warren — but she's up against former Tacoma Mayor Marilyn Stickland, another Democrat, and Strickland won the Seattle Times endorsement. There haven't been many polls and the race is considered close, with Strickland in the lead.

WASHINGTON: Two openly LGBT people are running for statewide office in Washington State: Marko Liias for lieutenant governor and Helen Whitener for the state supreme court. Whitener

was appointed to the court vacancy in April and is running in a special election. She is the first black woman on the court and the second openly LGBT person. She's won endorsement from the Seattle Times, and although her opponent has dropped out, he is not off the ballot.

Liias has had a strong opponent who is also a Democrat and has more endorsements.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE: This is the bottom of the ninth, bases loaded, two outs — and Democrats are poised to grand slam 78 electoral votes to win the game. The five states in this hour are predictable: California (55), Washington (12), Oregon (7) and Hawaii (4). Idaho (4) will deliver for Trump, and at 1 a.m., Alaska will toss in 3.

Probable final EV count: Trump, 260, Biden 278. Game over. The only question is whether the Trump team will try to file a protest after the game.

Tiffany Trump:

Yet another Trump kid claiming Daddy loves the gays

¬ he Trump administration is the most anti-LGBTQ administration in history. So the fact that there was a Trump Pride event is insulting all on its own. But Tiffany Trump's rambling speech at the event added to the insult.

"It's such an honor to be here and speak truthfully, honestly and from my heart," Tiffany said to the small group of people gathered for the event in Florida. There were more red hats than masks.

"I know what my father believes in. Prior to politics, he supported gays, lesbians, LGBQIA+ community," she said at the event, throwing her hands up in an expression of exasperation. "Okay?"

Was leaving out the "T" in that string of letters intentional?

Then she said that her best friends are gay, and that notions that Trump doesn't support this community are "fabricated lies."

But those notions aren't fabricated lies. The Trump administration has been especially cruel to transgender people. As Keith Boykin pointed out on Twitter, Trump reversed Obama's trans protections in schools, banned transgender service members, banned homeless trans people in shelters, tried to reverse Obama's protections for trans people in health care and nominated anti-LGBTQIA+ judges.

These are verifiable facts.

Not to mention that Trump's latest Supreme Court pick puts marriage equality in serious jeopardy now that she's con-

But Tiffany claims that Trump's support of LGBQ people is pure. "He's never done it for politics, and he's not doing it for politics," she said.

"My dad cannot be bought off. He's not going to let anyone change his views," she continued to applause and without any apparent irony. "And I'm praying that you all see that."

Tiffany went on, "My mom's here in the audience," and Marla Maples stood up in the front row and waved and blew

kisses the crowd. Tiffany mentioned that her

mom used

to perform on Broadway, because there's lots of gays on Broadway.

"Unfortunately, one of her best friends passed away from AIDS. And what I think is so powerful is when my father says that he is going to" — she caught herself before she said that her dad will cure AIDS — "that there will be a cure in the next 10 years, there will be, and God bless."

She pressed her hands together in prayer and bowed.

Never mind the fact that in June 2020, Trump erroneously said that scientists have "come up with the AIDS vaccine," because he's a moron.

Is it possible that there will be a cure for AIDS in the next 10 years? Maybe. But it won't be because of Trump, a man so deeply distrustful of science that he's let more 225,000 people die of COVID-19 on his watch.

His COVID-19 response plan consists of holding mass gatherings of unmasked people and calling the media "dumb bastards" for their continued coverage of this pandemic that is only going to get worse as the weather gets colder and people move indoors for most activities.

Tiffany bragged that her dad was the first president to appoint an openly-gay person to a cabinet level position, referring to his appointment of Fox News commentator Richard Grenell to acting director of national intelligence. Keeping in line with Trump's personnel picks, Grenell had no national security experience before assuming that position. Grenell was appointed because he's a



Trump loyalist not because Trump is loyal to gays.

Tiffany then lamented the fact that there are "so many people against us," and by "us" she means the Trump family. She is not talking about the many persons against LGBTQ people who have been emboldened by this administration.

"Unfortunately that happens when you go against the establishment, you go against big pharma, you go against the tech monopolies, you go against the deep state," she continued. "They don't like it, right? They don't like change."

Donald Trump has done none of these things. For one thing, he IS the establishment in that he's a rich guy looking out for other rich guys. This idea that he's taken on big pharma is also a joke. Instead of fighting for health care for more Americans, he is suing to undo the Affordable Care Act which would result in millions of Americans losing insurance during a pandemic.

Trump did try to ban TikTok, so that's something, right? Oh, and the deep state is a right-wing conspiracy theory claiming that Obama has secret folks imbedded in the federal government to bring down Trump.

If only.

"The Democrats have pretty much attempted to always control who you, we are supposed to vote for one way or the other," Tiffany said, using air quotes around "you" and "we."

"I wouldn't lie to you, I promise," she said before adding that she didn't bother to prepare any remarks for the event, which sums up her family's credibility and work ethic perfectly.

nesota base to Dallas.

"We have been very pleased with the success we've experienced in Minnesota and are thrilled that communities have embraced and supported us so quickly," the CEO and founder of Crisp & Green mentions in a press release. "We are eager to expand into other parts of the country to bring additional communities nutritious, great-tasting food in our unique welcoming environment.

Dallas is among Crisp & Green's major 2021 expansion of its unique take on a health food store and restaurant. Three sites are in the works, with one landing in University Park according to the company's website.

"We think there is a sense of the same values in Dallas as there are here [in Minnesota]," Smiley says by phone. "Climates are different, and it's outside our usual market. But

I think everyone wants to make good choices in their health journey, and for us it's all about being approachable. We're not about the fitness lifestyle, but more the choice to consciously make today that can make tomorrow better."

Smiley is no stranger to the fitness game. He founded Steele Fitness, which was later acquired by Snap Fitness. His entrepreneurship has given him the business savvy to move forward with this venture into the restaurant business that began in 2016 with the first Crisp & Green. To him though, same difference. In 2019, he told Restaurant Business, "I look at it as the same. We're still serving people a wellness alternative. Our fundamental goal is to teach people how to live their healthiest life."

"We pay the instructors; we pick up that expense, and that's our gift back to the community," Smiley says. "We'll have several types of classes, like from boxing class or yoga to meditation classes. With that, it becomes this community of people that feels great and is excited about life."

Smiley wouldn't mind if it even becomes a hub of sorts, where people hang out with a smoothie and their laptop after yoga class ends, giving truth to the adage that fitness is a lifestyle.

"We have a friendly atmosphere, but we have to be different," Steele says. "People are making choices to be healthy which alone, can mean a lot of different things to different people."

Ironically, in a year where food services and restaurants have closed due to the pandemic, Crisp & Green has thrived. Through its app, the business survived and then thrived on the digital side. In a sense, they rode the same wave that apps like GrubHub and Door-Dash did to expand as food delivery and pickup increased during quarantine — only this was all them.

"We were educating customers already through our digital app, so people were comfortable ordering digitally from us," Steele says.

And as that trend became a necessity, Crisp & Green's customer-base remained consistent via the app.

With a staff educated in its menu that includes vegan and vegetarian options and an approachable atmosphere, Smiley believes Crisp & Green can make a strong impact here in the Dallas area.

"We certainly welcome everyone, wherever their fitness journey is," he says. "You make one good choice one day, and it becomes contagious. So we hope people come in to try something new."

End papers become art



A basic material he used for work became Mark Bradford's signature artistic material

ark Bradford, currently featured in an exhibit at The Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth, uses end papers from his mother's beauty salon as the element to create mixed media collages of geometric design.

The exhibit, *End Papers*, focuses on a theme the gay artist has returned to repeatedly over the last 20 years of his career while expanding his mixed media to social papers — using posters and other pieces in his work as social commentary. But this exhibit sticks to his use of the element that originally inspired his work — the end paper that protects hair from burning while using curlers to create permanent waves.

And the collages he builds use those end papers to create a geometric design that echoes the work of Piet Mondrian, known for his geometrics. But Mondrian's geometric paintings began with the more complex "Broadway Boogie Woogie," and as his work developed, the designs became simpler. Bradford moved in the opposite direction; as he has added color and more texture to his work, it becomes more complex.

While his earlier works employ less color, Bradford later began experimenting with more and more color. Yet the basic material filling each canvass continue to be those end papers from his mother's salon.

The names of Bradford's canvasses are an interesting piece of each work. "Colors in 43G Spring Honey" refers to

hair dyes found in the salon. Or snippets of conversations heard in the salon such as "Dreadlocks cain't tell me shit," or "It took me years to learn the right attitude" become painting titles.

Exhibit curator Michael Auping said, "The End Paper works are not only beautiful, they were prophetic in terms of layering abstraction with personal and social content."

He explained that much of post-World War II modern art is about using common materials. In Bradford's case, the artist used a material that he had learned to use while working in his mother's salon. "The End Papers," Auping said, "are a key element of Bradford's identity."

The ill-timed exhibit was scheduled to run March 8-Aug. 9. The museum, of course, was closed most of that period. So the exhibit of about 35 canvasses was extended through Jan. 10, no small feat considering the large group of canvasses was assembled from major museums such as the Hirshhorn, the Guggenheim and the L.A. County Museum of Art, as well as from an assortment of private collections, including "The hoody is moody," a 2003 work belonging to Anderson Cooper.

Bradford's work is becoming more widely known. In 2019, he had an exhibit in Shanghai. And in 2018, he was commissioned to create a work for the new U.S. embassy in London entitled "We the People," 32 panels, each measuring 10 square feet, featuring selected text from the U.S. Constitution.
