Emmett Schelling makes Time 100 list

Transgender Education Network of Texas Executive Director Emmett Schelling made Time magazine's "Time 100 list: The 100 most influential people of 2022." The list includes Volodymyr Zelenskyy and President Joe Biden but also the likes of Vladimir Putin.

In the category of icons, Mary J. Blige tops the list. Oprah is on the list and so is Xi Jinping. Tim Cook of Apple heads the list of Titans, but Elon Musk and Jeff Bezos are missing.

In the race for who can beat up trans kids and their families the best, the list includes Florida

Gov. Ron DeSantis but not our own transphobic governor, Greg Abbott. But Texas is represented by Emmett.

In the accompanying piece by the ACLU's Chase Strangio, Strangio says Schelling "has spent day and night fighting back and building love and safety for his community."

When Abbott escalated attacks on the trans community, Schelling "mobilized the entire state to fight back," Strangio wrote, crediting Schelling with "leading a scary and grueling fight for trans survival."

Gosar lies, calls Uvalde shooter a 'transsexual leftist illegal alien'

As the people of Uvalde struggled under the weight of their grief following the massacre Tuesday, May 24, of 19 elementary school students and two teachers at the hands of an 18-year-old mass shooter using an AR-15-style assault rifle and a handgun, ultra-right-wing Arizona Congressman Paul Gosar took to Twitter Wednesday, May 25, to falsely identify the killer as a "transsexual leftist illegal alien named Salvatore Ramos."

Gosar's claim is a flat-out lie and he knew that — or at least, should have known that — by the time he posted his vile tweet because the gunman had already been identified as Salvadore



Rolando Ramos, a cisgender male. PolitiFact notes that there is "no evidence to corroborate claims that Ramos was transgender or a 'leftist,' and officials have said he was a U.S. citizen, not an 'illegal alien.'"

But that didn't stop Gosar, and it hasn't stopped the other hate-filled right-wing bigots who continue to spread the lie across Twitter and Reddit, even going so far as to actually include images of transgender people who have absolutely nothing to do with the shooting and identifying those individuals as Ramos.

In January, Bullock talked to Dallas Voice about his sister, Mia Henderson, a transgender woman who was murdered in 2014, and why he has dedicated his life to honoring her by fighting for LGBTQ rights and acceptance, and especially for trans women.

"We are all one, and I believe love lies in everybody's heart," Bullock upon receiving the award this weekend. "It's incredibly important to me, as a cisgender athlete, to stand in support of the trans and LGBTQ+ community."


"This song is about the trials and tribulations we all face in life — both big and small — that

Meet Penelope, a domestic shorthair mix who is only a yearand-a-half old. She is a smaller kitty, weighing in at only 5 pounds presently, though she still has room to grow a bit. Penelope has

a wonderful personality, but she is a bit shy at first. It may take a bit for her to warm up to a new human, but once she has, she is lovely. She has big luminous, eyes and beautiful black fur with a white underside and face (and a slight little black mustache right under her nose). Penelope would do best if she were welcomed into a calm, quiet home with patient and caring parents. Other cats should be OK, but Penelope should meet with any canine and human members of the family before an adoption takes place. There is no appointment necessary to meet Penelope, just come and visit between noon and 6 p.m.

Adult dogs and cats are normally a \$75 adoption fee from the SPCA of Texas. Puppies and kittens under the age of six months are \$150. Adoption fees vary for small mammals, equestrian and livestock. Fee includes spay/neuter surgery, age-appropriate vaccinations, a heartworm test for dogs six months and older and a FIV/FeLV test for cats four months and older, initial flea/tick preventative and heartworm preventative, a microchip, 30 days of PetHealth Insurance provided by PetHealth, a free 14-day wellness exam with VCA Animal Hospitals, a rabies tag and a free leash.



Bearing witness

How many more have to die before we care enough to do something?

n Tuesday, May 24, an 18-yearold kid in Uvalde, Texas, shot his grandmother then got into his truck and drove over to Robb Elementary School where he proceeded to murder 19 fourth-graders and two teachers. The killer, who had barricaded himself inside two adjoining classrooms, was then shot to death by local and federal officers in a specialized tactical team who forced their way inside the classrooms he had barricaded himself.

It was the second-deadliest school shooting since shooting at Sandy Hook in 2012.

It was the third mass shooting in the U.S. in 10 days: On May 14, an 18-yearold kid drove some 200 miles from his home to a grocery store in a primarily Black neighborhood in Buffalo, N.Y., where he murdered 10 Black people and injured three others. The following day, a 68-year-old man opened fire on the congregants at Irvine Taiwanese Presbyterian Church in California, killing one and injuring five others.

Ten days. Three mass shootings. Thirty-two dead. Nine others injured.

Are we "great again" yet? Are we "free" yet?

Tuesday night, after reading about the shooting in Uvalde, I sat at my desk, fighting back the nausea and losing the battle against tears. I kept thinking about those helpless, terrified children, trapped in a classroom with a monster. I thought about what must have been going through their minds as they saw their classmates, their friends, dying around them, knowing they would be next.

I thought about the adults, the two teachers. Did they have time to even try to protect those children? I know that protecting their students would have been their immediate instinct. But how could they even begin to in the face of such brutality and evil?

What about the students and teachers

their lives.

I thought of all the teachers I know and love, in my family and among my friends. I wanted to call every one of them and beg them not to walk back into a classroom again. Not ever.

As I sat there, I logged onto Twitter to read updates, watching as the death toll rose higher and higher as the night wore on. I read how families were being asked to provide DNA samples so their dead children could be identified because some other the bodies were not recognizable.

"Not recognizable." The words made my stomach literally clench and twist, made me dizzy.

As I was reading updates and statements from elected officials, I found the account of a journalist, a young woman, who was reporting from the community center in Uvalde where families were sent to wait for word on their children. The thread of her posts included photos of some of those families, people gathered outside the community center, bound together in unfathomable grief.

And then someone commented on her posts: "Did you get permission to post photos of those people?" And another, and another, demanded that she leave them alone, give them their privacy, stop intruding on their grief.

It made me angry. Maybe they actually were saying that out of sympathy for the families. But it seemed more likely to me that they were telling her to stop because they didn't want to have to feel that grief themselves.

The fact is, that reporter was doing her job. In a time like this, it is the journalists'

job to bear witness, to stand in the middle of the horror, to let it wash over them and then to turn and show that horror to the world. It is the journalists' job to bear witness and to create and keep a record of what happened, because there are people out there — like Alex Jones, for example — who will try to claim it never really happened and that even if it did happen, it wasn't really that bad.

It is the journalists' job because the rest of us need to feel that horror, too. We need to feel that grief that burns your very soul; we have to hear the hideous details, and we have to think, "What if that were my child — my parent or my sibling or my friend — who died so horribly there in that classroom. We have to know because we have to care.

We have to care enough to make it

And the fact that it happened, again, proves we don't care enough yet.

How many more people have to die before we do?

LGBTQ candidates WIN in runoffs

12 out candidates will be running for the Texas House, 1 for Texas Senate and 2 for Texas seats in the U.S. House

enton Jones is poised to become the first gay male to serve in the Texas Legislature since Glenn Maxey, who served from 1991-2003, after winning his Democratic Primary race this week. Jones faced former Dallas City Council member Sandra Crenshaw, who had the most name recognition in the race.

Once Jones secured a place in the runoff, most endorsements flowed his way. He is expected to easily pick up the seat in this heavily Democratic district.

If he wins in November, Jones will be the first male member of the Texas House LGBTQ Caucus and the first openly HIV-positive Texas legislator. He's said he hopes his position will lessen the stigma that is still associated with living with HIV.

Jones won't be the first Black member of the LGBT Caucus, however. That distinction goes to Jolanda Jones from Houston.

Jolanda Jones is having a very good month. She won her runoff by a few hundred votes after winning a special election to replace Rep. Garnet Coleman a few weeks ago. Coleman, who retired earlier this year for health reasons, had served in the Texas House since the early 1990s and was an early and steadfast champion of LGBTQ rights.

But wait! There's more.

The LGBTQ Caucus may grow by another member depending on the outcome of a race that may not be decided until a recount is taken. At press time, 122 votes separated out candidate Christian Manuel Hayes from Joseph Paul Trahan. Hayes is in the lead in a district that includes Beaumont and parts

of Port Arthur. The district is currently represented by a Democrat who is not returning to the Legislature.

Of the other current members of the LGBTQ Caucus, one is not seeking re-election: Celia Israel is running for mayor of Austin instead. That election is in November. The other caucus members — Jessica Gonzalez, Julie Johnson, Erin Zwiener, Mary Gonzalez and Ann Johnson — were either unopposed or won their primaries outright.

In addition, four other LGBTQ candidates for the Texas House won their primaries outright and will vie for seats in the November election. They are Madeleine Eden in District 17, Nelvin Adriatico in District 28, Justin Calhoun in District 73 and Shannon Elkins in District 98.

And Texas could have its first out state senator: Josh Tutt is running for state senate in District 18, which includes Victoria.

Civil rights attorney Jasmine Crockett won 60 percent of the vote in her bid to succeed Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson in Congress. She faced Jane Hope Hamilton who was an advisor to Rep. Martin Frost and had served as chief of staff for Rep. Marc Veasey.

James Rodgers defeated James Harris by just a few hundred votes for the Republican nomination for the District 30 seat. Crockett, who is backed by Johnson, is expected to win the seat handily in this heavily Democratic district.

Texas may also have its first LGBTQ member

of Congress. Out candidate Claudia Zapata won her runoff with 63 percent of the vote over Ricardo Villareal for U.S. House District 21. The seat covers an area west of Austin and San Antonio and includes the state legislative district of Rep. Erin Zwiener, who is bi. The fed-

eral district is currently represented by Rep. Chip Roy.

Out candidate Mary Woods won her primary for the 17th Congressional District that includes Waco. She'll face Rep. Pete Sessions, who once claimed there were no gay people living in his district that included parts of Oak Lawn.

In statewide elections, Republicans chose corruption by a large margin. Ken Paxton, who has three securities fraud indictments pending against him and is being investigated by the FBI for malfeasance while in office, won his bid to run for a third term in a landslide.

His opponent, George P. Bush, current land commissioner and nephew and grandson of the Bush presidents, was late in getting his message on television. His charges of corruption didn't begin airing until early voting was over.

Paxton was running anti-Bush ads the week before early voting began charging Bush with being a liberal. The worst he could find was Bush wanted to make the plaza around the Alamo more historically accurate.

Dawn Buckingham won her race to run to replace Bush overseeing 13 million acres of state property as land commissioner.

Wayne Christian beat Sarah Stogner in the race for a seat on the railroad commission. Stogner came from behind in a crowded pack during the primary when she bared it all in a TikTok video that went viral and poured millions of dollars into her campaign.

On the Democratic side, Mike Collier will be the nominee for lieutenant governor. He beat state Rep. Michelle Beckley by about nine points.

Jay Kleberg is the nominee for land commissioner. Janet Dudding won her race to run for comptroller.

And Rochelle Garza will face Paxton in November in what promises to be a filthy fight for the position of attorney general. Garza won with an impressive 62 percent of the vote against Joe Jaworski who had higher family name recognition thanks to his grandfather who figured prominently in the Watergate investigation.

Dallas woman wants compensation after confrontation with racist hotel employee

ermisha Frazier, who describes herself as a "5'10" Black, queer woman with a 'fro," is asking that Marriott Hotels pay her \$50,000 to cover the cost of culturally-competent therapy to deal with the aftermath of a racist encounter earlier this year with an employee at the Fairfield Inn & Suites by Marriott Dallas Park Central.

Frazier, who lives in Dallas and is the coordinator for the Women's and LGBT Center at SMU University, said that she had reserved a room at the hotel for March 29 as a "bit of a staycation. I was just looking for a little relaxation, and because I stay at Marriott hotels frequently, I had the points to use for that."

Frazier said that she arrived at the hotel, located at 9230 Lyndon B. Johnson Freeway, around 11:30 p.m. She said she walked up to the front doors carrying her luggage to find the door locked. There was a sign that said to ring the door bell, but when she couldn't find the bell, she tried to get the attention of the front desk representative.

"He was standing there, doing whatever he could just to avoid making eye contact with me," Frazier said. When he

One day and weekend things to do within driving distance in Texas

emorial Day weekend is the unofficial start of summer, and it's time start planning some weekend getaways

— as well as things to do for a day. Here are a few ideas that are mostly within driving distance of Dallas.

Go to the BEACH

Galveston is just 45 minutes south of Houston. From Dallas, head down I-45 and you'll be in the middle of downtown Galveston where the highway ends ... or, actually, where it begins.

The island features a number of beaches including one of the most popular — Stewart Beach. Volleyball nets are set up along the beach with the rides and roller coaster built over the water on a pier in the background.

Crystal Beach is seven miles long. Feel free to park directly on the sand. Nothing disturbs the Gulf view from here.

Galveston Island State Park covers acres of luscious landscape and features walking trails, bike trails, picnic tables, barbecue pits and sandy beach.

Stay in one of more than 300 hotels priced from budget to luxury, or rent a home at Beach Town Development just a short walk from the beach.

South Padre Island is another beach destination, though farther from Dallas. Access South Padre from the north side of the island near Corpus Christi and 100 miles south of there from Harlingen.

There is also Port Aransas on Mustang Island on the Texas coast. It's known for its beaches and fish-filled waterways as well as Leonabelle Turnbull Birding Cen-



finally opened the doors to let her in, she said, the man "had a bit of an attitude," telling her she should have made a reservation in advance. She said she had done just that, but deciding she was not willing to deal with the man's disrespect, she said, she told him to cancel her reservation and she would go elsewhere. He continued to argue with her, telling her she never had a reservation and refusing to give her the contact information for the hotel's owner or management.

During that argument, Frazier said, "I can't remember his exact words, but he made a negative comment about my natural hair. I said, 'Well, that was a racist comment,' and he just got irate. He came out from behind the counter and came at me."

Frazier said that even though the employee was a smaller man and she is a larger woman, at that point she became concerned for her own safety. She said the man said he was going to call security, and she asked him to do that. Given interactions between police and Blacks and other minorities in recent years, Frazier said she was not comfortable calling police.

Frazier said that as she and the employee were waiting for the security officer to arrive, she took out her phone and began to video the man's behavior. "When security got there, I told him that [the front desk receptionist] had made a racist comment about my hair."

At that point, she said, "He started coming right at me, yelling about how he wasn't a racist, etc. You can see it on the video, the way he was coming out me. I asked him, 'Did you or did you not make a comment about my hair?' And he said, 'Yep, I sure did, and it's nappy.'"

Frazier said the security officer told the other man to give her the owner's contact information, and when he finally did so, she walked out of the hotel with the security officer, "a male of color" who was "very apologetic about the way I had been treated, and he told me that the [front desk employee] would often treat him the same way."

She said she believes the man's perception of her sexual orientation also played a role in the way he treated her.

Frazier said she has spoken with the general manager of the Fairfield Inn & Suites, who told her that the employee had been fired. But that, she said, is "the bare minimum" response she wants to see. She said she has spoken with Marriott's corporate office at least seven times — "They have on file that I have spoken with someone seven times" — and that she has also spoken with a representative of the risk management company that investigates claims for Marriott. That man was "not very empathetic and said he does not deal with stuff like this because there was no physical damage, no property damage."

She said she has been offered Marriott points and that the risk management representative offered her "a couple hundred dollars." But that is not sufficient to make up for the stress and trauma she endured, and for the hours she has had to take out of her work days since to try and resolve the problem.

"I should never have had to experience such a traumatic moment. I have had to constantly relive this moment since then. They need to understand that this is not something that is ok, and that my feelings about what happened are valid," Frazier said. "In this current climate when Black people, Black lives are discarded and disregarded and disrespected, I refuse to sit back and tolerate that. ... I demand to be compensated. I intend to get them to understand and believe that this was a real, valid experience, and that it is ongoing. It is still not over; it is lingering over me like a cloud.

"They gave me some points and closed my case," she continued. "I never asked them for points; that won't rectify this situation. They are ignoring me. I am a layperson, so they don't care what I have to say. ... But I want Marriott to know this isn't something I will just let go."

Dallas Voice has contacted Marriott for a response but as of press time has received no response.

Going big

allas designer Ramiro Rodriguez made a big splash at this year's Texas Bear Roundup, appropriately enough,

his swimsuit line RAMRODD. With his custom designs and a focus on larger sizes, Rodriguez sold out his entire inventory that weekend. He and his designs were a perfect fit for the bears, and it all started a couple of years ago when his then-partner couldn't find an affordable swimsuit in the right size.

"My partner at the time and I were going on vacation, and he could not find any cute swimwear. We shopped around locally and the sizes only went up to extra large," amd he needed something larger, Rodriguez said by phone from his home studio.

When they finally did find a pair in his size, Rodriguez said, it set them back almost \$100.

And Rodriguez realized he had discovered an opportunity.

He was working in women's wear at the time, but after talking with his then-partner about the larger gay male and the limited options they had, Rodriguez came up with a plan.

"They struggle to find cute stuff that's affordable," he said of larger men. His plan was to ease that struggle. Two years later, he sold out TBRU.

Rodriguez's line offers swimsuits up to 3XL in what he describes as cute and fun prints. He wants his clients to feel just as cute in their swimsuits as the smaller guys, and he wants them to be comfortable, too.

"My first year, I did ok, and there was some pick up at the beginning of the year. But RAMRODD really took off at TBRU," Rodriguez said, noting that he had already been hustling RAMRODD primarily through pop-up shops and at Bear Happy Hour at the Round-Up Saloon.

Now, his line and his brand are growing. But he's also a one-man show. He is the one cutting patterns and buying fabrics and the one handling social media and advertising — the travails of being a small business owner.

"I don't have time these days it seems," he said. "I wake up and work until one or two in the morning. I'm doing the website. I do a lot of custom orders as well."

One of RAMRODD's more unique features - particularly with it just being Rodriguez — is that he creates oneof-a-kind suits for his clients. Locals can visit him directly for consultation and measurements. Distant clients contact Rodriguez to begin figuring out how to execute what the client wants.

Some want rhinestones; others want spikes. Maybe a client prefers a particular design on the fabric. Whatever it is, Rodriguez will create what his clients request. And he posts his creations often on TikTok.

"A lot of my work is those orders, and it takes a bit of time. But I have a commitment to clients," he said.

Fashion was a big influence for Rodriguez from a young age. His grandmother was a seamstress in Mexico where he is from. He moved here 20 years ago, and in that time, he has taught himself how to sew, has received his bachelor's degree in fashion from the Art Institute of Dallas and has been building and has started his own business.

He credits a long-time Oak Lawn tradition with his start in fashion: "The Halloween block party started all that for me. I created my own costumes every year and began creating costumes for other people," he said.

Although he's a one-man show for now, he's increased his line to include socks, tees and tanks. It may put more on his plate, but Rodriguez is playing the long game.

"It's a hard field to compete in, but I think I have some advantage by designing for the larger sizes," he said. "I'd love for my brand to become well-known and be that designer for the community. I feel like I'm just steering this all in the right direction."





ter. It's about a six-and-a-half-hour drive from Dallas, south on I-35 to Austin, then southwest on U.S. 183. There are also several airlines that go to Port Aransas, and you can take a train, to get there

Take a photo SAFARI

Take a car and camera safari through Fossil Rim Wildlife Center.

Drive through acres of game preserve in a center that specializes in protecting endangered species. The herd of Grevy's zebras, for example, is the largest herd of that endangered mammal in the world.

Gazelle, bongo, deer, kudu, oryx and more walk right up to your car. Cheetah and other cats are behind a fence, but you can interact with giraffes who live in a large enclosure.

A ride through Fossil Rim takes a few hours, but overnight camping stays can be arranged.

From Dallas, take Highway 67 southwest. Fossil Rim is located three miles from Glen Rose, about an hour past Fort Worth. From 67, follow the signs.

If you're staying overnight, before leaving Glen Rose, stop at Dinosaur Valley State Park where preserved dinosaur tracks can be seen along some of the trails and dinosaur fossils have been found.

Go BOATING

North Texas offers a number of opportunities for boating without long travel times. Lake Ray Hubbard lies entirely within Dallas, but you'll have to drive through Mesquite or Garland and Rowlett to get there.

A number of boat launches are clus-

tered close to I-30 on both sides of the lake — in Garland and Rowlett on the west side and in Rockwall and Heath on the east side of the lake.

Looking for a larger lake? Cedar Creek Lake is one of the largest in Texas. Drive down Highway 175 and turn right on Hwy 274 to get to Seven Points or Gun Barrel City.

Lake Texoma, near Denison, straddles the Texas-Oklahoma border. Take U.S. 75 north from Dallas or for a more scenic route take Hwy 289 Preston Road till it dead ends in the town of Preston located on a peninsula that juts out into the lake. Several public marinas lie along or just off Preston Road.

If you are up for a slightly longer drive, head southeast to Toledo Bend Reservoir, which straddles the Texas-Louisiana border and is the largest lake in the South, or Lake Sam Rayburn, which is the largest man-made lake completely within the boundaries of Texas. There's plenty of room for boating there, and both lakes are known for fishing. The two are are about a four-to-five-hour drive down Highway 69.

If you head east on I-30 for about an hour to Sulphur Springs then turn south on Highway 154, you'll find Lake Fork. It's not so much known for boating as it is for fishing: The biggest largemouth bass — 18.18 pounds of it — on record in Texas was caught in Lake Fork.

Go SWIMMING

Cedar Hill State Park has a designated "swim beach." Located along Joe Pool Lake, the park is at 6600 W. FM Road 1382 in Dallas just off Belt Line Road.



The park also features 350 campsites with restrooms and showers. Explore trails on foot or bike. And Joe Pool Lake is great for fishing for largemouth black bass, crappie and catfish. You don't need a fishing license to fish from the shore or one of the park's fishing jetties.

Try TUBING

Tubing down the Comal and Guadalupe rivers is what New Braunfels is known for. New Braunfels is about a four-hour drive from Dallas, less than an hour past Austin along I-35.

The Comal River is the shortest river in Texas at 2.5 miles long. Tubing

The Guadalupe River can take up to six hours for a leisurely float. No waterslides around dams in this river, but some rapids keep it exciting.

The Dallas Museum of Art features an encyclopedic collection of art from ancient Egypt to modern European and American painting. A special exhibit of Cartier jewelry is on view through the

cellent permanent collection. Currently an exhibit of women artists is on view.

And the internationally renowned Kimbell Art Museum has an excellent collection of art from medieval through Impressionism. And its special exhibits are world class.

ASK A DRAG QUEEN

My shady mom and a closeted gay boy

Hello my babies. I hope this day finds you well. In this week's episode of brain vomit, I will entertain you with some of the stuff that has happened to me over the past few weeks. It's nothing major, just random shit that I found funny.

The first involves THE BRENDA LOVE, my mother. I have called my momma "Brenda Love" for years. I don't think she likes it much; neither does my husband. He is always on me to call her Mom. Me being the annoying man-child that I am, once I know something bothers you slightly, it is hard for me to let it go. So, I called Brenda Love a few days before Mother's Day to let her know that I couldn't come out to see her on that Sunday but wanted to take her to lunch on the Saturday before. She didn't answer so I sent it in a text.

We had time to stop at JR.'s for another quick round of drinks before we headed to Fair Park.

In the car on the way to Fair Park, my mom calls. I put it on speaker so everyone in the car can hear our conversation. I say, "Well hello Brenda Love."

(Sidenote: Y'all know I am country as fuck. Y'all have heard me emcee, and I have a bit of a southern twang to my voice. Well, I get that 100 percent from my momma. Her voice is so country that even I make fun of it, and I obviously have no business making fun of anyone else's twang. I have done my impersonation of my momma for my friends many times over the years, and it is dead on. The sad thing is, I don't even change my voice that much; it is almost my regular voice. I sound just like her.)

Anywho, our conversation continues, and we decide she is going to meet me in Waxahachie that Saturday, and I will take her some place nice for Mother's

Day. At one point she asks if I have been drinking, and I was like, "Me? No way!" And of course, everyone in the car starts laughing. She very smugly states that she knew it, she could hear it in my voice.

After a few more minutes of us gossiping about family members, I tell her bye and that I love her. She tells me bye and that she loves me bunches.

A few seconds later, I turn to my friend Ross who is in the back seat and say, "I told you she was country as fuck." He laughs and says, "Baby, you were not lying." We laugh and then I tell him, "Now you see how good of an impression I do of Brenda Love."

Then I go right into my mom's voice saying, "Oh well, whatareya gonna do?" My husband chimes in with, "I don't have anything bad to say about his mom; she loves me." I then say, "She loves you more than she loves me."

We all giggle ... Then we hear this ominous voice coming through my speakers: "I am still here!"

Bitch, we fell the fuck out! We all started laughing with our cracked faces. She had done let us have it. I was like, "Oh shit, did I say anything too bad?" Then she said, "I figured I better say sumthin' before y'all said sumthin' too bad."

I haven't laughed that hard in a long time. It was out of embarrassment and shame, but that shit was still funny.

That Saturday when I took her to lunch, she just laughed at me. She knew she had gotten me good, and, as a son, if you don't do an impression of your mother, do you even love her? I love my forgiving, shady mother.

I learned a great lesson that day: Make sure you hang up the phone before you start stalking shit about your ma.

Just a few minutes later, as we were walking to our seats for *Mean Girls*, another memorable thing happened. There were six of us gays sitting together that evening. Two couples — myself and Jamie, Justin and Zeek — and another couple of queens. One is a drag queen and the other is almost always the most well-dressed guy in the room. So, when you see us all together, there is no doubt that we are of the rainbow persuasion.

As we make it down the aisle to our seats Jamie is holding my hand. The young people sitting behind us immedi-



ately start eyeing each other to see if the others are seeing this parade of fabulosity. There was a girl — maybe 16 — next to a boy — maybe 14 — and a couple of other young-uns. They were wide-eyed and snickering as we sat in our seats.

As soon as I sat down, I whipped my head around to them and asked, "So, who in your group is the Regina George?" We were seeing *Mean Girls* after all. The 14-year-old boy quickly said, with hate and malice, "I don't know who that is?"

First off, bullshit. Secondly, I could tell from that one little sentence that that little boy was a big ol' sissy.

Wait, did that sound rude? That young man was destined for the gayborhood. He was gaaaaaaaaay.

I politely told him, "Oh okay. I know which character you are!" Then I gave a little neck wiggle and an eye roll and whipped my head back around, so as not to acknowledge them anymore. I hope he doesn't grow up to be one of those self-hating homos.

On a serious note, three songs into *Mean Girls: The Musical*, I am boo-hooing. I got super emotional. The third song is called "Where Do You Belong," sung by the character Damian, an out gay boy in high school. The song is funny and relevant.

What made me emotional is that this song was written for a young, possibly effeminate boy to sing.

When I was in high school and think-

ing of pursuing acting and theater, one of the things that kept me from doing theater was that I would never get great parts. I was always a little girly with a little too much swish in my steps. If I could have seen that musical with that song in my teens, I could only imagine what may have been different for me.

I cried for my generation missing out, and I also cried with pride for the opportunities that are out there today for our gay community. I am getting so soft in my old age.
