Caring for our aging fur babies

WOOF! DR. JOSH TALKS TO THE ANIMALS



Knowing what illnesses and issues to watch for can help keep your pets healthy as they age

ello everyone! I always appreciate my Woof readers, and I thank you for taking the time to read my column. This time around, I will be discussing appropriate care of our more senior pets so that they can live as long and healthy as possible.

One question I am often asked relates to aging our dogs and cats in relation to "human" years. As a rule of thumb, dogs and cats are usually considered seniors after seven years of age. But unfortunately, the larger dog breeds commonly have shorter life spans, which means they are considered seniors even earlier than seven years of age. This means that, for example, a Great Dane usually has a shorter life than a Chihuahua.

Nevertheless, I have seen larger-breed dogs that have lived long and amazing lives, so do not let this make you sad if you have a bigger boy or girl.

The same basic principles of healthy lifestyles that apply to us humans as we age also apply to our furry kids. Regular exercise and weight management are very important throughout their lives but even more so when they are considered seniors.

Not all of our babies can tolerate the same amount of exercise, but you can break down exercise into smaller, more frequent sessions as opposed to a single, longer session.

Also make sure that you are feeding them a

healthy diet meant for senior dogs or cats.

When it comes to reasons for keeping our dogs and cats at a healthy, slender weight, one of the more important ones is to avoid putting so much work on their joints as they continue to mature. It is extremely common for dogs and cats to develop arthritis,

and we can see it affecting their lifestyles.

Consider getting orthopedic beds for your babies and also area rugs or runners that will help them keep traction around your home. Slippery surfaces are horrible for our pets, especially bigger dogs, with arthritis, because they do not have the strength they once had and are more likely to slip and fall.

You may also consider starting them on high-quality joint supplements. Keep in mind that there are many joint supplement brands on the market, but only a handful are actually worth it.

Lastly, there are medications that can truly help dogs and cats in desperate need of comfort with their joint issues. For those of us that like more novel approaches, options like acupuncture, chiropractic care, cold laser therapy and injections are very useful and may positively change your baby's life. Please consult with your veterinarian to determine the ideal approach for your baby.



Arthritis is not the only condition that we see with our senior kids. We can also see dental disease, liver disease, kidney disease, skin issues, thyroid disease and, as much as we hate saying it, different types of cancer as well. It is vital for us to closely monitor our babies for any changes in their behavior, appetite, water intake, urination, defecation and breathing, among other things.

It is also important to thoroughly check our babies at least once or twice monthly for the presence of any obvious lumps throughout their bodies. There are masses and certain types of cancers that may not be visible, but a physical exam and a consultation with your veterinarian, along with a detailed history of what you may be seeing at home, will help in potentially identifying what may be happening to your loved one.

As veterinarians, we recommend a full physical examination for your baby at least every six months, along with lab work that includes analysis of blood, fecal and urine

samples. Sometimes we also recommend chest (and even belly) radiographs, as these can give us good information about the overall health of your baby. Needless to say, it is vital for us as medical professionals to be aware that cookie cutter medicine does not apply to everyone. That is why it is so important to have thorough discussion with your veterinarian to establish goals and expectations, based what is best for our babies and what is feasible for you as the pet parents.

None of us want to see our babies grow old and slow down, but the more we know about what is vital to do for them, the longer we will have them around in the healthiest ways possible. I hope this column has given you the tools needed to give your babies the best life they can have at such a crucial stage of their lives. Thank you so much for reading my column and abrazos!!

They don't give a fuck about women or democracy or autonomy over one's own body. They care about power. And fascism is an all-you-can-eat buffet of power free from the worry over pesky things like human and civil rights.

Overturning Roe has been the prize ever since it was decided. But it won't be the end. Christian extremists are just getting started and feel more powerful than ever.

Both Republicans and Democrats feel like the Roe decision means good news for them in the midterms, depending on what pundit you're listening to. But the fact is, the majority of Americans support abortion rights. Not to mention birth control, marriage equality and not arresting consenting adults for having sex.

It's easy to be discouraged, but please vote. Vote out every one of these Republican fascist creeps at every level of government. If Republicans are soundly defeated across the board, I think that is something that will work out for every-

Discrimination is lying in wait

T or anyone who might not have noticed, for the last 40 years the criminal statute called "21.06," which criminalizes private intimate relations between persons of the same gender, male couples or female couples, has been on the books in Texas. Since, in effect, it conferred "criminality" upon most members of the LGBT community, it was used to justify any and all forms of discrimination against people who engage in such private, consensual, "criminal" relations — up until 2003, that is, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in Lawrence v. Texas overturned the Texas sodomy law and all such laws in the U.S.

A recent article by Annie Gowen of the Washington Post explained how the

enacting one of the most restrictive anti-abortion laws in the country to efforts to overturn Lawrence and start enforcing the sodomy law again. And we could see all of this coming as the "next shoe

to drop," especially after reading Justice Clarence Thomas; concurring opinion in the recent — cruel — Dobbs decision overturning Roe v Wade. Thomas called for the Supreme Court to next "reconsider" its 2003 decision in Lawrence, among other rulings.

Although the Lawrence decision made all state laws like 21.06 unconstitutional and therefore unenforceable, the state legislatures of Texas and many other states never actually removed those law from their penal code criminal code, leaving them sitting there on the books, silently waiting for the day when an extreme right wing Supreme Court might reverse Lawrence, as it just reversed Roe, thereby automatically reactivating criminal statutes like 21.06 and throwing wide the doors, once again, for pervasive discrimination against members of the LGBT community.

Think 1975: No teaching in public schools, no employment by police or fire departments, no adoption or fostering of kids, no service in the Texas national guard, etc.

Our Texas Republican attorney general, Ken Paxton, has just announced that he is ready, willing and able to make that happen on behalf of the great state of Texas by challenging Lawrence before this new Supreme Court.

So, yes, it's happening. They've waited almost 20 years for this opportunity.

But Paxton is up for re-election in November, as are the governor and lieutenant governor, Greg Abbott and Dan Patrick. The only question now is, will we, and our allies, rise up again?

Artist turned her pet painting hobby into a comforting side hustle

f there's ever a doubt that wine and art don't mix, Cathy O'Neal will prove you wrong. Thanks to a fortuitous visit to a Painting with a Twist event, where guests sip wine and follow an instructor's paint directions, she discovered a whole new passion. Already a dog lover, O'Neal combined her acrylic brush strokes with barking subjects, and a new chapter opened up.

"I started doing it for friends as gifts," she said. "Elaine Liner said, 'I hope you're selling these.' So in about 2014, people began to pay me to do it. I do think they can make very thoughtful, personal presents."

Area theatergoers may be familiar with O'Neal either through her work with several local companies as a stage manager or crew member or through her work, which she often donates to theater raffles and silent auctions. Most recently, she donated a pet painting to Uptown Players' *Broadway Our Way* auction in June. Ryan Teschner was the lucky winner.

"Honestly, I've been bidding on that pet portrait for nearly a decade," Tezzchner said. "I have told several people of my quest to win, and they laugh, telling me I could have just paid for it by now.

"Every year I'm excited to see that Cathy is still donating her time for the fundraiser. And even though I've now won, I will continue to put tickets in that [auction] jar as long as it's there," he added.

O'Neal's work theater goes way back before her pet paintings – particularly with Uptown.





"I have known [Uptown producer Jeff Rane] for a long time, from when he was acting at Theatre Arlington where I stage managed," she said "When he and Craig decided to start Uptown Players, we were excited and knew they would succeed."

Local actor and director B.J. Cleveland was in Uptown's first show and is also O'Neal's best friend. So she jumped backstage to help out. Then she was hired as a stage manager in the company's second season.

Since then she's worked with Theatre Three, Circle Theatre and Theatre Arlington.

While at Uptown working on Forbid-

den Broadway, O'Neal joined others for a painting class with wine. She had never painted in her life until then, she said. "I fell in love hard, and I felt like I could do it," she said. "I kinda had this talent for it."

O'Neal bonded with the teacher and even took private classes with her. Her first pet portrait was of her own dog in 2011. Since then, she's painted 35 dog portraits total — and one cat.

O'Neal said she actually stayed away from art before because of some middle school trauma.

"We had this art teacher who was just the worst," she explained. "She belittled us and critiqued us so badly. I was scared to death of her.

"So I came away thinking I was no good for it and never tried art."

But look at her now.

As she developed her style, O'Neal discovered that she found painting animals to be quite relaxing; when she is painting, she's not thinking about her household chores or the deadlines for the grants she's working on as the current development director for Theatre Arlington.

And in painting pets, she has cultivated her passion as well as her somewhat accidental side hustle. And it was at Uptown she found one of her best and first customers.

"The guys who won the auction were my first paying customers. After I delivered theirs, they ordered portraits for gifts and friends," she said.

O'Neal paints from photos clients give her and depending on their choices, she creates works on 16x20 or 8x8 canvases.

"I encourage [clients to send] more than one photo so we can look at them together," she said. "I prefer them to be on solid backgrounds to make it all about the pet, and I like to put them on a bright background. People will tell me that 'You've really captured my dog.'"

Her pricing ranges from \$60-\$100, and, on average, a painting takes her from two to three weeks to complete.

"I'll ask if there's a deadline like a birthday or occasion, and on the sizes, everything is open to negotiation," she said.

Thick coats and flat faces don't mix well with warmer climates

ccording to TopDog-Tips.com, some dog breeds do better in hot weather like we have here in Texas, and some breeds aren't meant for our climate at all. Here are some of the breeds that don't do so well in Texas heat and what to look for.

Brachycephalic dogs, or dogs with a flat face, are prone to heat stroke because of their narrow airways and nostrils and don't do well in Texas heat. In case you're confused, the dogs have Alaska or Siberia right there in their names. They are great, playful dogs with lots of energy, but they'll work off that energy much better in cold climates.

Boxers are high-energy dogs with a short muzzle. That can lead to overheating especially if they don't stop long enough to get a drink of water.

OutsideOnline.com lists breeds that are among the best hot weather dogs. Its list includes some of the most popular breeds — Labrador retrievers, golden retrievers and border collies.

"Labs are a special mix of toughness and playfulness that can thrive in both cold and hot temperatures," according to OutsideOnline. They're good swimmers and love a pool or a lake.

Golden retrievers also love swimming and are smart and social dogs who will survive the Texas heat.

Border collies are one of the smartest breeds and thrive in warm climates. But they're very energetic and need room to run, so they don't make great apartment

Among other hot weather breeds



July: Uterine Fibroid Awareness Month

Fibroids affect about half of all women but now can be treated with a minimally invasive procedure

hanks to the work of Dallas couple Dr. Suzanne Slonim and Pam Gerber, July has been designated Uterine Fibroid Awareness Month in Texas. Slonim is a doctor who specializes in a minimally invasive fibroid procedure that replaces the need for a hysterectomy in most cases. Gerber decided more women need to know they don't need to live with the pain and discomfort of fibroids that at least 50 percent of women develop.

Teyah Scales, Slonim's patient, said she always had cramps during her cycle, but "I didn't know it was fibroids. I always had heavy periods."

In 2018, her doctor told her that she thought she felt something. That began a period of what the doctor called "watchful waiting."

Her general practitioner found her iron was low, so she began taking pills.

"I thought I was OK," Scales said.
"Then a year ago, my abdomen started feeling full. I could feel a lump in my lower pelvic region."

Her general practitioner told her she needed an ultrasound and found Scales' blood count was low. Scales said she was feeling fatigued. Even a short walk left her breathing fast. The ultrasound revealed fibroids.

"You have so many, we're not going to count them all," the tech told her.

Fibroids run in Scales family. Her grandmother had a hysterectomy because of them. Her aunts both had fibroids, and so did her mother. But her mother had a new procedure done more than 20 years ago called uterine fibroid embolization, the procedure Slonim spe-

cializes in.

Slonim said fibroids do tend to run in families. Black women are more likely to have them, and stress is a risk factor. She said studies show stress caused by discrimination is of particular concern in the formation of fibroids. So as a Black lesbian who had fibroids in her family, Scales was definitely high risk.

Estrogen fuels the growth of fibroids, so trans men are not particularly at risk of getting them. The hormone treatments a trans man receives cuts off the estrogen, and any fibroid trans man already developed before transitioning would die with the hormone treatments.

Slonim asked Scales if she had ever used hair relaxer, and Scales said she had. The chemicals used to straighten hair also stimulate the production of estrogen, putting Black women who use the product at higher risk, Slonim said.

The UFE treatment Scales received is done by an interventional radiologist like Slonim by inserting a catheter through the blood vessels.

"We inject tiny particles to plug the blood vessels in the uterus," Slonim explained. "When we cut off the blood supply, the fibroids die and shrink."

She said that 90 percent of the time, this takes care of all the symptoms.

Scales said that by about a month after the procedure, she felt like a new person.

COVID, Slonim warned, is a factor in fibroid growth. The virus interferes with clotting and more blood feeds the fibroids. Also, she warned, "women who carry excess fat" are at higher risk for fibroids since estrogen is produced in fat cells

As part of the treatment, Slonim prescribes medication to control the pain and nausea, fever and malaise after the procedure. She sees her patients a week after, then at one month and then three months later.

Scales, who just had the procedure done in April, calls it "life changing." She said she has her energy back and no longer has a rapid heartbeat.

Fibroids can interfere with fertility,

Slonim said, adding that they can cause extremely heavy bleeding and cramping and can affect urinary frequency and urgency. Fibroids may cause bloating, pain during sex and back pain that can run all the way down the legs. Some are big enough that a woman can't bend over.

While about half of all women develop fibroids, not all are symptomatic.

NAMING A MONTH

"Two years ago, I saw an article that Kamala Harris sponsored a bill to designate July as National Uterine Fibroid Awareness Month," Gerber said. "I had to be involved."

So she contacted Harris' office and got in touch with the staff person who had written the proposed legislation. They spoke, but the legislation was put on hold when Harris was nominated to run for vice president.

But Gerber decided there was something she could do locally. Through former state Rep. Lorraine Birabil, she got in touch with state Rep. Senfronia Thompson. In office since 1972, Thompson's known as the dean of the House of Representatives.


Gerber worked with Thompson to get a bill passed in the House in the final special session of the last Legislature.

From there, Gerber decided to seek local support for awareness, and she worked with Dallas City Councilwoman Paula Blackmon on a resolution designating July Uterine Fibroid Awareness month in the city of Dallas and with County Commissioner Theresa Daniel to similarly designate the month of July throughout Dallas County.

The Barbara Jordan Leadership Institute is helping to lead the effort to get the word out about Texas Uterine Fibroid Awareness Month. Among the events planned is a self-care fair, a free community event and feminine hygiene supply drive on July 16 from 11 a.m.-3 p.m. at the Fannie C. Harris Youth Center, 4212 E. Grand Ave.

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80 years of Disney animation

You don't have to be an art expert to recognize just about every sketch on display in Arlington

he Arlington Museum of Art is coming to be known for its fun and surprising exhibits. Currently on display are 250 sketches and cels from Disney animation in Disney Art from Private Collections. The works are mainly from the collection of Disney animator Andreas Deja and include his work as well as that of Frank Thomas and Ollie Johnston.

Usually when you go to a special exhibit — such as the Dallas Museum of Art's recent Van Gogh show or one of the Kimball Art Museum's Monet blockbusters — you go for the artist and are surprised and delighted to discover some works you've never seen before.

Here, you probably don't know the artists, but you'll recognize just about every sketch in the show. But I actually even discovered a few sketches from Disney films I hadn't heard of before.

And the museum is having a lot of fun with this exhibit that can only be seen in Arlington. Different downtown Arlington businesses are holding special Disney events in conjunction with the show. HELP Center of Arlington, for example, held a Disney Drag Brunch.

Another thing that's special about this show is that once it's over, it won't be traveling to venues across the country or around the world. This massive collection of sketches goes right back into Deja's vault.

You may not know their names, but it was Johnston and Thomas who created the 12 principles of animation. While these fundamental ideas were developed in the 1930s — when it took 18 sketches turned into 18 layered cels to produce one second of animation —







their concepts are still used today with computer animation and other technology.

The principles include things like timing and exaggeration: "Squash and stretch" alters the face to prevent stiffness of motion.

A good example can be seen in a series

of 18 sketches hung side by side. These 18 were from a total of 54 that it took to animate three seconds of video of Jafar from *Aladdin*. Those three seconds run

on continuous loop next to the sketches.

Eleanor Audley posed for Wicked Stepmother, above, an early version of Snow White, top left, and

Andreas Deja's early work before he became a Disney animator, below left.

It's fascinating seeing these pencil drawings come to life. Look closely at the faces from one sketch to the next and see how animators squashed portions of the faces and stretched them to bring them to life. There's certainly nothing stiff about Jafar.

Often the animators used a live model to bring a character to life. The actress Eleanor Audley, best known for her role as Oliver Wendell Douglas' mother on *Green Acres*, posed to become the basis for the Wicked Stepmother in *Cinderella*.

One room of the show is the "animal room." While King Louie the orangutan from *The Jungle Book* or Jiminy Cricket in *Pinocchio* are more fanciful, the leading dogs in *The Lady and the Tramp* are more realistic because the story is more sincere.

Deja wanted to be a Disney animator from the time he was a child. At 10, he wrote to Disney with samples of his work. So promising was his work already that Disney wrote back and advised him to practice drawing animals.

Some examples of Deja's practice

work as a teen are included in the exhibit. The sketches of lions aren't from *The Lion King*, but certainly were very early versions of Mufasa and Simba.

The exhibit also illustrates how characters grow and develop. Some sketches of Snow White and the dwarfs don't appear in the film because the characters changed appearance from early concepts. The original Snow White appeared to be much younger than the character in the film. The dwarves developed more personality as drawing proceeded.

The 80 years of Disney art represented includes some of the studio's biggest films in addition to the ones mentioned above like *The Little Mermaid, Beauty and the Beast, 101 Dalmations* and *Peter Pan* as well lesser known films like *The Princess and the Frog, The Adventures of Ichabod and Mr. Toad* and *Robin Hood*.

I went to see the exhibit because I knew it would be fun. I knew it would be accessible and recognizable. I left having learned about an entire genre of art and the artists who developed it.

Disney Art from Private Collections runs through Sept. 4 at the Arlington Museum of Art, 201 W. Main St., Arlington. Adults \$20, children \$5 and ages 13-18 and seniors \$15.

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



'Superstar' actor dials up the queer in short time

> esus Christ returns ... to North Texas on Tuesday. The 50th anniversary tour of Jesus Christ Superstar makes its way to Fort Worth's Bass Hall for a week-long engagement starting July 12. The tour comes back to the area after its Dallas stint in April.

As the tour makes its way back to the area, so does gueer actor Paul Louis Lessard who plays Herod. With just the one scene and the titular "King Herod's Song" — he's also in the en-

semble — Lessard has a short time to make a big impression. But with 40 yards of lame and his very ostentatious Herod, Lessard leaves audiences wanting more.

Lessard, a 36-year-old Michigan native, is on his first national tour. He spoke with Dallas Voice recently about waving his queer flag while performing and bringing that one fabulous moment each night in Jesus Christ Superstar.

Dallas Voice: To begin, sorry we missed you the first time around in Dallas and thanks for your time for the Fort Worth shows. Lessard: I was onstage the first week but I actually took off the second week so this is perfect.

You play Herod and it is a big drag, fabulous moment in the show. How do you see it? For me, it's so open-ended that I get to turn up who I am to 200 percent. I wanna create an experience for the audience in my, like, three and-a-half minutes onstage as Herod. I get to take the basics and run with it, and it's completely honest in my portrayal.

How do you bring yourself to this character for that honesty? I'm an outspoken queer man. I've also experienced the same emotions this character has. I used that bit of time to explore all the ways I can shine as a performer but also break down this archetype who was a real

That fabulous costume has got to help a bit. You can't go wrong with a four-foot gold lame robe! And then after the reveal, I'm in three-inch sparkly, black, knee-high boots, a gold-mirrored leotard and gold feather headpiece. I mean, he was the embodiment of ostentatiousness.

Herod seems to always be depicted as rather eccentric. Is there any possibility that he's queer? I've done some digging on that. Biblically, all we can go on was that he was referred to as a fox in his demeanor. He had a wife, he had sons, but we know that doesn't mean he couldn't be [queer]. With that, I think he's become an opportunity for many interpretations, and if I can waive my queer flag and represent onstage, that's important for me

dess Angel Olsen released a couple of well-reviewed albums before her 2014 breakthrough *Burn Your Fire For No Witness*. Based in Chicago at that time, you could hear the influence of Second City siren Liz Phair. But Olsen was no copycat, firmly establishing herself and, in the process, surpassing Phair. With each subsequent album (and corresponding hairdo), Olsen expanded her palette, incorporating a 1960s retro sound that would remain with her over the years.

The 10 tracks on *Big Time* (Jagjaguwar), an emotional set of songs touching on love and loss, grief, and revival, including the title cut, "Ghost On," "This Is How It Works" and "Through The Fires" have a distinctive vintage torch and twang sound that would make k.d. lang proud. The gorgeous "All The Flowers" is queer folk at its finest, while the lush "Chasing the Sun" has cabaret standard written all over it.

Queer male country artists, including Orville Peck, T.J. Osborne (of the Grammy-winning Brothers Osborne) and even long-timer Ty Herndon, have

become more visible in recent years. But they better watch their denim-clad butts, because Willi Carlisle is releasing his amazing second album *Peculiar*, *Missouri* (Free Dirt). Featuring exceptional original songs such as "Life on the Fence," "I Won't Be Afraid," and the spoke title cut, Carlisle makes an unforgettable impression.



Endless Void (War Chant), the all-too-brief debut album by Bay Area-based Caitlin Cobb-Vialet, a queer singer/song-writer raised by lesbian moms, goes by in the blink of an eye but is deserving of repeated listens. Her piano-driven tunes and spilling-forth lyric style is sure to remind some listeners of Regina Spektor. Nevertheless, Cobb-Vialet emerges as her own artist, and songs such as "Disco Ball," "Ask Me," "Collared Shirts," "The Reference" and "Float," are a marvelous introduction to a talented artist.

Caleb Nichols opens his irresistible concept album *Ramon: A Rock Operetta* (Kill Rock Stars) with the song "Listen to the Beatles," but you get the feeling that he's probably listened to a lot of Elliot Smith as well. Over the course of the 10 tracks, Nichols reimagines Mean Mr. Mustard (about whom the Beatles sang on "Abbey Road") as a queer icon. The Beatles' force is strong with this one on songs including "Run Rabbit Run," "She's The Beard," "Captain Custard," "Jerome" and "From A Hole in the Road."

The title cut even includes a lyric reference to the work of solo Beatle Paul McCartney, in addition to playing on the song title "Ram On." To be clear, Nichols is no mere mimic. He has created an original set of songs that pay tribute to a significant influence while establishing him as a singer/songwriter to appreciate for his creativity.

There is so much emotion in Chastity Brown's voice that it's hard to believe that it can be contained on a recording. But there it is on *Sing To The Walls* (Red House), beginning with the aptly-titled "Wonderment," which starts out with layered vocals before blossoming into a full-blown rocking tune. "Backseat" has a similarly soulful vibe, while "Boston" takes a folky approach. The synthesizer on the title track is a nice touch, as are the strings on "Like The Sun."

Wednesday, July 6, President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris spoke by phone to Griner's wife, Cherelle Griner, to update

her on the U.S. government's efforts to secure Brittney Griner's release. Here is the statement from the Biden administration regarding that call:

"President Biden, joined by Vice President Harris, spoke today with Cherelle Griner, the wife of Brittney Griner who is wrongfully detained in Russia under intolerable circumstances. The

president called Cherelle to reassure her that he is working to secure Brittney's release as soon as possible, as well as the release of Paul Whelan and other U.S. nationals who are wrongfully detained or held hostage in Russia and around the world. He also read her a draft of the letter the President is sending to Brittney Griner today.

"The president offered his support to Cherelle and Brittney's family, and he committed to

ensuring they are provided with all possible assistance while his administration pursues every avenue to bring Brittney home. ... The President directed his national security team to remain in regular contact with Cherelle and Brittney's family ... to keep them updated on efforts to secure the release of their loved ones as quickly as possible."


Part of me was sad about it but the other part of me was like ... circle of life ... whateryagondo?




