CITY OF DALLAS PROPOSITION A

"Authorizing the city of Dallas to provide for the planning, acquisition, establishment, development, construction, renovation and financing of the expansion of the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center Dallas, a venue within the city of the type described and defined in section 334.001(4)(b) of and permitted by chapter 334, Local Government Code, as amended (the "Act"), designated by Resolution 22-0660 (the "Resolution") and described in summary form as an expansion of a convention center facility described in Sections 334.001(4)(b) and 334.2518 of the Act, and by Section 351.001(2), Tax Code, as amended, and related infrastructure as defined in the Act, including demolition costs (collectively, the "Convention Center Expansion Venue Project"); and authorizing the city of Dallas to provide for the planning, acquisition, establishment, development, construction, renovation and financing of certain Fair Park facilities, a venue within the city of the type described and defined in section 334.001(4)(d) of and permitted by the act, designated by the Resolution and described in summary form pursuant to section 334.2518 of the act as the acquisition, construction and improvement of the Automobile Building, the Centennial Building, the Band Shell, the Music Hall, the Cotton Bowl and the Coliseum, and related infrastructure as defined in the Act (collectively, the "Fair Park Facilities Venue Project" and, together with the Convention Center Expansion Venue Project, the "Venue Projects") and to impose a new hotel occupancy tax at the rate of two percent (2%) for the purpose of financing the venue projects; and approving the resolution. If approved, the maximum hotel occupancy tax rate imposed from all sources in the city of Dallas would be fifteen percent (15%) of the price paid for a room in a hotel."



Another indicted Republican runs in Collin County

Frederick Frazier, who is running for Texas House from District 61 in Collin County, is under federal indictment for impersonating a code compliance officer and was investigated for excessive use of force multiple times as a Dallas police officer.

According to his opponent, Sheena King, Frazier was indicted in June for impersonating a public servant. And, according to the Dallas Morning News, he was investigated nine times during his tenure with Dallas Police Department for brutality during traffic stops, mostly against Black men. After appeals, Frazier wasn't punished for any of the incidents and remains on the police force.

However, after his indictment, Frazier was put on administrative leave by DPD.

In a campaign press release sent after a story on Frazier appeared in the Dallas Morning News, King wrote, "Reading additional information about my opponent at the end of our race paints a very clear picture of who he is as a person, which is not reflective of a good leader or police officer - and is certainly not who we deserve as an elected state representative."

Would Collin County voters elect someone under indictment? Sure. The county overwhelmingly voted for Ken Paxton in his first two races for attorney general. This year, add FBI investigation as well as federal indictment to

Scottish trans equality group rallies for gender recognition reform

Scottish Trans, the trans equality project of LGBTI equality and human rights nonprofit the Equality Network, held an event outside the Scottish Parliament on Thursday, Oct. 27, in support of the Gender Recognition Reform (Scotland) Bill before the bill came up for a vote later that same day.

Members of SNP, Scottish Labour and Scottish Greens spoke at the rally on why they support the reforms.

The bill fulfills commitments by the SNP, Labour, Greens and the LibDems. The Parliament's Equalities, Human Rights and Civil Justice Committee took a wide range of evidence on the bill in the spring and summer, and recommends that MSPs support the bill in the stage 1 vote.

Vic Valentine, Manager of Scottish Trans said, "Trans people and our families, friends and allies are coming together at the Scottish Parliament to send a powerful and hopeful message to MSPs across the Holyrood chamber ahead of the debate and vote on the Gender Recognition Reform (Scotland) Bill at stage one."

ACLU, West Virginia settle gender marker case

Following a lawsuit by ACLU, ACLU of West Virginia and the Harvard Law School LGBTQ+ Advocacy Clinic, the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' Vital Registration Office has introduced more accessible and safer policies for transgender people seeking to amend their birth certificates.

First, applicants, including transgender applicants, who are seeking to amend the gender marker on their West Virginia birth certificate no longer need a court order. They need only to provide a simple provider attestation form available from the West Virginia Vital Registration Office's website. Further, the new policies amend birth certificates in a manner that reduces the risk of outing transgender individuals who have had name and/or gender marker amendments by removing the previous information from the face of the newly amended birth certificate.

These policy implementations make birth cer-

tificate amendments more accessible and safer for transgender applicants, advocates said.

Meet **Andrea**, a domestic shorthair mix weighing in at 7 pounds with a classy, neutral grey coat that is about as soft as it can be and large, watchful yellow eyes. Andrea had a bit of a rough start in life, so she is still a little timid at first meeting, but with a few treats and a bit of TLC, she begins to gain trust steadily. Andrea doesn't need to roam a posh mansion, but she would very much like to go to a calm and relaxed home environment. She would prefer to share space

Adult dogs and cats are normally a \$75 adoption fee from the SPCA of Texas. Puppies and kittens under the age of six months are \$150. Adoption fees vary for small mammals, equestrian and livestock. Fee includes spay/neuter surgery, age-appropriate vaccinations, a heartworm test for dogs six months and older and a FIV/FeLV test for cats four months and older, initial flea/tick preventative and heartworm preventative, a microchip, 30 days of PetHealth Insurance provided by PetHealth, a free 14-day wellness exam with VCA Animal Hospitals, a rabies tag and a free leash.

Come see Andrea at the Jan-Rees Jones Animal Care Center which is open to the public seven days a week, noon-6 p.m. Appointments are required for foster animals and animal housed in the Russell E. Do NOT take BIKTARVY if you also take a medicine that contains:

- dofetilide
- ▶ rifampin
- any other medicines to treat HIV-1

BEFORE TAKING BIKTARVY

Tell your healthcare provider if you:

- Have or have had any kidney or liver problems, including hepatitis infection.
- Have any other health problems.

Prop A would put Dallas first

Voting for Prop A would give the city the funds necessary for a much-needed new convention center and refurbish the landmark Fair Park

t isn't often Dallas voters have an opportunity to reshape our city's lacktriangle future with an up-or-down vote, a chance to reset our city's standing in the hospitality, convention and tourism industry, while also restoring a beloved and historic gem.

This election, we can do just that with Proposition A.

Prop A asks Dallas voters to increase their city's hotel occupancy tax by 2 percent, generating \$1.5 billion over 30 years. This would fund a badly needed expansion of the Kay Bailey Hutchison

this would be funded by tourists, business travelers, out-of-towners. Dallas taxpayers will NOT foot the bill.

It doesn't get much better than that.

Let's start with our aging, piecemeal convention center. The first section was built in 1957. Sections were added in 1970, 1984 and 1994. The most recent came 20 years ago in 2002. It has been hobbled together, cobbled together,

> and it shows. Visitors must navigate multiple levels on escalators that are frequently broken. There is no backof-house area, so banquet meals are wheeled through lobbies filled with attendees. Big tarps hanging from the ceilings catch water leaking from the roof. (They call them diapers. Seriously, diapers!) This is NOT how we put our best foot

forward! We're losing major conventions to Nash-Atlanta, Houston and Austin. Closer to home, Plano, Frisco and Arlington are winning meetings with new facilities. But Dallas can turn this around.

passed, Α Prop would fund a \$1.2 billion replacement of the convention center. The historic round Arena where Beatthe

les once played would be saved and restored. The rest would go, replaced on a new, more efficient footprint with a center twice the size running along Lamar Street.

We can double our convention business. Instead of a barrier, the center becomes a bridge between downtown and the Cedars. And the city-owned land on the old location opens up to private development that will connect the center to downtown and enhance housing, retail and entertainment options in the area.

This is transformative stuff.

Fair Park, one of the most architecturally-significant sites in the United States, has hosted kings and queens and presidents as well as the legends of rock and blues. Prop A would generate \$300 million for repairs and renovations in six historic buildings on the site: Cotton Bowl, Music Hall, Coliseum, Band Shell and the Automobile and Centennial Buildings.

Improvements to the Cotton Bowl and Coliseum mean more major concerts and sporting events and a better experience for athletes, artists and fans. Anyone seeing Broadway at Music Hall knows it needs some love. Modernizing the Band Shell means more entertainment than just the State Fair's Birds of the World Show. And by updating the technology and infrastructure in the exhibition buildings, our odds jump for being named International Broadcast Centre for FIFA World Cup 2026.

It will also enhance venues used in recent Pride events.

Up until now, Dallas has dealt with millions of dollars in deferred maintenance with an uneven patchwork of bond programs every five to 10 years. It's never been enough. Now, we have a chance to laser-focus significant resources on six key venues and finally move the needle — all done with respect for the historic and architectural integrity that makes Fair Park so special.

And again, the beauty of this is it will be funded by visitors to our city. Dallas taxpayers will NOT foot the bill. And our hotels will remain competitive. A 2 percent increase puts us right there with Houston and Austin but still below the rate charged by San Antonio. In fact, Prop A has the solid support of the Hotel Association of North Texas and the North Texas LGBT Chamber of Commerce.

If this sounds vaguely familiar, it should. Back in 1998, Dallas voters were asked to increase the hotel occupancy tax 2 percent to fund construction of what is now the American Airlines Center. It was highly controversial. Critics called it a boondoggle and warned that taxpayers were at risk. It barely passed.

Yet, those 30-year bonds were paid off in 15 years. And what was once a brownfield waste site, is now a thriving, vibrant part of downtown. That may be why no organized opposition to Proposition A has emerged, and the measure is supported by a diverse group of civic, professional, cultural and advocacy groups.

Our biggest challenge is complacency - voters assuming we've got this, that everyone else will get this done. Please don't assume. Act! We hope you'll join us and go to the polls, go all the way to the end (it's the last item on the ballot after the contested races) and vote FOR Prop A. Vote for a great investment. Vote for a great future.

'We all love Leslie'

IN MEMORIAM

North Texans share memories of Leslie Jordan, the TV, movie and social media star who brightened our world with his humor and a life loved authentically

ment from one person on one social media post following the death Monday, Oct. 24, of actor and comedian Leslie Allen Jordan. But it summed up most succinctly the country's response to the loss of a national treasure: Everyone loved Leslie Jordan.

Jordan, 67, died Monday after crashing his BMW into a building, most likely as a result of a sudden medical emergency, according to multiple sources. The outpouring of grief was immediate and massive.

The actors and singers and other celebrities he had worked with through the years — starting in 1989 when he got his first big break on Murphy Brown, through his days as Beverly Leslie on Will & Grace (for which he won an Emmy) and his sudden social media super stardom on Instagram, right up through his current recurring role on Call Me Kat with Mayim Bialik and Cheyenne Jackson took to social media to honor him and to mourn his death.

Among the most touching of the tributes were from those knew him best, of course, especially posts by Del Shores, the Texas playwright who provided Jordan with perhaps his most memorable role, as Brother Boy in Shores' play Sordid Lives and its sequels on stage and film.

"I'm processing this loss and it is beyond devastating," Shores wrote short-



ly after Jordan's death. "Thank you for all the messages, calls and condolences. This is all I can do right now. I'll be

In a later post, Shores continued, saying Jordan had been his friend for 37 years and was like a brother to him. "I will miss you my friend. Daily. Deeply," Shores wrote. "I will laugh less, and the list of what I will miss about you is vast. I have often described my friend like this: 'Leslie Jordan has more talent per inch than anybody I have ever known.' My life, my career has been so much better because of you, Leslie Allen Jordan. R.I.P. Brother Boy."

Although he was actually from Chattanooga, Tenn., we here in North Texas claimed Jordan as one of our own, and many had their own memories and stories of when they met him.

Jordan's connections to Fort Worth go back several years, according to Todd Camp, who wrote on Facebook that the connection started "with his unforgettable performance as Brother Boy in the Del Shores' play Sordid Lives at Circle Theatre in June of 1997." Jordan returned to Circle Theatre over the next two years with his own play, Hysterical Blindness and Other Southern Tragedies That Have Plagued My Life Thus Far, and in 2000 he was back for Q Cinema and the Texas premier of his autobiographical feature film Lost in the Pershing Point Hotel.

Camp recalled seeing Jordan one day at lunch when he was in Fort Worth during the run of Hysterical Blindness. When Camp asked Jordan about being so openly gay as an actor, Jordan responded, "Oh honey, I fell right outta my mother's womb and into her high heels."

Jordan came to Dallas in 2001, the same year he joined Will & Grace, to appear in Shore's Southern Baptist Sissies at the McKinney Avenue Contemporary, and in 2003, Q Cinema brought him back to Fort Worth for a one-man show at Casa Mañana called When You Swish Upon a Star. He returned to Cowtown in 2008 for QCinema's 10th anniversary with a one-man show at the Scott Theatre called My Trip Down the Pink Carpet, based on his then-newly-released book by the same name.

"Looking back on all of the posts since Leslie's unexpected death, I'm reminded of how much of himself Leslie shared with every single person he met," Camp said. "We had lots of dealings in a professional capacity, with me as a host or promoter and him as talent or a guest. But on those rare occasions when we could actually sit and have a conversation with one another, he always made me feel like a confidant and a friend. It's a relationship I"ve learned that he shared with dozens of my friends and acquaintances, and it's that instant familiarity he nurtured that has made his passing so painful for so many of us.


"His personal struggles — with drugs,

was no longer our private obsession but the world's. It's going to take a long time for me to accept that he's really gone and an even longer time to be at peace with it. He won't soon be forgotten."

Jordan's ties to Dallas run deep, too, anchored at least in part by his long-running association with Legacy Cares.

Melissa Grove, Legacy's former executive director, said Jordan raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for that agency with his annual performances in Dallas. And even after his celebrity increased he remained the same down-to-earth person he had always been.

"He was not a diva," she said. "He just rolled with whatever happened. Whether we had rented the Majestic [Theater] or had him perform at Cathedral of

alcohol, dating the wrong men — are instantly recognizable weaknesses familiar to many gay men, and I have several friends who credit him with helping them through addictions to any or all of those temptations. I always knew he was too bright a star for us to hang onto in DFW, and, during the pandemic, he gave millions of people some insight into that unique gift of gossipy gab that endeared him to so many of us in North Texas," Camp continued. "From that point on, he

She said his meet-and-greets including individual photos with him packed them in. One year, they had sold so many that the next year, he asked to not repeat it.

"He was a very kind person," Grove said. "I truly appreciated him and his generosity."

To publicize his local live performances, Jordan appeared on *Lambda Weekly*, the LGBTQ talk show that's been heard

The LGBTQ hope

ON THE BALLOT

A record number of LGBT candidates are running for office across Texas and across the country

or the first time in history, out LGBTQ candidates are on the ballot in all 50 states. As a bonus, gay candidates are also running in Guam — for lieutenant governor — and in the District of Columbia, where more than 20 LGBTQ people are on the ballot, according to the LGBT Victory Fund.

A record number of out candidates, as well as a record percentager of those running, won their primaries.

At least 1,065 out people ran or are running for office in 2022. That includes 678 candidates who won their primaries — a 64 percent win rate in this election cycle. In 2020, 574 people won their primaries for a 57 percent rate of winning.

"Voters are sick and tired of the relentless attacks lobbed against the LGBTQ community this year," Victory Fund CEO Annise Parker said. "Bigots want us to stay home and stay quiet, but their attacks are backfiring."

Another record set this year is the number of LGBTQ people running for state legislative seats. Nationally, 416 ran for statehouse seats, the most in U.S. history. That number includes the 13 candidates who won their primaries and made it to the November ballot in Texas.

Four of the five founders of the Texas LGBT Legislative Caucus are running for re-election. That includes two from the Dallas area — Reps. Julie Johnson and Jessica Gonzalez — as well as Rep. Mary Gonzalez from El Paso and Rep. Erin Zweiner from just south of Austin.

The fifth founder of the caucus, Celia Israel, is giving up her seat to run for mayor of Austin. In the House, Israel made a name for herself on transportation issues. If she wins her current race,

she would become Austin's first LGBT mayor and the second lesbian mayor of a major Texas city after Parker, who served three terms as mayor of Houston.

Two other incumbents — Rep. Ann Johnson and Rep. Jolanda Jones, both from Houston — are also running for re-election. Johnson's served one full term and Jones won a special election to replace long-time ally Rep. Garnet Coleman, who retired for health reasons, earlier this year.

Six additional LGBTQ candidates are running for the state House of Representatives and one for the state Senate. Of those, Venton Jones is expected to win easily in District 100, which includes the Design District, the Cedars and parts of East and South Dallas.

Shannon Elkins has a tighter race in her bid for a seat representing a Tarrant County district.

Christian Manuel Hayes is expected to win his Beaumont seat in a district that is heavily Democratic. He and Venton Jones will become the first out Black legislators. In addition, Jones will become the first HIV-positive Texas legislator.

If Madeleine Eden is elected to represent her Bastrop district, she'll become the first transgender member of the Texas Legislature.

Two other out candidates for the Texas House are Nelvin Adriatico from Fort Bend and Justin Calhoun from New Braunfels. Eden and both Adriatico and Calhoun are Democrats running in Republican-leaning districts.

Josh Tutt is running for Texas Senate District 18 that includes a piece of Houston. But senate districts in Texas are large, with only 31 senators covering the entire state. The state now has more U.S. representatives than state senators.

Tutt's district is currently represented by Republican Sen. Lois Kolkhorst. The district runs from Houston's southwest suburbs to Corpus Christi. If elected, Tutt would become the first LGBTQ person elected to the Texas Senate.

Tonya Parker, one of the most respected district court judges in Dallas, is running unopposed for re-election. She was the first out Black elected official in Texas.

In federal elections, Mary Jo Woods is running against Pete Sessions to represent U.S. House District 17 in the Waco area. Claudia Zapata is running for U.S. House District 21 against incumbent Chip Roy. The district runs from Austin to San Antonio and includes areas like Fredericksburg and Kerrville to the west.

In other races around Texas, at least six LGBTQ candidates are running for judicial positions and another for justice of the peace in Harris County. Also in Houston is a gay candidate for the Houston City Council.

A queer candidate is running for justice of the peace in Round Rock, just north of Austin. And, if elected, Denise Hernandez will become the first out woman elected to a county court in Travis County.

And finally, gay candidates are running for county commissioner positions in Bell County and Williamson County.

Early voting is underway and continues through Nov. 4. Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 8. In Dallas County, voters may vote at any early voting location and on Election Day may vote at any polling place within the county.

The Dallas Bar Association board OPTS to give the LGBT Bar a voting seat

he Dallas Bar Association board of directors last week voted unanimously to elevate existing ex-officio board seats to voting director seats for both the president and president-elect of the Dallas LGBT Bar Association. DBA's full membership will vote on amending DBA's bylaws on Nov. 4.

Elissa Wev, an attorney and the secretary and vice president of membershjip for the Dallas LGBT Bar Association, said the final vote on Nov. 4 is just procedural and that she expects the president and president-elect to take their seats on the DBA board effective Jan. 1.

This isn't the first time the Dallas Bar Association has designated seats for local affinity bar associations. The J.L. Turner Legal Association, which is the Dallas association of Black attorneys, along with the Dallas Association of Young Lawyers, the Dallas Asian American Bar Association, the Dallas Hispanic Bar Association and the Dallas Women Lawyers Association all have voting seats on the DBA board.

The Dallas LGBT Bar Association tried to achieve status equal to those other bar groups in 2020. While DLGBTBA was given non-voting status then, a new list of criteria for a voting seat was established. Among the new requirements was one that the group being considered for voting seats had to have been in existence for at least five years. While the LGBT Bar Association was established in Dallas in 1999, the association could not prove it had remained the same organization continuously throughout that time. So the DBA gave the LGBT group provisional approval.

Dallas LGBT Bar Association Presi-

dent Callie Butcher said that for the last two years, the LGBT group has been getting the necessary paperwork in order while at the same time working to change hearts and minds among other DBA members.

And when Butcher takes her seat on the board as a voting member on Jan. 1, she will be the first trans person to sit on the Dallas Bar Association board.

The Dallas LGBT Bar Association is an organization for lawyers, law students and related professionals who share an interest in laws affecting and protecting the LGBT communities. "We provide a community for LGBT attorneys and allies," Butcher explained.

That community includes get-togethers, mentoring and providing CLE programs on topics of interest to their members. Butcher explained that attorneys are "often siloed in their firms," and the LGBT organization offers ways for LGBT attorneys to build their professional network.

And while Dallas is a big blue dot, Wev explained that the legal profession can be quite conservative. Depending upon the firm, it can be difficult for some attorneys to practice law as their authentic selves.

The best way to explain the LGBT Bar Association, Wev said, is, "We're here. We're queer. We practice law."

The DBA, for its part, is "dedicated to the continuing education of its members as well as public service programs and improvement of the administration of iustice."

The Dallas Bar Association was founded in 1873 by 40 attorneys and now has more than 11,000 members. It is, Butcher said, one of the most active bar associations in the country.

Butcher sees growth for the LGBT Bar Association because of the increasing numbers of LGBTQ law students. Neither Wev nor Butcher had a specific reason for the increase, although Butcher suggested that landmark decisions for equality have inspired many young people to become a part of that

Wev suggests that maybe the number of LGBTQ attorneys isn't increasing as much as is the number of openly LGBTQ attorneys. Law schools ask the question now, she said. In the past, they didn't.

And while gaining a vote on the board didn't surprise either one, both Butcher and Wev said they were gratified that the amendment passed unanimously.

"Everyone in the room was happy with the vote and how it happened," Butcher said. "There were people who attended that meeting who are normally not at meetings."

She said supportive remarks were made, and a past president spoke saying the change was long past due.

Wey said the LGBT Bar threw a Pride event at Sue Ellen's in June. She said it was a lot of fun and well attended by members of the DBA. Three appeals court judges even made an appearance. After that, Wev said, "the Dallas Bar helped us navigate the process."

As for the future of the Dallas LGBT Bar, Wev said in-person events have come back more slowly in the LGBTQ community than elsewhere because so many people are immune-compromised. But she said she hoped to see gender marker clinics and estate planning and wills workshops return in the

- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you take CABENUVA.
- You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby. It is not known if CABENUVA can pass to your baby in your breast milk.
- Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby during treatment with CABENUVA.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Some medicines interact with CABENUVA. Keep a list of your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine. You can ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for a list of medicines that interact with CABENUVA.

Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your healthcare **provider.** Your healthcare provider can tell you if it is safe to take CABENUVA with other medicines.

POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS OF CABENUVA

CABENUVA may cause serious side effects, including:

The fall and rise of the 'final boy'

LGBTQ ON FILM

Mark Patton's role in 'Nightmare on Elm Street 2' with its gay subtext caused him to end his movie career. Now, like Freddy himself, the actor has been resurrected in a way

reddy Krueger became a horror icon after the box office success of Wes Craven's A Nightmare on Elm Street in 1984. That success prompted the sequel A Nightmare on Elm Street 2: Freddy's Revenge in 1985.

Mark Patton was a closeted gay actor in his mid-twenties when he was cast as Jesse Walsh in Nightmare 2. And, despite being a financial success, the movie suffered a strong homophobic backlash from mainstream audiences when horror fans and critics picked up on the gay subtext. Audiences just weren't ready to accept a "final boy."

Director Jack Sholder as well as a few members of the cast claimed they were completely unaware of any gay subtext in the script. But Robert Englund, who played Freddy Krueger, has said he was fully aware and even decided to bring out more of it in the movie, especially in the scenes Freddy and Jesse shared together.

Even screenwriter David Chaskin for years denied being aware of what he

was doing in writing the subtext. But he later admitted in interviews that the "gay angle" was just an exploitation element he had written into the script and that Patton's performance made the movie gaver than he had intended.

When the movie was released, Hollywood movie star Rock Hudson had only

recently publicly admitted he had AIDS. That was also the year that had the highest total HIV/AIDS cases. It caused panic in Hollywood, and for actors, being labeled "gay" made it difficult to get roles.

Patton found himself in a closet built by those around him who were guiding his career, and it was then he decided to

In the years that followed, Patton re-branded himself as a successful interior decorator. But just as he was rising from the self-inflicted death of his movie career, after battling what he thought was a severe case of bronchitis, he discovered he was HIV-positive.

In 2010, Patton's life came full-circle when the makers of Never Sleep Again, an extensive documentary about the Elm Street franchise, tracked him down and asked him to speak candidly about his experience as a part of that legacy.

His road to a second wind of stardom began with the brilliant documentary Scream, Queen! My Nightmare on Elm Street, an intimate look at the legacy of Freddy's Revenge from the perspective of the actor whose life it changed. The documentary is exposing, confrontational and as inspiring as it is heartbreaking.

Scream, Queen! details the emotional trauma Patton endured before and after he disappeared from the public eye then decades later re-emerged to take control of his narrative. It also contextualizes the very real paranoia, fear and death in

Podcast sheds light on forgotten murders of gay men in Montreal

hen you ask about or Google murders of gay men in Montreal in the 1990s, the answers all lead to the podcast *The Village*: The Montreal Murders. LGBT advocates encouraged me to listen to the podcast. And in my online research, only a handful of news stories talked about the murders prior to the release of the CBC's 2022 podcast hosted by gay French Canadian journalist Francis Plourde.

"Since the podcast was released, I got quite a few people who lived in Montreal and were in their early 20s when all that happened, and many of them had no idea this was happening," Plourde said. "That's how segregated things were in Montreal."


Over seven episodes, the third season of *The Village* investigates the murders of 18 gay men in Montreal at the height of the HIV/AIDS crisis, starting with the murder of 23-year-old gay activist Joe Rose in March 1989.

Rose was known for his pink hair, his "Silence = Death" pin and his snappy comebacks. A friend told Plourde that Rose once said, "If you can't stand the fruits, get out of the orchard."


Rose was diagnosed with AIDS at age 19 after donating blood. But he never hid his status, and his goal was to start a chapter of ACT UP (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power) in Montreal.

Sadly, he never got that chance.

Rose was riding a bus home to the HIV/AIDS hospice where he was living when four teens started yelling homophobic slurs at him. Then they attacked beating him before stabbing him to death. The oldest of the group, a 19-year-old named Patrick Moise, was convicted but sentenced to a mere seven

years in prison.

Many blamed gang violence because the teens were Black. Others blamed a lack of bus safety. But the LGBTQ community stood up and said what no one wanted to hear: Homophobia killed Joe Rose

The LGBTQ community in Montreal and beyond rallied for justice for Rose. But his murder was, unfortunately, the only one. The same night Rose was killed, 28-year-old Richard Gallant was found stabbed to death in his home in The Village. That was the start. A total 16 other gay men were murdered in Montreal between 1989 and 1993.

South Florida Gay News had the chance to talk to Plourde about making The Village: The Montreal Murders and bringing to light a piece of Canada's LGBTQ history. Here is that interview:

SFGN: This season doesn't have a single "villain." How did that complicate things? Francis Plourde: For a long time, there were fears that there was a serial

revor Noah, longtime host of The Daily Show with Trevor Noah, has announced he is leaving the show after seven years, opening up an opportunity for a fresh voice to fill that influential role. In a tumultuous political climate where LGBTQ issues are the hot potato that terrible politicians love to bat back and forth, who better to provide pithy commentary than a queer comedian?

We nominate these five rising stars and veteran funny people.

Patti Harrison

Jon Stewart laid the groundwork; Noah carried the torch, and Patti Harrison, the whip-smart, take-no-shit comedian (who got kicked off Twitter for hilariously impersonating Sia as Nilla Wafers — yes the cookies) would bring it home for a new generation.

At 31, Harrison is a vocal member of the young millennial and Gen Z generation and an out transwoman, which means she understands what's at stake for her generation's future and can speak powerfully against the recent

There's more to McKinnon than her epic RBG portrayal, too. Remember when she channeled what every non-Trump-voting American was feeling when Hillary Clinton lost in 2016? Her post-election cold open, as Clinton singing Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah," was as cathartic as it was powerful — a reminder to cherish what we had and a call to gather strength for the battles yet to come at an unprecedented moment in history (no matter what Rob Schneider thinks).

Add McKinnon's universal likability, and she's a candidate for the job who would be uniquely positioned to serve as a bridge between constantly warring political factions.

Wanda Sykes

Wanda Sykes' trademark no-nonsense takes on current events (and takedowns of current idiots) would liven up *The Daily Show* desk. She's been at this for a while, too. Take her *Daily Show* with Jon Stewart appearance way back in 2001 where she took down then-president George W. Bush, remarking, "I pray for the man every day... and I advise everybody else to do the same. We in trouble, Jon! We are in trouble. It's the foreign policy — the man has only left the country twice, and that was to Mexico. I have traveled more than the president. That's a problem."

Twenty years later, Sykes remains relevant (and side-splittingly funny) and has been an active political rabble rouser. There's no doubt a Sykes-led *Daily Show* would be well-written, pithy, pointedly sassy and devoid of fluff. Sykes would just get the job done while casually annihilating people who casually support stances like eliminating queer rights.

Bowen Yang

Another *SNL* standout, Yang has been coming into his own over the past year, as evidenced by runaway Hulu hit *Fire Island*. But it's his off-the-cuff takes in interviews that reveal why he'd make an excellent *Daily Show* host. When Q Syndicate editorial director Chris Azzopardi interviewed Yang this summer, he discussed the SNL sketch "Pride Month Song," a fresh look at a queer culture staple. Ever down-to-earth, Yang said,



It's that kind of Midwestern-via-New-York authenticity that contributes to Yang's cross-cultural appeal. It would be compelling to see Bowen breaking down complicated news events in a way we can all understand and identify with. Yang is a master at keeping it real.

Randy Rainbow

Maybe it's time for *The Daily Show* to become a variety show. Randy Rainbow's snarky political musical theater might just be magical in the way it lures listeners in with familiar Broadway intros and then whacks them over the head with laser-targeted observations about terrible people. Sometimes, a spoonful of sugar really does help the medicine go down. And at a time when we can all agree that real world news is almost too much to comprehend some days, we could use a little sugar, especially when it's spice in disguise.

It would be interesting to see Rainbow approach *The Daily Show* anchor desk with a Colbert-esque approach, where we're never quite sure if he's serious, but we're definitely sure he's killing fascists with every expertly crafted lyrical delight



GETTING THERE



Director Israel Luna celebrates a new partnership in adult filmmaking

n Monday, Oct.
31 — that is, on Halloween night — local filmmaker Israel Luna will celebrate good news about his Spayse Studio:

Not only has he expanded the square footage of his multi-purpose studio, he's expanding his reach into the adult film world. The launch party on Monday — headlined by famed adult film director, drag queen and DJ Chi Chi LaRue — celebrates his new site, PrivatePlaygroundXXX.

Luna recently established a partnership with OLB Media which specializes in adult websites. In Private Playground, Luna will film content specifically for the site that will also be seen on his Just-ForFans and OnlyFans pages.

This all started simply by having a safe space within his Spayse.

"It started a few years ago when I was putting together these private parties for guys who enjoy intimate events," Luna said by phone. "But it started growing, and we'd average up to 30 people at a time. This was just a fun thing on the side, but I was told I should be charging people to attend."

Luna would charge a mere \$10 for his steamy events and created his private email list from those attending. What he discovered was that not only was he undercharging, based on what he heard from party attendees, but his events were a bit of a gem.

"People were coming from out of town, like from New York and Florida and Chicago. I learned that those big cities have parties like this but once a year. We have ours every two weeks," he explained. Then Luna was asked about the possibility of creating content for Only-Fans and JustForFans based on these parties.

"A couple of folks would come to the party suggesting that, because they said videos of groups are rare when most of it is an individual or with another person," the filmmaker said. "But a group of people would be totally different for that."

Luna had the production skills and the space and the willingness. So why not?

Well, timing wasn't quite on his side
— or was it?

"When we were gonna have our first video event, it was the Friday just before quarantine started," he recalled. "I had three hours of footage and just chopped it into segments."

What did happen because of quarantine was that those sites took off, and, with his footage, Luna found himself in the top 1 percent of content creators.

"Talk about being very fortunate at the timing," he said.


As time went on and things became a bit safer, Luna continued making content which caught the attention of a random fan and subscriber who happened to be with OLB Media, the web designers for MaverickMen, FraternityX and other sites. He told Luna OLB wanted to take his content and create a whole new website.

"'Why mine?' I asked. They said, 'You have a look; a branding; a style. You're really consistent, and you have a lot of content,'" Luna said.

He describes his style as gritty and dark, with club lighting akin to a dungeon or backroom. The unscripted content will feature a minimum of 16 performers because anything less "is just an orgy." That style is what landed him this partnership.

"Four months later they are building a website, and I'm having a launch party. I really didn't think that I would ever be in charge of a legit porn site," Luna admitted.

His launch party will happen at Spayse and will feature "Twitter stars, content creators, escorts, models and those who love them." Luna said he may

just also bring out a California king-size and some cameras to add some spice to the night.

The party is for 18 and up, natch.

Luna doesn't just see this as an opportunity for his own branding; he wants it to be a platform in some ways. Porn has a stigma of shame, and Luna is all about sex positivity. Thus, he provides a space for inhibitions to be left at the door.

"I do wanna be that person to provide that space to enjoy other men with no judgment," he said. "I think it's contributing in a wonderful way to the men here in Dallas. I want to stress that Spayse encourages sex positivity, and there is no judgment or slut-shaming here.

"People don't have to be shy about what they are into here."

Does this mean a new path for Luna's filmmaking? Not at all. It only means an additional path.

"One thing I'm very happy for is that I can still work on my films — I'm editing two horror films right now — and still do my film competition and Private Playground and run a business and none of them affect the others," he said. "I'm so grateful to do what I love to do."

James "Cassie Nova" Love met Leslie Jordan while filming A Very Sordid Wedding

on 89.3 KNON-FM for almost 40 years is hosted by Dallas Voice's David Taffet and activists Lerone Landis and Patti Fink.

"Jordan was always the easiest guest to prepare for because we never even got through the introduction and Leslie was off and running. The next word we could get in was 'We need to take a break,"" Taffet said.

"I'm heartbroken about Leslie," Fink said. "What a tremendous loss."

"He was just as funny, witty, kind and lovable in real life as he was in front of the camera," Landis said. "Whenever we knew that Leslie would be our guest, we knew our spirits would be lifted no matter our mood."

Although he was extremely generous with his time, at some point, his manager made him cut down on his free appearances, Jordan explained as he was preparing to come to Dallas for another Legacy fundraiser. So he decided to concentrate his work on three cities. The hosts thanked him for making Dallas one of those cities.

"No," he laughed in response. "Dallas isn't one of those cities." But, he said, he loved Grove and wanted to help her.

Jeweler Joe Pacetti was the Legacy link to Jordan. They had met at a charity luncheon in Los Angeles.

A friend of Pacetti's on the board of Hope House in L.A. was hosting a charity luncheon and asked Pacetti for a piece of jewelry to auction. When Pacetti donated a diamond, he got a call from his friend encouraging him to attend the event. That's where he met Jordan. They hit it off, and Pacetti told Jordan about Legacy Cares.

"I'd love to help you," Jordan told him. "If there's anything I can ever do."

As a matter of fact, Pacetti told him, there was. He arranged Jordan's first appearance at a fundraiser for Legacy, held in the penthouse of the Vendome on Turtle Creek, that raised about \$6,000.

It was just the first of Jordan's many performances to benefit Legacy. The largest was a sold out performance at the Majestic Theater in 2015 celebrating Pacetti's 60th birthday.

Paul J. Williams recalled opening for Jordan a number of times in Dallas, including at the Majestic performance. "It was such a treat to be able to have an audience that was already pumped up, excited to see Leslie," Williams said. "It was an honor."

Williams said he first met Jordan when the two were working on gay cruises together. He said after a performance, he asked Jordan if he had fun on stage. Jordan answered, "Oh girl I was alive up there."

Williams had a long list of stories about performing with Jordan and just spending time with him. He told one story about working a Mediterranean RSVP cruise. The entertainers were staying in a hotel in Barcelona before boarding the ship, and the hotel was serving a tapas buffet. Nothing on the table looked appealing to Jordan.

"I don't really like any of this," Jordan told Williams. "I'm going across the street to get something."

But just as he was about to leave, a team of high school rugby players also staying in the hotel came into the restaurant. Jordan looked at them and turned to Williams and said, "Oh, I'm sure I can find something to eat here."

"He could tell the filthiest jokes," Williams said, and then innocently get away with it.

But Williams remembers Jordan most for his kind heart. "He knew about my sobriety struggle," Williams said. Before he was about to perform at the show at the Majestic, Jordan told him, "I'm so glad you didn't die."

James Love, who appeared as his drag alter ego Cassie Nova in the movie *A Very Sordid Wedding*, in which Jordan appeared once again as Brother Boy, said this week that Jordan "just had a light about him and we were but moths drawn to his humor."

Love continued, "I remember the day we were filming the Rose Room scene

in A Very Sordid Wedding. He walked into our dressing room while we were still getting ready. We all stopped what we were doing, even though we were all running behind, to listen to him. He goes right into a story about why he was late. "He said 'Sorry I'm late y'all, but I was in the woods last night watching Lady Gaga get plowed by Cuba Gooding Ir. while some white trash rednecks jacked off!' Then moved on to the next subject with no explanation. I thought, that's how you make and entrance. Krystal Summers and I both knew exactly what he was talking about; he had just finished filming American Horror Story: Roanoke. We were absorbing everything he said. It was so cool. He kept everyone entertained all day just by being his true and authentic self."

Love concluded, "He was a natural born entertainer. I am sad today because we lost him, but I will always smile when I think of him. That is an incredible legacy."

But why was it that EVERYONE loved

Leslie, even those who never had the chance to meet him? Because, said Dallas counselor Candy Marcum, he was "authentic, not an act," and people are drawn to that.

In 2020 when the COVID pandemic hit and the world went into lockdown, Jordan took to social media to entertain himself and the rest of us with his daily posts, videos that often started with him asking his "fellow hunker-downers, "Well, shit. What are y'all doin?"

His Instagram account quickly grew from about 8,000 followers to more than four million. Marcum said that was because the stories Jordan told rang honest and true.

"During the pandemic, people needed laughter," she said. And despite how bawdy he could get, there was nothing malicious about him. His stories were often about his family; he'd be eating his mother's cornbread and telling funny stories about it, but you knew it was the best corn bread ever baked.

Marcum said the first thing she ever saw Jordan in was Sordid Lives. What attracted her to it at first was Brother Boy was in a state hospital in her home



town, Big Spring, where there actually is a state hospital.

"It was different that it would show a gay person in a positive light even though he was in a state hospital and in drag," she said. "Everyone loved Brother Boy."

She said with Jordan's death we're losing not just a great comedian, but a great activist because comedy can be activism. "One of our superpowers is our sense of humor," Marcum said. "I think we use it all the time. It's disarming. Makes people perk up."


Humor, she said, is universal. When we're laughing at the same things, it attracts allies. And with each new role, as Jordan attracted fans, he created allies.

"He changed hearts and minds," Marcum said. "He gave us inspiration and motivation to keep going. And we need to keep going the way our country's going right now."


Emerson Palmer, another alumni of Shores' *Sordid* world, summed it up with his social media tribute to his friend: "He had no choice but to be out and proud from the beginning. He didn't hide, because he couldn't; he was an out gay actor when few could [be] or did.

"Will & Grace and Sordid Lives made him a titan of an example to me, as an out man and as an actor," Palmer continued. "He set the bar so high it remains a reminder and an inspiration of an authentic life — warts and all."

the early days of the AIDS crisis, including the death of Patton's partner, Dallas star Timothy Patrick Murphy.

Although Freddy's Revenge had a bad reputation and a long history of being ridiculed, it is now celebrated for being ahead of its time and a queer cult classic. The beauty of it, for the LGBTQIA community, is that they claim it as their own and embrace Mark Patton as the first "male scream queen."

Michael Varrati, host of Dead For Filth podcast, noted, "Even though there was a willing disconnect with Jesse as a final boy, there were also as many of us who saw him and thought, 'Wait, this guy is me!""

Travelling the convention and festival circuits, Patton has gotten the opportunity to meet fans, many of whom are young and gay and who find his character

of Jesse inspiring. The subtext that once caused him pain has now made him a hero, and he's turned what was initially something negative into a personal victory and a chance to forgive and heal.

The theme of survival permeates Patton's everyday life. "I have every character I've ever played tattooed on my body," Patton told HIV Plus Magazine in 2013. "But I've decided to add the name Lazarus ... because that's who I am. I've walked out of the grave time and time



again."

Patton, who now lives in Mexico, takes every opportunity to confront issues of bullying, homophobia, and his personal battle with HIV as a way of educating and mentoring others.

The final boy is not ashamed of being a scream queen — and he shouldn't be.

Mark Patton is currently starring in Carter Smith's Swallowed. Both his performance and the film are earning rave reviews from audiences and critics alike.



killer in Montreal, in the late 1980s, early '90s. Turns out there was one, but that was not the only reason why gay men were dying in The Village in Montreal. So, it was a bit of a challenge in terms of, like, so many of those cases were different and in terms of how they happened, the background of the individuals. There were things in common, but there were also big, big differences as well.

So, in this case it was a challenge, yes, for research and for storytelling. But at the same time, we wanted to do something a bit different with that season. We wanted to look at the broader context of Montreal and what it was to be queer in Montreal in the early '90s. So the series became focused on those crimes that happened in Montreal, yes, but it was also about the AIDS crisis that was happening at the same time, which was kind of fueling the homophobia that we saw in Montreal in those days. And we wanted to show that it was also a story about the empowerment of a community, a community rising together.

What response did you get from sources 30 years later? On one hand, there was this eagerness to share their story because they knew it was important for so many reasons. But it was also challenging We also met people who were not willing to engage or to do interviews with us because they lost a loved one. In many cases, the murder is still unsolved. And there was this double pain, the loss of an individual, but also the context in some cases people had double lives; they were not disclosing their sexual orientation to their family, right?


And memories can change decades later. Yeah, that's the challenge with interviewing people who will remember things from 30 years ago. If you ask anyone what they did last week or a month ago, often they won't even remember

accurately. Imagine 30 years. But I was still surprised by how much people remember, and I think that's because it was so impactful. In their life, it had so much impact. So, I think that's why they had such vibrant memories of what happened.

I couldn't help but notice the parallel between the attacks on gay men, who were blamed for the HIV/AIDS crisis, and the anti-Asian hate we've seen during the COVID pandemic. Was that something that struck you? Oh, yes, that was so obvious. It was so obvious to me because I live in Vancouver, and there's a big Asian community there, and I was seeing the same thing in the early days of COVID. I mean, so little was known about the disease. There was this perception that it came from Asia, and, as such, people were targeting Asian people, trying to avoid Asian markets.

When [Rose] was attacked on the bus, a friend was with him, and the first thing he told first responders was that [Rose] had AIDS so they would take precautions There were so many wrong ideas about protections for the disease, like you avoid The Village, you don't touch gay people - all those those kinds of like misconceptions. It kind of fueled the homophobia that we noticed in Montreal and elsewhere as well; I don't think that was specific to Montreal, but, yeah, it was kind of impossible not to make the connection.

clude: Black on Black on Black on Black (through Dec. 10); Fake News & Lying Pictures: Political Prints in the Dutch Republic (through Dec. 17); and Well-Designed Beauty: Trade, Technology, and Decorative Arts (Nov 15–May 13).

During the winter months, walk the gardens for Holiday GLOW, featuring a one-mile lighted walk with new art included.

If you are interested in some details about Allerton, here are some interesting tidbits from An Open Secret: The Family Story of Robert and John Gregg Allerton, which was published last year: "Robert Allerton was born to one of the pre-eminent families of Gilded Age Chicago. He embarked on a career as an artist, living and study-

ing in Berlin and Paris before settling in downstate Illinois, near Monticello, on a piece of property known as 'The Farms.' From the 1920s until [John] Gregg's death in 1986, Robert and John referred to each other as father and son; they even made it legally official, with Robert's adoption of John in 1960, a few years before the elder man's death. But their relationship was not confined to those traditional bounds. It was, in fact, visibly queer at a time when the perception and reception of homosexuality in American society were undergoing a transformation."
