

Ethics Committee report: 'Substantial evidence' shows Santos 'violated federal criminal law'

The House Ethics Committee on Thursday, Nov. 16, released its report concluding there is "substantial evidence" that gay Republican Rep. George Santos has "violated federal criminal laws," including using campaign funds for personal purposes and filing false campaign reports. The release of the report comes less than

a month after the most recent effort to expel Santos from Congress failed to get the two-thirds majority necessary to pass. However, many of those who voted against that effort on Nov. 1 said they wanted to see the results of the House Ethics Committee's investigation into Santos.

The New York lawmaker faces a 23-count indictment accusing him of an array of corruption, including 10 felony counts that federal prosecutors added last month. Santos' campaign fundraiser Samuel Miele, who had previously identified himself as the chief of staff for former House Speaker Kevin McCarthy, pleaded guilty to charges of wire fraud on Tuesday, Nov. 14. And Santos' former campaign treasurer, Nancy Marks, pleaded guilty in October to a series of charges, including conspiring with a congressional candidate to commit wire fraud.

Santos has pleaded not guilty to the charges against him.

According to the report released today, the Ethics subcommittee found "a complex web of unlawful activity involving Rep. Santos' campaign, personal and business finances ... Rep. Santos sought to fraudulently exploit every aspect of his House candidacy for his own personal financial profit."

The report also says Santos, "blatantly stole from his campaign" and "deceived donors into providing what they thought were contributions to his campaign but were in fact payments for his personal benefit. He reported fictitious loans to his political committees to induce donors and party committees to make further contributions to his campaign, and then diverted more campaign money to himself as purported 'repayments' of those fictitious loans."

The report also alleges that Santos "used his connections to high-value donors and other political campaigns" to enrich himself, and that he did it all "through a constant series of lies to his constituents, donors and staff about his background and experience."

The Ethics Committee said it is referring its findings to the Justice Department but did not make a recommendation to the House. — Tammye Nash

Apologizing to Judge Phyllis Frye

Judge Phyllis Frye spoke at the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum on Wednesday, Nov. 15, but before I went to hear her speak, I felt that I owed her an apology.

Through the 1990s, I was a board member of the Lesbian and Gay Rights Lobby of Texas, now known as Equality Texas. While equality was our goal, we were singularly focused on getting a hate crime bill through the Legislature. And every version of the bill that was written only included protection based on sexual orientation.

At one board meeting, Houston transgender activist Phyllis Frye came to speak to the board to ask us to encourage the Legislature to add gender expression or identity to the list of covered hate crimes. While no one disagreed that the transgender community was the target of hate crimes, most board members believed we could get a bill passed if it included sexual orientation but not if it included gender identity.

Two of us voted with Frye to add the transgender language to our goals. The rest of the board voted no.

Although I was one of the two who voted with her, I felt I needed to apologize for not being able to convince anyone else to vote with us. (The other yes vote on the board came from Mitchell Katine, a Houston lawyer who later became the first defense attorney in the case that became Lawrence v. Texas).

If a board dedicated to gay and lesbian rights

couldn't be convinced that transgender rights were equally important by the woman who's come to be known as the grandmother of the transgender rights movement, that at least proves what a tough road the transgender community has had to navigate.


Frye notes that not until 2008 did HRC finally agree to include the trans community as part of its mission. Why? "A lot of gay and lesbian people with money didn't want to fuck with us

and dilute the message," she said.

But just as the hate crime bill in Texas was rejected multiple times and, when finally passed, was vetoed before passing once more and being signed, what's currently known as the Equality Act has been introduced in Congress for decades and has continued to fail — even when the trans community was excluded. Excluding people isn't a winning strategy.

hanksgiving is a good day for reconnecting. The importance of friends and family was never so clear to me as it was during the Covid-19 shutdown in the spring of 2020. I felt so isolated that I was concerned about my mental health.

Since then, I have been uplifted by many acts of kindness I have witnessed, whether in local shops or in WhatsApp calls with struggling friends in Africa. From people with plenty to people with nothing, I have encountered generous, brave spirits who provided soothing respite from the fanaticism and strife reflected in the news and social media.

Their grace, whether amid light or darkness, is a victory in itself.

The strength of character and simple goodness of these people lowered my stress level as I watched a parade of threats to our liberties march by. That helped me avoid clinging desperately to every meager scrap of good news that came along.

For example, The Advocate recently had a headline, "Vatican Rules Transgender Catholics and Babies of Same-Sex Couples Can Be Baptized in the Church." That is welcome as far as it goes but feels too little and too late.

Though brought up in the Catholic Church, I managed to get through much of my life as a gay man outside its good graces. How grateful do they expect me to be for their baby steps of tolerance? How long is one expected to wait wretchedly in the cold before being welcomed into the feast?

Happily, I am on a more solid footing with my family. Thanksgiving dinner will be at my youngest sister's house. I suppose it is a blessing that the Republican voters in the family will be at a different gathering. I love them all, mind you, but who needs an argument over whether America should invade Mexico, elect a demented dictator wannabe or wheth-

er Nikki Haley was right to call Vivek Ramaswamy "scum" at a recent debate?

I suppose we could say things like, "Hey turncoat, please pass the stuffing," but that hardly sounds familial.

Besides, my plate at Thanksgiving is so full to start with that I barely have room for pie, much less seconds of anything. That's something to be grateful for: a day when overeating

is considered a sign of patriotism, so no one will fault my dietary choices.

On the other hand, I could warm to a discussion of whether Sen. Tim Scott will drop girlfriend Mindy now that he has suspended his presidential campaign. But beards are useful in Washington; maybe she'll settle for being a member of the senatorial wives club.

BIKTARVY does not cure HIV-1 or AIDS. HIV-1 is the virus that causes AIDS.

Do NOT take BIKTARVY if you also take a medicine that contains:

- dofetilide
- rifampin
- any other medicines to treat HIV-1

BEFORE TAKING BIKTARVY

Tell your healthcare provider if you:

- Have or have had any kidney or liver problems, including hepatitis infection.
- Have any other health problems.
- Are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if BIKTARVY can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant while taking BIKTARVY.

Standing in the Spotlight

FIGHTING DISCRIMINATION

Being the center of media attention has been scary for high school senior Max Hightower, but he's glad he took a stand

mind at all being in the spotlight stage. In fact, he works hard in his theater class to earn

that place in the spotlight. But over the last few weeks, the 17-year-old Sherman High School senior has found out that being in the national media spotlight really isn't that much fun at all.

Ironically, it was the fact that he had earned his place in the stage spotlight that ended up turning the media spotlight on him.

In mid-October, when Max found out he had won the role of Ali Hakim in the school's planned production of Oklaho*ma!*, he was thrilled.

Then SHS Principal Scott Johnson contacted Max's parents, and the parents of other students cast in the planned production, to let them know there was a new policy in place: Only males could play male roles, and only females could play female roles, with "male" and "female" defined by gender markers on birth certificates.

That meant that not only could Max no longer play Ali Hakim but that the two female students who had been cast in male roles couldn't play those parts either.

The students, including Max, were devastated.

"This was my first big role in any of the plays I've been in," said Max, who has been out as a transgender male since starting high school. "I had a bunch of speaking lines. I had my own song. So I was really, really excited."

So when the "new policy" was an-

nounced, he added, "I was pretty angry. Everyone was angry. I didn't know if it was illegal, really, but I just kept saying, 'This is illegal!'

"My Fine Arts director was like, 'It will be okay.' I looked at her and said,

'I want to sue!' All the color just left her face. We have not sued anybody, but that's what I said."

The parents of the students, especially Max's dad Phillip Hightower, were furious, too. And when Phillip couldn't get a straight answer about when this policy was put in place, and who actually put it in place, he called the media.

Over the next two weeks, Sherman ISD Superintendent announced the production, scheduled for mid-December, was going to be delayed til mid-January. Then he announced that the musical was full of profanity and sexual content and adult themes unsuited for a high school production, so students were going to stage the revised version intended for "youth." (The revised version is actually intended for pre-high school-age students.)

Then Bennett released a wildly self-contradictory statement explaining there was no policy regarding the gender of actors playing specific roles, except in this one instance in which only males could play male roles, and that non-policy wouldn't apply to future productions, except maybe it would.

By the time the Sherman ISD Board of Trustees gathered Monday night, Nov. 13, for their regular meeting, the story had made headlines around the country. Max was definitely in the spotlight.

Some 65 people signed up to speak during the public comment portion of that board meeting, and "all but five or six" were there to support Max and his castmates, noted Phillip Hightower afterwards.

By the end of that meeting, following a closed executive session, the SISD board had voted to reinstate the original cast to present the original version of the musical. The board has also called a meeting for Nov. 17 to discuss possible disciplinary action against Bennett.

The show will still be delayed until sometime in January because, as Max noted, "we've lost about three weeks of rehearsals, and we have already taken down the sets."

Phillip Hightower admitted that he was surprised — though happily so when the board voted to reverse the decisions Bennett had made to change the cast, change the musical and delay the production. But, he added, "When you have the New York Times sitting in the

TO REMEMBER, TO HONOR

22 victims will be remembered in annual Transgender Remembrance Day events

n Transgender Day of Remembrance, 22 names will be added to a growing list of victims of deadly anti-trans vio-

lence in the U.S. Around the world, 320 trans people have been murdered so far this year. Those numbers, while horrifying, don't set a record in a year that has seen a dramatic increase in hate crimes in all categories.

In 2022, 32 trans people were killed in the U.S. and 327 around the world. The statistical year runs from October through September. Deaths that occur this month will be counted in 2024.

Since statistics have been gathered, 4,600 trans and gender non-conforming people have been murdered. The actual numbers are probably higher since so many hate crimes go unreported and because trans victims are often misgendered after their deaths.

This year, TDoR will be commemorated in Dallas with smaller events than in past years but spread out across the area.

Pam Curry, who organized the first TDoR event in Dallas, said liberal churches across the area are incorporating remembrances of trans victims of hate into their Sunday worship. She said that includes at least three Dallas County churches — Northaven, Oak Lawn and St. Stephens UMCs.

Cathedral of Hope UCC "will be honoring our trans community during the service on Sunday with special liturgy," according to church spokesman Scott Stout.

On college campuses across the area, small gatherings will mark the day. The UT Dallas Gender Center will hold a

vigil. And Trust the Process Project, Nu Trans Movement and Trans Empowerment Coalition will conduct a panel discussion in the library at Dallas College — Cedar Valley campus at 12:30 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 20. That discussion will be streamed online.

Trans Empowerment Coalition is hosting a week of programming. The opening event takes place on Sunday, Nov. 19, at 6 p.m. at Owenwood Farm & Neighbor Space, 1451 John West Road in East Dallas. Equality Texas, House of Rebirth and others are co-sponsors.

The Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum marked Transgender Week of Awareness, the week leading up to TDoR, by bringing in Houston Judge Phyllis Frye, the first transgender judge in the U.S. In 1980, Frye got the Houston City Council to repeal an ordinance banning crossdressing after years of lobbying, and she was the first out transgender person to lobby for rights at the Texas Legislature.

Frye spoke about her discharge from the army, the engineering degree she was never able to use because of discrimination and her "accidental" law degree. A&M was offering a combined business and law degree, and while she enrolled for the business degree, she found she excelled in law, she explained.

She opened her own practice and was the first attorney in Texas to convince a judge to not only do a name change for a transgender client but also a gender marker change. And in 2010, Mayor Annise Parker named Frye a municipal court judge, making her the first trans judge in the U.S. and probably the world.

Frye said in an earlier interview that it wasn't until the internet came along that transgender people could find each other and begin to organize. Unlike the gay and lesbian communities, there weren't bars, and most cities still didn't have community centers, she said.

In a chat group on America On Line, Frye and others learned of the stabbing death of trans woman Rita Hester in Massachusetts; they compared that case to a similar murder, that of Chanelle Pickett, the previous year. Most in the chat room hadn't heard of Pickett.

Gwendolyn Ann Smith, a reporter for the Bay Area Reporter, started a website called Remembering Our Dead in 1999. That was the year the film *Boys Don't Cry* was released, which brought awareness to the problem of anti-trans violence. The web project grew as they tracked violence against the trans community around the world and became Transgender Day of Remembrance.

Curry noted that while some TDoR commemorations include those lost to suicide, TDOR "was never about sui-

For BWD, he will introduce audiences to "Arrive" this weekend.

De La Cruz shares his personal experiences in this world premiere for "SOAR", alongside Wood's "Home," returning for the first time since 2014. The program also includes artistic director Joy Bollinger's "In My Your Head," set to music by Radiohead.

De La Cruz said his new piece for BWD stems from a gift he received.

"I was given this illustration book by Shaun Tan, *The Arrival*, and I was mesmerized by the illustrations," De La Cruz explained. "Immediately I was thinking, how can I translate these images into a dance, because it's a wordless illustration book. I wanted to convey its movement.

"And so, I thought it would be brilliant to do a dance to images that are very familiar to us."

For him, the story was about alienation but also finding your ground and rebuilding your community. As an artist, De La Cruz said he felt compelled to create a piece that speaks to different truths — especially his own.

"I think it ties a lot into my immigration story as being Filipino-American and moving to the United States in 1982," he said. "This piece is really an homage to my older sisters and brothers and my parents, too."

He understands too that those themes also often apply to queer lives — a truth not lost on this new piece where he employs same-sex duets as a way to bring queerness into the vocabulary of "Arrive."

To bring that part of his life into his art isn't just fulfilling; it's also comforting.

"That all really reminds me of the people in my life, like the best friends that I've had, who have really carried my weight — my partner, my ex partners who have broken my heart deeply but who have also taught me a lesson about who I am, and how I embrace my own sexuality," he said.

"I see that there is comfort in being able to pursue that with them. I think it's important to see those dynamics when it's not so traditionally hetero."

With that, De La Cruz also notes how, within his work and queer perspective, a certain undertone has become part of



his art.

"There's queer melancholy in my body that I like to explore as well, like just the sadness of hiding, the sadness of coming out of the closet in many different ways," he revealed. "Even though I'm out, there are certain aspects of my life I'm still keeping to myself.

"I just want to be able to showcase more of these couples on stage so that it becomes more normalized, and [so the audience] can be reminded of their gay son or daughter who are exploring who they are." Eleven days: That's how long it took De La Cruz to conceive and create "Arrive." From there it was planning and workshopping the music. He had to arrange the soundscapes to create the arc he wanted. He knew that when he then got to the Bruce Wood Dance studio with the dancers, he had to be mentally prepared for the fact that everything he created would be likely altered.

He said he had to be okay with destabilizing his original plans so that the dancers could bring their own translation into his piece.

Although he hadn't quite expected to build a relationship here in the Dallas world of dance, De La Cruz said, "I've absolutely loved Dallas. The people I've met who are mobilizing our art scene are really inspiring. It is inspiring for me to engage with the city and its people and what it has to offer," he said. "It's been really empowering to support these two organizations and have them receive what I have to offer.

"Oh, and the food is amazing here too!"

ecently opened in the heart of Deep Ellum, Pink Pedi salon offers a space where customers can "treat" their feet with candy-shaped, envi-

ronmentally-friendly products and be pampered like a queen. And the owner certainly knows something about how a "queen" should be treated.

The scent of chocolate and gentle pink walls invite customers inside, where owner Shawn Cudé, aka award-winning drag queen Tara St. Stone, will hand them little shopping baskets so they can select from six flavors of bath bombs, body butters and sugar scrubs.

"You'll notice that our products look like candies and confectionaries," Cudé explained. "We market ourselves as a beauty bakery. Our bath bombs look like macarons; our body butters look like little wrapped candies; our sugar scrubs look like mini cupcakes, and the hot cocoa socks are all made with cocoa butter in them so they smell like chocolate. It's delicious."

Cudé added that all the goodies are made fresh weekly by the franchise owner. The products are "all made with 100 percent therapeutic-grade essential oils and food-safe products, so they're technically edible," he explained. But, he cautioned, although the products smell delicious and are technically edible, patrons still probably should not eat them.

Cudé's shop is Pink Pedi's second location. It is located on Ross Avenue and opened just a couple of months ago. The original location opened in 2017 on Sylvan Avenue.

Pink Pedi shops are committed to be-

ing eco-friendly, as well as fume- and toxin-free. Husband-and-wife duo Lucy and Brandon Lyon came up with the idea, envisioning a spa haven committed to the environment and to the health of their consumers and nail technicians, the press release noted.

Cudé, Brandon Lyon's best friend, shared that vision. So he partnered up with the couple to open and lead the second Pink Pedi location.

Becoming Tara

Cudé's road to being a Pink Pedi owner took him to Austin and back.

After turning to theater in high school to conquer his stage fright, Cudé ended up in Austin at the age of 21. That's where he discovered the world of drag and met his drag family. That's also where his alter ego, Tara St. Stone, was born and where he worked to perfect his stagecraft, expanding his education in make-up and working with runway shows and weddings.

Cudé performed for years as Tara St. Stone, competing in numerous drag pageants and winning several awards including runner-up at the state level and Miss Gay Dallas. He eventually became the sole promoter of Miss Gay Lone Star, taking the lead on the whole production while also providing consultation for other queens.

Coming back to the Dallas area and reconnecting with his old friend Brandon Lyon, gave him the chance to become the first drag queen owner and first LGBTQ owner of a clean beauty salon.

And the Pink Pedi on Ross established its royal bona fides right from the start: The grand opening back on Sept. 27 featured a drag show starring Tara St. Stone, Miss Gay Texas America Kylee O'Hara Fatale, Dulce Strutts and more.

As an LGBT-owned business, Pink Pedi offers a selection of books, magazines and coloring books for patrons to read as they relax on a wall-length bench with pillows.

"Everybody's welcome here," Cudé said. "We try to make it comfortable for everybody."

The layout, which Cudé described as "updated retro," consists of natural material and natural wood, so that the floor looks like pebbles. Cudé added that it is a layout not seen in regular nail salons.

The new location, at 3510 Ross Ave., Ste. 120., is open from 10 a.m.-7 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday, and 10a.m.-5 p.m. Sundays. The original shop is at 1888 Sylvan Ave., Ste. F140.

Medicare for LGBTQ

Company focuses on helping LGBTQ people navigate Medicare while avoiding discrimination

edicare is the nation's health insurance program offered senior Americans,

older, typically retired workers who are receiving Social Security, according to lgbtagingcenter.com. For many American seniors, there can be some confusion when it comes to signing up for Medicare. But the LGBTQ community can face more and different obstacles than their straight peers.

Steven Graves, owner of Medicare4U-SA.com, recently spoke about some of these concerns. "While we have made progress against discrimination, many in our community are still concerned about talking openly about medical issues, concerns and lifestyle," he said.

One of the biggest obstacles comes as no shock to some and that's discrimination.

All people should be able to see their



doctor without worrying about being mistreated or denied service. But LGBTQ people face disturbingly high rates of health care discrimination, ranging from harassment and humiliation by medical providers to being turned away by hospitals, pharmacists and doctors. AmericanProgress.org states that "discrimination in health care settings endangers LGBTQ people's lives through delays or denials of medically necessary care."

Among lesbian, gay, bisexual and queer respondents to a Center for American Progress survey done this year, 8 percent said that a doctor or other health care provider refused to see them because of their actual or perceived sexual orientation. Another 6 percent said that a doctor or other healthcare provider refused to give them health care related to their actual or perceived sexual orientation.

According to the same survey, 29 percent of transgender people who had visited a doctor or health care provider's office in the past year said that a doctor or other health care provider refused to see them because of their actual or perceived gender identity. And another 12 percent said a doctor or other health care provider refused to give them health care related to gender transition.

It's also important for same-sex couples to know about Medicare coverage for spouses. Married same-sex couples can get coverage under the same Medicare and Medicaid rules as married heterosexual couples in all states. But while where they live or where they were married makes no difference, how long they have been married can affect their right to benefits.

Given that Medicare was established to care for retired workers, it is required that individuals have participated in the workforce to be eligible, according to LGBTAGinCenter.org. This can pose a challenge for members of the LGBTQ community who have been marginalized and excluded from the traditional work force. It can be especially problematic for transgender individuals whose work history documentation may not match their post-transition identity and documentation.

The Transgender Legal Defense and Education Fund states that "securing gender-appropriate identity documents may be a daunting task involving interactions with courts."

Additionally, when employment is secured, it may be fragile due to on-thejob harassment based on gender identity and expression. This results in many transgender people facing chronic underemployment, unemployment and poverty.

When it comes to the LGBTQ community, it's important to know the resources that are out there to help. Medicare4USA is an independent brokerage firm that provides Medicare supplements, advantage plans, drug and dental insurances to people who are 65 and older. More importantly, the agency is gay-owned and -operated, allowing customers to openly discuss any medical concerns and needs. "With a positive reputation, members

inger LP is celebrating their seventh record release with their current tour that stops in Dallas on Sunday, Nov. 19, at the South Side Ballroom. *Love Lines* marks the latest chapter in

- The record almost feels a bit freer. Is that fair? I wanna be the best person ever. I was feeling the people on this record, and we all hit it off, and it helped me enjoy these friendships. This is definitely a real LP record, and it does feel very free. It's like this is a different room in my LP house.
- Relationships seem very important to you, particularly in music. Does songwriting and music help you process all that? I for sure own that. I think I'm super generous in relationships, but I'm not an angel either. I got fucked up shit like everybody, and I'm not looking to be exonerated for anything. I'm forever trying to right a wrong, but I do my best with all my friends and lovers.
- You've been out and proud since the beginning, but it's never felt like it was your thing, either. Any queer label didn't seem to be part of how

you were received. Did that happen by accident or deliberately? I feel like, if I was a straight woman, I'd be somewhere different. I think when "Lost on You" got one billion streams, nobody expected to see me on the other end of that. It was a shock for some, but you never know. I never used the gay thing to get me anywhere. It's just my side of the story.

But you did do that "Dayglow" video which was pretty gay. I mean it was shot on location in Prague at the city's annual Pride Festival. It was like coming



out again! We were gonna do an epic video for "Long Goodbye," but Vodafone wanted to put all this money toward "Dayglow." As gay as I am, and I'm the gayest motherfucker ever, that was the gayest fucking shit I've ever seen. It was so cinematic and all these colorful explosion of gayness. What I get to do with my life is pretty special, that's for sure.

cides. That's suicide awareness. TDoR iss about violence perpetrated by hate."


She continued: "TDoR memorializes the straight guy, perceived to be a freak because he held his wife's bag while she tried on clothes and helped an elderly man to the restroom, who was shot dead in a department store" in 2002. Then there was "the trans woman stabbed, shot multiple times and burned on a pile of tires."

And then there was Muhlaysia Booker, who was assaulted in an apartment complex parking lot in 2019, then murdered a month later by a different attacker. A video of the parking lot assault went viral, so when she was shot three times and her body dumped in the middle of the street in East Dallas, the murder got national attention. The body of a second trans woman, Chynal Lindsey, was found floating in White Rock Lake on June 1.

The two murders turned out to be unrelated, with just one thing in common — the belief no one cared about these women.

In 2021, Ruben Alvarado was convicted of first degree murder for killing Lindsey and sentenced to 37 years in prison. And Booker's murderer, Kendrell Lyles, was finally convicted just last week, four years after the murder, receiving a 48-year sentence. The murders of numerous other trans women in DFW, however, remain unsolved.

front row of the Sherman ISD school board meeting, cooler heads do tend to prevail!"

For Max, the whole ordeal has been trying. "It was really scary," he said, to suddenly find himself the center of so much attention.

"It was a lot, being in the spotlight that way," Max said. "But I thought, if I could be the voice for other people, people who are not out yet, I wanted to do that. I wanted to be the voice for everybody who couldn't speak for themselves."

Although he has been openly transgender for about four years now, Max said this is "the first time I've done anything like this," referring to his decision to stand up and fight back against the school administration's discriminatory decisions.

"It's been scary, but I am glad I did it," Max added. "I have seen that there are more loving and accepting people in my hometown than I ever knew. I was not expecting this overwhelming support and acceptance that I've gotten."

Max said he has heard of a couple of instances in which some high schoolers have posted negative comments online,

of the LGBTQ community can rely on us to help them understand and select the right Medicare policy," said Graves of his company.

And a role as an activist isn't out of the question, either: "I think I would like to do that," he said. "I like sticking up for people."
