



Dallas animal shelter offers adoption special

Have you been considering adding a furry four-legged member to your family? If so, now is the time: Dallas Animal Services is over capacity for dogs and nearly over capacity for cats and, Friday-Sunday, April 19-21, is offering the added bonus of a \$50 gift card to those who adopt bigger dogs and older cats to help clear some space. But get there quick; only the first 100 adopters are eligible.

Like many shelters across the country, Dallas Animal Services is facing high intake numbers for dogs, according to a press release from the city of Dallas. Currently, the shelter is at 133 percent capacity for dogs and 73 percent capacity for cats, with large-breed dogs and adult cats making up the majority of the population. So, to encourage the public to adopt, Friends of Dallas Animal Services is offering a \$50 Petco gift card to the first 100 adopters who adopt a dog over 30 pounds or a cat six months or older from the shelter between Friday and Sunday.

Anyone interested in adopting from Dallas Animal Services should come to 1818 North Westmoreland Road from 11 a.m.- 7 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesdays, and 11 a.m.-6 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Second anti-trans law blocked in one week

For the second time in one week, a judge on Wednesday, April 17, blocked anti-transgender legislation from taking effect. In Ohio on Wednesday, a Republican judge, Franklin County Court of Common Pleas Judge Michael Holbrook, issued a temporary restraining order

against HB 68, which makes it illegal to treat transgender minors with puberty blockers, hormone therapy or surgery. Those already receiving treatment would be exempt from the law.

In West Virginia on Tuesday, April 16, a federal appeals court ruled that a law banning trans students from playing on school sports teams aligning with their gender identity was discrimination. This overturned a lower court ruling.

Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine vetoed HB 64 in December. But the legislature voted to override the veto, and the law was set to take effect on April 24. The ACLU sued on behalf of two transgender teens, arguing the law violates the state constitution's equal protection clause and a rule that prevents a law from covering more than one subject.

In West Virginia, the ACLU, arguing the case there on behalf of Becky Pepper-Jackson, an eighth grader who competed in track, said because she had not undergone male puberty due to use of puberty blockers, she had no physical advantage over other girls. Fourth Circuit Judge Toby Heytens agreed and ruled the law violated Title IX and was sex-based discrimination.

Heytens, a Biden appointee, was joined in

An investment in our city's future

Vote for the 2024 Dallas bond program to improve quality of life

n Saturday, May 4, Dallas voters will decide on the city's 2024 Bond Program. These 10 propositions, totaling \$1.25B, will address the city's critical infrastructure — investing in the basics without increasing the property tax rate.

These infrastructure projects range from the streets we drive on to the parks and trails we enjoy. They address severe flooding and help fix venues where you experience art. It's the first bond program in seven years, and it will improve the quality of life in our city, keeping Dallas competitive for decades to come.

The 2024 Bond Program propositions are:

- A. Streets and Transportation — \$521.2M
- B. Parks and Recreation \$345.3M
- C. Storm Drainage \$52.1M
- D. Library Facilities \$43.5M
- E. Cultural Facilities \$75.2M
- F. Public Safety \$90M
- G. Economic Development \$72.3M
- H. Housing \$26.4M

I. Homeless Solutions — \$19M

J. Information Technology — \$5M

This was crafted over the course of a year and vetted by the Community Bond Task Force, whose 15 members were appointed by the mayor and city council. Their work over last summer and fall was informed by a group of subcommittees delving into granular details about needs. They took input from city staff and key stakeholders, toured facilities for a first-hand look and heard from hundreds of citizens who came to City Hall to share their priorities and concerns.

It was then fine-tuned by the city council. No one got everything they wanted, but with a \$17B city-wide needs inventory, that wasn't possible. The process was robust, well-informed and transparent.

Some of this helps fulfill and complete master plans. For instance, Prop C continues funding the badly-needed widening of the Mill Creek Drainage Relief

Tunnel which helps protect Old East Dallas homes and businesses from costly flood damage. The additional libraries in Prop D will complete the long-term strategic plan for the Dallas Library System. Prop B will continue connecting our city's visionary trail system and get us closer to the goal of every Dallas resident being within a 10-minute walk of a park.

This bond program also leverages additional funding resources from county, state and federal sources, as well as private philanthropy. For example, Prop F includes \$50 million to replace our dilapidated police academy with a new \$140 million facility at UNT Dallas. That will tap \$20 million in state funding and another \$70 million in private funding for

police officers. Prop G helps fund critical infrastructure needs to win competitive industrial and commercial projects, especially in areas that have been historically ignored.

For example, economic development bond funds from 2017 funded public infrastructure improvements around Wynnewood Village in Oak Cliff, which then helped secure a badly needed Target store. These funds are intended to win more jobs, attract new residents and expand the tax base, taking the pressure off the rest of us.

Three propositions — G, H and I — contain critical investments to help incentivize and fund programs to address the serious challenges of affordable housing, as well as permanent supportive and short-term housing for the homeless.

And as passionate arts advocates, we both deeply care about Prop E, which will provide \$75.2 million for repairs, updates and major maintenance — some deferred for decades — at 15 city-owned cultural facilities. All are heavily used by numerous arts organizations and artists and help generate an annual economic impact of \$853 million a year, support 14,000 jobs, attract corporate relocations and boost cultural tourism.

In 2022, arts and culture programs in Dallas attracted 6.8 million visitors, 2.6 million of them coming from outside Dallas and spending their money here. To continue getting this return on investment, we must care for these treasures: neighborhood cultural centers, historic century-old venues, and iconic structures in the Dallas Arts District, which USA Today readers just voted Best Arts District in the nation. It's all the basics — HVAC, roofs, elevators, fire suppression, water infiltration, electrical panels and more — nothing shiny and new, just taking care of what we've got.

Successful bond programs signal the optimism Dallas feels about its future. We are making long-term investments in critical infrastructure that can't normally be funded through the General Fund. And we can achieve all this with no new taxes. Please join us in voting FOR all ten of the 2024 bond propositions.

CfA holds seminar, resource fair

Speakers, businesses, organizations will speak to seniors on legal and financial strategies

panel of speakers will address issues including estate planning and more at Senior Source on Saturday, April 20. Businesses and organizations will also be available in a program put together by Coalition for Aging LGBT. Speakers include attorneys Derek Mergele-Rust, Jaime Duggan and Morgan Darling, and M. Angel Irvin of Irvin Insurance and Financial Services.

Shelly Skeen, Lambda Legal's South Central regional director, was scheduled to speak but has been called out of town on business. She encouraged older LGBTQ individuals to attend, noting how important it is for older LGBTQ adults to take the time to execute an estate plan and write advance directives to protect themselves and their families.

While we heard lots of stories during the AIDS crisis about families coming in and taking homes from a partner, Skeen said, that sort of thing still happens. "I received a call during COVID," she said. "Two women had been together 30 years," and when one of the women was in the hospital, her sister came in and tried to exclude her partner and kids.

"They had bank accounts together, lived together but had not legally married," Skeen said; however, their relationship qualified as a common-law marriage. So Skeen contacted the hospital and got her wife and children in to see her just days before she died.

Had the proper paperwork already been in place, whether the women were legally married or not, the hospital would have granted the family access to their loved one.

Rust said he's brushing up on legal

cases in advance of the summit, looking at "the challenges and pitfalls of some of the legislation that passed and how LGBT people can protect themselves from those."

He plans to address what documents are needed and why those documents are especially important to seniors in the LGBTQ community.

Once you've designated a guardian and your decision has been witnessed by people testifying to your competence to choose, a court can't easily question your choice. If a judge is hostile to your being transgender, he doesn't have the power to overturn your choices, Rust

explained.

"The court will look to documents" as a first choice and then for back up as well as a list of "these are the people you may not appoint."

Rust said he's also planning to address social security issues, such as whether LGBTQ couples are eligible for benefits and how common-law or informal mar-

riage status in Texas afcoalition lgbt fects eligibility. Event organizer Rob-

ert Emery added to Rust's comments, saying, "Legal documents are our best protection that will survive any challenge to marriage equality."

Emery was particularly enthusiastic about having participants engage with the representatives of a variety of organizations that will be on hand. The VA Hospital, for example, is the only hospital in Dallas that has received a score of 100 percent in every Human Right Campaign Hospital Index.

Despite "all the nonsense around don't ask, don't tell," Emery said, the VA does quality transition care.

"The Alzheimers Association will be there with lots to share about their caregiving programs," Emery continued. And Steven Graves with Medicare4USA.com will be available to answer Medicare questions or at least point you in the right direction.

Coalition for Aging LGBT has been working with senior living facilities to assist in making those facilities as safe and welcoming to LGBTQ seniors as possible. Representatives of The Landon of Lake Highlands and C.C. Young will attend. While Emery said a number of facilities in North Texas are very welcoming, the two attending are outstanding in their welcome and offering of activities.

The city of Dallas Office of Community Care will be present to discuss the city's "social, human and supportive services" for seniors to "improve their quality and standard of living."

Realtor Scott Carnes will be available to offer his services to anyone interested in upsizing or downsizing their living arrangements, and a representative from Edward Jones will offer financial management advice. Texas Instruments, which Emery described as a big supporter of CfA since the beginning, will have a table. Your Nurse Advocates will also be there with information on their healthcare options.

And The Dallas Way will explain how you can become involved in its mission to collect and preserve the history of the LGBTQ community in North Texas.

And the venue: Senior Source wants you to think of them as a resource for the LGBTQ community, Emery said.

"Senior Source wants to be available for us," he said. "They've been our partner for nine years."



evin and John share a home in the Lake Highlands section of Dallas that has been in Kevin's family since his grandparents

built it in 1955. His mother lived in the house for a number of years and, for the last six years, he has shared the sprawling ranch-style home with his husband John.

For much of the time Kevin and John have occupied the house, it's been under construction. And it's still not finished. Yet the home, with its beautiful renovations and expansion, has been chosen to be part of this year's White Rock Tour of



Homes to be held this weekend.

The 16th annual home tour will be held on April 20 and 21 from noon to 5 p.m. each day. Tickets are \$25 in advance and \$30 during the weekend and are available at WRHomeTour.com. All money collected goes to DISD's Hexter Elementary.

John and Kevin expanded their house to include a new master suite and office.

In an area that used to include a kitchen and the old master bedroom, walls were removed to create an open kitchen area and a great room.

"We expanded our living space where we spend time," they said.

Sitting on more than an acre of land, the newly expanded house doesn't overpower the property like so many East Dallas McMansions do. Instead, it gracefully compliments the contours of the land.

As they planned the expansion, the men "respected the architecture and history of the house," John said.

He explained that the mid-century home was built during an era of larger windows, minimal trim and generous interior use of brick. Those features were carried through into the expanded master suite. Although smaller closets were a feature of that era's houses, the new master closet they describe as "really large."

Have you met the trans handyperson Mercury Stardust making a splash on socials?

> hen you need a handyperson, who you gonna call? Well, she may not be close by, but

Mercury Stardust is willing to help by way of her socials. Stardust is the Trans Handy Ma'am of TikTok, Instagram and Patreon fame, as well as an author, speaker, educator and advocate.

Via her socials and website, Stardust offers lessons to her followers about home maintenance, DIY projects and even tool recommendations, all knowledge gleaned from her 17 years of doing the work. Among her topics have been drywall repair, replacing an outlet and fixing garbage disposals. Alongside her expertise, Stardust also drops knowledge on her life story and her trans advocacy.

Stardust grew up in rural Wisconsin where she embraced her authentic self by way of burlesque. As she found her own truth, she hopes her story connects with queer youth.

Along with her own story resonating with the community across social media, Stardust also hosts her annual TikTok-a-Thon for Trans Healthcare for Point of Pride. Earlier this month, Stardust posted that her efforts were able to raise \$2 million for the organization and vowed to do the 'thon every March 31 on Trans Day of Visibility.

She also wrote the book Safe and Sound: A Renter-Friendly Guide to Home Repair. In it, she empowers her readers to tackle projects that won't piss off the landlord, offering up more than 50 simple tips on various projects. The book covers basic knowledge on plumbing, electrical work and carpen-

try that could be of use for any type of homeowner. As a bonus, the book also gives illustrations and QR codes for video instruction.

On YouTube, Stardust answers questions on the podcast *Maintenance is a Drag* which also features a guest queen in every episode.

"This will work on plaster and lathe and drywall. This also works on pictures, but for shelves and TVs, I recommend always finding at least one stud."Cabinet repair,

Stardust talks about those pesky cabinet doors that are hanging on for dear life. Instead of installing a whole new door, she shows you how to fix the existing door with a repair plate.

• Preparing for a road trip, June 2022

You may just fill up the tank and check the tires, but Stardust gives a quick checklist of what to look for under the hood before hitting the road. No worries about lifting it up only to stand there looking confused. Stardust does it all in a fabulous red dress as well.

• Loose doorknobs, Oct. 2023

With just two items, Stardust shows how easy it is to fix those wobbly door knobs. More importantly,

she stresses that if something doesn't work right, we don't have to just put up with it.

• Low water pressure, Aug. 2022

What's more annoying than the sink not pushing out enough water? DIY plumbing is scary. But Stardust tells us what makes that happen and the simple solution to getting a healthy stream in no time.

Need to hire an arborist? Just be sure — about everything

ith spring now upon us, property owners can find themselves in need of tree maintenance.

But many are unsure how to accomplish this. Sometimes trees may be dying, or maybe they look a little different from before. Texas Trees Foundation recommends several steps for property owners before selecting an arborist and has released a set of commonly asked questions to help with this process.

First, what is the Texas Trees Foundation? This organization has served as a catalyst in creating a reimagined green legacy for North Texas and this year is celebrating 40 years of addressing urban forestry issues in Dallas.

Scientific research has led to Texas Trees Foundation's vision of transforming outdoor spaces into greener, cleaner, cooler and healthier communities while also educating the public on the social, economic, environmental and health benefits that trees provide.

What does an arborist do? Also known as "tree surgeons," arborists are dedicated to the practice of arboriculture — the cultivation, management and study of individual trees, shrubs, vines and other perennial woody plants.

What services does an arborist provide? Arborists focus on proper tree pruning to improve or maintain the health of a tree and improve structure and on removal of dead limbs within the canopy to improve safety. They also determine whether or not a tree needs to be removed and do emergency work and assessments, such as assessing and addressing tree damage after a storm.

Arborists also advise on when/ where/how to plant a tree, or what kind of tree to plant. Some arborists work for companies that will acquire trees and plant for you. *Overall plant health care services.* After an arborist assesses your trees, they can recommend many kinds of services such as fertilization, soil decompaction, spraying/injecting for insects and diseases, etc.

When should I contact an arborist? Contact an arborist if you see the tips of branches throughout the canopy of your tree dying back; if you see the leaves of your tree changing color when they should not or if they look patchy; if an

event happens that damages your tree, whether it be weather or mechanical.

Other times you should contact an arborist are if you are having any kind of construction happening on your property near your tree or trees; if you are concerned about watering your tree too much or too little (watering needs vary throughout the year); if you have any questions about properly mulching your tree; if you see strange insects or caterpillars on your tree (Beetles like to drill holes into the trunk of the tree and cause damage within, and caterpillars like to eat the leaves in the canopy and can defoliate a tree quickly); if you see any kind of fungus growing on your tree; if there is any obvious decay within a tree and/ or you are worried about it falling; if you are concerned about limbs hanging over your house, or growing into power lines that cross your property.

How do I hire an arborist? Look for membership in a professional organization such as the International Society of Arboriculture, the Tree Care Industry Association or the American Society of Consulting Arborists. You can begin by visiting ISATexas.com to find a certified arborist near you.

To verify if the arborist has an ISA Certified Arborist credential, check TreesAreGood.org and use its arborist search tool.

From then on, it's time for due diligence. Ask for proof of insurance (liability and workman's compensation) and the phone number of the insurance company if you are not satisfied. Ask for references to find out where the company has done work similar to the work you are requesting.

Unless you know and are comfortable with the arborist, get more than one estimate. Be wary of individuals who go door-to-door and offer bargains for performing tree work. Good arborists will only perform accepted practices. For example, practices such as topping a tree or using climbing spikes on live trees are not necessary.

Don't just accept the low bid. Compare all the above to the bids.

What are the different types of arborists? Board certified master arborists are recognized by their peers and the public as having reached the highest level of certification offered by ISA. Hiring a BCMA provides tree owners and government decision makers the opportunity to become better informed about proper tree care and their selection of services based on the expertise represented by the credential.

Municipal arborists manage publicly-owned trees in cities and towns and are usually employed by cities, counties, or another public agency.

Commercial arborists either own or work for businesses that provide tree care on a fee basis. They can be hired to do work for individuals or public agencies.

Utility arborists manage trees along utility rights-of-way. They can be employed by the utility or contracted to do tree clearance.

Arboricultural consultants are technical experts who diagnose tree problems, do tree appraisals, and provide management programs for individuals, businesses, or public agencies.



In the shadow of **SB** 14

LGBTQ HEALTH

Texas law banning gender-affirming care for trans youth harms children, families and trans adults

> ina Biffle started P.L.A.C., the Parker County LGBTQ+ Awareness Community, in Weatherford in 2019. In 2023, Republican lawmakers passed

Senate Bill 14 restricting doctors in Texas from giving minors puberty blockers and hormone therapy to treat gender dysphoria, the dissonance some people feel between their sex assigned at birth and their gender identity.

Under the law, doctors who provide puberty blockers or hormone therapy to minors to treat gender dysphoria can have their medical licenses revoked. The law also prohibits health insurance plans from covering these treatments for gender dysphoria.

Biffle said she's worked with many young people who experience gender dysphoria. She said that, with SB 14 now on the books as law, she fears for their lives.

"We've seen a rise in suicide attempts and self-harm [since the bill passed] because these kids are not being allowed to continue the health care they once had," Biffle said. "Especially those in poverty who are on Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program. Where they were once able to afford therapy, they don't have access to that anymore."

She's also talked with parents of transgender children, noting that, "In our community, parents of trans teens are very scared their kids won't make it to adulthood, just based on these bills and the fear-mongering against the trans community."

So, Biffle said, parents are taking matters into their own hands when it comes to receiving care for their children. "We're seeing an uptick of parents reaching out to find other avenues to support their children because medical avenues aren't able to progress in Texas," she explained, adding that she knows parents who are finding support groups, homeschooling their children and even moving out of state to seek gender dysphoria health care.

Bri Flowers, a transgender psychiatric nurse practitioner at Flowers Family Psychiatry, said she provides therapy and prescribes medication treatments for other transgender people. But, she added, "I have many clients who have not been able to access treatment. I also have many clients who were previously receiving treatment who are not able to anymore." She said some of her patients are making "escape plans" to properly care for themselves or their children.

"I was working with a family who had a trans child, and they made the decision to leave the country," Flowers said. "The problem isn't just in Texas; It's all over the [United] States."

Thanks to SB 14, Texas is now one of 23 states that restrict some form of gender-affirming care for transgender people under 18. Other states, like California and New York, have passed laws protecting access to care.

Flowers said that in West Virginia, the legislature is targeting therapists, psychiatrists and psychologists who treat transgender people. In South Carolina, a bill proposed in January would ban mental healthcare for transgender youth under 18 years old.

"The only thing that's really gonna do anything about it is sweeping federal legislation," Flowers said. "This is not isolated; it is widespread. A lot of my patients are correct in their fears that if things don't go their way in November, this is all going to get a lot worse."

P.L.A.C. offers a service called Transformation Station, a shop that helps people who are transitioning find clothing that fits their gender expression. It was "born out of a growing need for LGBTQ-inclusionary clothing," Biffle explained. "We don't cater to children, and we only offer adult clothing. But we do see teenagers come in on occasion."

Biffle said she's watched her daugh-



ter's transgender friends struggle to feel safe in their own bodies. She said she researched puberty blockers, among the medical treatments banned by SB 14, and has found them to be a safe alternative to struggling with gender dysphoria.

"They don't hurt you; they just delay puberty," Biffle said. "Puberty starts when you get off of them. After therapy, it's the safest option for trans children. And years of therapy have to happen before you work up to puberty blockers."

But, Flowers said, while hormone replacement therapy and puberty blockers are both incredibly important, the first place patients receive gender-affirming care is in a therapist's office. "No one in Texas has written legislation targeting that, but I don't think it's far-fetched to think that may happen," she warned.

In January, the Texas Supreme Court heard a case, *Loe v. Texas*, in which a group of parents argued the new law violates their parental rights by stopping them from providing medical care for their children. They also argue it discriminates against transgender children on the basis of sex.

"I absolutely think a parent has every right to choose what their child needs," Biffle said. "Just as parents are arguing that they have the right to choose what school their child goes to, they also get to choose their child's healthcare."

She said that she believes that children who are emancipated from their parents have the right to choose what happens to their body as well: "If they have the rights of an adult, they have the right to choose to care for themselves as well."

In court, lawmakers argued that this ban would protect children from undue medical procedures.

But, Biffle said, "Parents are constantly trying to protect their children. And treatments like puberty blockers, talk therapy and, later on, hormone treatments, help those children stay alive.

"Hell would freeze over before a parent lets their child suffer through a life-threatening condition without seeking help."

She also noted that transgender humans make up 0.6 percent of the population. According to a 2022 study by


the Williams Institute, 1.4 percent of the transgender population were between 13 and 17 years old. That means that there are roughly 300,000 children suffering from gender dysphoria in the United States.

"It's not like throngs of people are making these decisions for their children," Biffle said.

Flowers argued that the parental rights argument is a red herring rooted in hypocrisy. "The legislature will defend those parents as long as the parents align with their point of view," she said. "They say, 'You can do whatever you want with your kids' healthcare — unless we don't agree with it.'

"It doesn't really matter what parents want, it's what the people in power want. What they don't like, they'll criminalize."

Flowers said rhetoric around SB 14 is deterring trans adults from medically transitioning, as well. She said it's affecting adults who thought gender-affirming care was no longer legal in Texas for



them, either.

"I have people who are deciding if they want to medically transition who are waiting until after the 2024 election, people who are thinking it will get worse before it gets better," Flowers said. "Legislation has been targeting the youth, but the rhetoric has been bleeding into the entire trans community overall."

While Prism Health North Texas never offered transitioning services to minors,


the organization does offer assitance to adults living with gender dysphoria in Texas. PHNTX's website says that the organization is dedicated to providing a safe space for transgender health care needs, as long as the patients are at least 18 years old.

The organization offers hormone therapy, PrEP, routine wellness exams, behavioral health counseling, medical support letters for name and gender change, HIV/STI testing and treatment, cervical and anal pap smears and approvals, and referrals for gender-affirming surgery.

"If you are 18-years-old or older, planning on transitioning, or have already begun your transition journey, we have the right health care services for you," the site reads.

The organization is also catering to those who don't have the proper insurance coverage: "Insurance is accepted, and some services can be provided at little to no cost. Whether you are under-insured, have low income or simply cannot pay, you will not be turned away. Our access to financial aid programs will help you afford the care you need."

As the 2024 elections loom ever closer, both Flowers and Biffle said they're anxious about laws that will be drawn up and passed to further oppress the LGBTQ community. "With how the legislature's rhetoric is trending, this year is going to be even worse than last year," Flowers said. "I'm not looking forward to it."

With the automotive industry historically exclusionary to women and queer folks, Chaya Milchtein is working to make it more open and approachable. Her work as a journalist made it natural for her to transfer her knowledge and experience to a book written, as she says, for everyone.

"This book was written with every car owner in mind," Milchtein said. "Even people who have been driving for a long time can learn something."

The guide covers everything from the process of buying a car to maintenance and repairs, accompanied by data and real-life stories. The book tour was arranged by Milchtein herself with the goal of introducing local followers to a queer-affirming repair shop. And as it

working in the automotive industry. She has been openly queer from the first shop she walked into and acknowledges that it made her journey more complicated.

"From the very beginning it felt worth it to me to bring my full self, even though it is a very conservative industry," Milchtein said. She emphasized that mechanics don't just deal with their colleagues but the general public as well.

After dealing with rude customers and inappropriate bosses, Milchtein decided to work for herself full time. "I'm okay if I'm not for everybody, if who I am and how I bring myself puts off certain people," Milchtein said. "Now I'm able to choose the work I do, and the people who are prejudiced against me are just going to miss out."

Despite this hardship, Milchtein has forged her own path as Mechanic Shop Femme. In addition to her educational content on social media, she also offers online classes and public workshops. Her focus is empowerment through education so that people are met with dignity and respect.

And after a decade doing this work, Milchtein has seen changes. "What keeps me going is the positive stories I hear from people I've helped, and the support I receive online," she said.

"When we incorporated the old master suite into the kitchen, we took down a wall, added counter space and seating in the great room," John said.

And, he said, they used and reclaimed as much of the old materials as possible.

What was a three bedroom, 2½ bathroom house has become a three bedroom, 3½ bathroom house. While larger, the space doesn't overwhelm.

Along with indoor expansion, outside they added what they call a cocktail pool. The 50-by-30-foot pool is only 4½ feet deep. In the lovely space around the pool, they recently hosted a party for 75 people.

For the home tour, docents will be located around the house, pointing out design features and giving directions. Does that make the home feel more like a museum?

"We want it to feel like it's a space that's lived in, not a museum," Kevin said.

John jokingly said he expects the experience of opening their home to be more like, "300 queens coming through your house, judging."

9 LGBTQ-inclusive kids' books for National Poetry Month

pril is National Poetry Month, and these recent books in verse for young readers prove that LGBTQ-inclusive titles can be as beautiful and powerful as any today. The first three are picture books; the rest are middle grade and up.

Queer and Fearless: Poems Celebrating the Lives of LGBTQ+ Heroes, by Rob Sanders, illustrated by Harry Woodgate (Penguin), offers biographical portraits of 17 historical and contemporary LGBTQ political and social activists. Sanders carefully matches various poetic forms with

1963 the March on Washington. A few paragraphs of prose on each figure add informational substance to the emotional connections that the poems create.

Jimmy's Rhythm & Blues: The Extraor-

dinary Life of James Baldwin, by Michelle Meadows, illustrated by Jamiel Law (HarperCollins), is a lyrical biography of Baldwin, capturing something of the rhythm of his work in its blank verse and honoring both his Black and gay identities. Law's warm, evocative illustrations are the perfect complement to Meadows' words.

Can We Please Give the Police Department to the Grandmothers? by Junauda Petrus, illustrated by Kristen Uroda (Dutton), began as a viral poem that Petrus performed after the 2014 shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Mo. In it, she envisions a world remade, with police salaries given to grandmothers who cruise the streets in "badass" vintage automobiles, blaring "old-school jams" and offering help and hope. Two of the "grandmas" are depicted with beards, though their exact identities are unstated. This is a joyous and empowering imagining of a future that could be.

The Song of Us, by Kate Fussner (Katherine Tegen Books), is a loose retelling of the myth of Orpheus and Eurydice, made modern and queer in this novel in verse. Seventh-grader Olivia is a poet, and when new girl and musician Eden shows up to the Poetry Club one day, it's love at first sight. Through alternating poems in each girl's voice, across a variety of poetic forms, we move from love to its broken aftermath, and then to Olivia's plan to win Eden back through the power of poetry. Fussner delves into first love, social pressures, family relationships and coming of age, giving us poetry as passion, action and emotion.



Dear Mothman, by Robin Gow (Amulet Books), is an elegantly crafted novel in verse about an autistic, transgender boy moving through grief to find belonging. Sixth-grader Noah's friend Lewis, the only other trans boy in school, has died in a car accident. Noah begins writing letters to Mothman, Lewis's favorite cryptid, sharing his feelings of grief with a creature who is as misunderstood as Noah himself. Gradually, Noah makes friends with a small group of fellow outsiders and even develops a first crush. But will this help him as he is pulled towards following where Mothman may lead? Gow plumbs Noah's thoughts with perception, sensitivity, and sometimes brilliant turns of phrase.

Blood Brothers, by Rob Sanders (Reycraft), is a powerful novel in verse set during the AIDS crisis of the 1980s. Protagonist Calvin and his two brothers have hemophilia and contract AIDS from transfusions meant to help them. When others in their small Florida community find out, the boys are banned from school, scouts and their church, while their single mom fights to protect them.




None of them appear queer, but there are hints that their teacher is — and the topic is clearly intertwined with the homophobia of the era. Inspired by the real stories of Ryan White and the Ray brothers, but fictionalized to dramatic effect, this is a tale of bias and narrow-mindedness but also of love, resilience and the power of allies. The Lonely Book, by Meg Grehan (Little Island Books), is the story of a twomom family, their magical bookshop and one of their children who comes out as nonbinary, told through the eyes of the child's sibling. The story conveys gentle messages about learning to be comfortable in ourselves and helping others do the same; navigating change; the power of families and the importance of books where people can both see themselves and learn about others.

Always Matt, by Lesléa Newman, illustrated by Brian Britigan (Abrams Comicarts), is a moving exploration of the life and legacy of Matthew Shepard, the young man murdered in 1998 because he was gay.

Newman, author of *Heather Has Two Mommies* and more than 80 other books, reflected on Shepard's death in her 2012 October Mourning: A Song for Matthew Shepard, which won a Stonewall Honor. Here, she focuses on his life, painting a poignant portrait in free verse. Despite being fully (and beautifully) illustrated, the subject matter and length (nearly 60 pages, plus an epilogue) gear this towards older children. The publisher's target is ages 14 and up, though I think older middle schoolers may also find value in it. Adults as always should assess based on the specific young people in their lives.

Becoming Billie Holiday, by Carole Boston Weatherford, illustrated by Floyd Cooper (Wordsong), is a series of first-person poems with lightly fictionalized vignettes from the life of Eleanora Fagan, whom the world knew as Billie Holiday. The verses take us from her birth through her performance of "Strange Fruit" at age 25. One poem clearly acknowledges her bisexuality; others show the hardships of her early life, including her rape by a neighbor. While these topics place it at the upper end of the middle-grade range, it is powerful and insightful and won a Coretta Scott King Author Honor.
