



# **George Santos announces** his Only Fans page

In a post on X, formerly known as Twitter, gay former U.S. Rep. George Santos announced his new Only Fans page. This isn't the first time Santos has turned to the web to make money. After leaving Congress, he joined Cameo, making personalized videos and earning hundreds of dollars for each one recorded.

"The moment you've all been waiting for. Only on #OnlyFans will you get the full behind the scenes access to everything I'm working on. See ya all there!" he wrote.

Access to his page is just \$29.99 per month with a 10 percent discount when you sign up for three months.

And he promises no porn even though Only Fans is mostly adult content.

"You do know it's a content platform not just pron [sic]? Lol," he wrote on X in response to a disparaging comment.

Santos is currently awaiting trial on 23 federal counts related to his election including wire fraud, identity theft and more and he has pleaded not guilty. Last year, Santos became only the sixth member of the U.S. House of Representatives to ever be expelled from Congress.


# SGM Alliance announces call to action to address representation issues in clinical studies

In commemoration of Pride Month, the non-profit SGM Alliance announced a collaboration for companies in the healthcare industry to "work together on best practices to promote equal representation for sexual and gender minorities.".

According to an SGM Alliance press release announcing the effort, several of the world's largest healthcare companies - including Eli Lilly and Company, Gilead Sciences Inc., and Pfizer Inc. — have joined the collaboration.

"SGM populations include, but are not limited to, individuals who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and/or intersex," the press release explained.

"These communities face significant disparities in healthcare access and outcomes, and historically, SGM populations have rarely been represented in clinical studies," the press release continued. "As a result, even while some states have adopted anti-discrimination legislation and demonstrated progress regarding LGBTQIA+ representation in clinical studies in recent decades, many of the disparities in healthcare go largely unaddressed."

# Navigating the intimacy of gay-straight friendships

True intimacy isn't only sexual

Walked through the crowd at DC's Capital Pride on June 8 as groups were lining up to set off on the Pride parade. Walking down a crowded side street, I saw one of the loveliest men in town, a straight ally. He greeted me warmly, hugged me, and kissed me on the cheek. I thought happily, how times have changed!

Despite the risk we now face of legal setbacks from a right-wing Supreme Court, the greater social and cultural acceptance LGBTQ people have won is largely beyond the reach of politicians and judges. Changed expectations are hard to erase.

Generational change is not the same everywhere. Cities attract people who take diversity more in stride. Urban/rural divides open us to wedge politics. We have more work to do to help people see that differences are not a threat.

Something I have experienced more frequently in recent years is straight men who enjoy the company of gay men, and even flirt with them. They are not interested sexually, but neither are they threatened in any way. I find it refreshing.

I have had straight neighbors like that. He is the kind of person who lights up any room he is in. Normally in the morning he darted down the back stairs but if I was leaving for work at the same time, he rode down the elevator with me, because he found me amusing. Once he said he had a sore shoulder from a sports injury, and I said I gave a very soothing massage. He laughed in a way that melted me into the floor, but that was as far as it went. One winter evening he and his girlfriend joined me on our building's roof to observe a lunar eclipse.

After he moved to Virginia to live with his girlfriend, I encountered them at the annual high heel race on 17th Street in Washington the week before Halloween, which draws large and diverse crowds.

There is a prominent Washingto-

whom I feel a close friendship, as distinct from a professional one. He is straight and happily married, but then I myself am in a committed re-

lationship. The public figure and I have a lot in common on policy matters, but we are also simpatico on a personal level. As time passes, I increasingly meet him more as a friend and confidante than an advocate.

Every conversation with an attractive, friendly person doesn't involve thoughts of sexual conquest. The mix of affection and desire varies from case to case. Re-

spect that grows with understanding increases the comfort level, as does a sense of humor.

I have a dear friend with whom I lost touch decades ago when he moved to another city. We reconnected a few years back via LinkedIn. He and I were very close in our late 20s. We felt a natural connection. There was love between us, but I also desired him, which he could not reciprocate. Our mutual bond proved stronger than our differences.

Once over lunch he told me that his fiancée did not want children, though he very much did. After joking that he might as well marry me in that case, I told him he needed to find a woman who wanted children. Which he did. It is good to be in touch again. His auburn hair has gone white, but our feelings remain.

As the social space grows in which we can navigate our differences, safety increases. In private encounters we don't think of an entire community looking over our shoulders; yet to some extent, each of us carries an invisible crowd with us.

With certain close straight friends, it almost feels as if we had a torrid sexual affair and then became friends.

The 1930 song "Georgia On My Mind," by Hoagy Carmichael and Stuart Gorell, has these lines:

"Other arms reach out to me, Other eyes smile tenderly, Still in peaceful dreams I see The road leads back to you."

Those lyrics come to mind as I think of my partner overseas. Loneliness can make fools of us. But having given my heart to someone, I am less beset by the restlessness that preoccupied me in my youth. Thinking of the man who has proven his love for me in countless moments of grace, I realize I am already home. How blessed I am when a sweet straight friend, with a chaste kiss, shows he gets that.

## **Deryck Todd**

Dallas Voice: Tell me about yourself. What is your background, and how did you get into the business of presenting events like this? Tell me a little bit about the team you have created to bring all this together. Deryck Todd: Well, I'm the mastermind behind Strut. With a background in event production and creative direction, I basically have a PhD in sleep loss. I stumbled into this business \*grumble grumble\* years ago out of a love for the community. Coco Brown came up to me in a basement club called Lotus and said "Do you want to host this party?" I didn't know what that

meant at the time, but the rest is history. My team is like the Avengers of event planning — each one bringing a unique superpower in design, marketing, logis-

tics and, of course, making everything look effortlessly chic (including sleep loss).

I cold-called their Nashville locale one day and connected through mutual admiration for creating community and authentic experience. Virgin Hotels' ethos of innovation and inclusivity aligns perfectly with Strut's mission, making this

an Antonio will celebrate Pride on June 29 with its official celebration Pride Bigger Than Texas. To bookend the month, the city kicked off the month with a Pride River Parade by Visit San Antonio that

featured *Drag Race* favorite Jorgeous and performances at the La Villita's Arneson River Theatre. A precursor to the main event next week, you might need to figure out how to fill your time in between the parade, the bars and showering from the Texas heat.

Pride San Antonio (PrideSanAntonio. org) will host the day-long festival and parade. The festival will feature live, entertainment, PRIDE wedding, a health fair and local LGBTQ and ally small businesses and vendors from 11 a.m.-7 p.m. in Crockett Park.

At 9 p.m. begins the largest LGBTQ night parade. Load up with coolers, ice chests, food and drinks which are all permitted along the parade route.

If you're making a weekend of it, try these stops for some added diversions.

## **Foods**

# Los Barrios Mexican Restaurant, 4223 Blanco Road.

This staple has been around since 1979 and is known for its puffy tacos, but the chimichurri sauce is metaphorically gold (it's actually green). Tip: pour it over everything. Founded by a single mother and her business partner, her children and grandchildren now run the place and have expanded with three other restaurant brands.

The drag brunch here is a mixed bag. The buffet could have used more food options and coffee options don't really exist unless you have a server who can improvise an iced coffee. But the drag performers serve attitude, glamour and laughs on a high level. Have the singles handy for a lot of deserved tips.

Abounding Prosperity will have its mobile testing unit at Resource Center offering on-the-spot testing with results given in minutes.



Recently, you've gone back to being an independent artist to take a more hands on approach to your career. How has that been going? It's been such a relief for me. It's the best way for me to have this kind of freedom and control over what I'm doing. I might get to a point where I need the support of a label, but right now it feels like the best thing I can do is just keep going on this path. I feel a moment of growth and change coming, almost like a rebirth in my music. I want to see how big things can get with just me and my fans. It feels like I'm in a very monumental part of my career.

There are types of people that like to really take their time and craft the perfect story to tell, who work best with a label. That doesn't work for me because I want to tell the story as it's happening. I want to be very present, to do it in real time.

Is music the way you process everything that happens to you? I think it is a part of how I process things. I just feel so inthe-moment. I make a song as I'm feeling that thing and then want to put it out as I'm still feeling it. Being in a label was pretty hard because I can't fake enthusiasm, I want to roll with what I'm feeling right now. I have some friends who are signed with a major label who made a song five years ago that didn't come out until now. That just doesn't work for me. I'm a Capricorn, so I'm very entrepreneurial, I want to figure it out as it happens. Once I write something I want to put it out and then get to sing it live. When I perform live it feels like the audience and I are connecting with the same emotions in the present moment. It makes me feel understood

How do you continue to stay inspired and motivated? I'm still trying to figure that out. That might be the hardest part for me. I'm an only child so I'm used to having a big imagination and being creative. But during the COVID-19 pandemic, I couldn't connect as much with my fans. I couldn't see them and remember what it was like performing with an audience. Now that I'm back to touring it's gotten a lot better. At shows and online with things like Instagram lives I can gauge what people want and see their reactions.

Do you feel like social media has impacted your career? Yes, it facilitates connecting with fans. When I started this tour, I went in with the intention of having fun and seeing what songs connect the most and what emotions they evoke. After seeing reactions in person and online I

actually changed what song I am going to release next. I love party music so much, but decided to switch directions because what's needed right now is a feeling of comfort and warmth. Fans can get excited for the vulnerable Lauren to come back out. That's the beauty of being independent, I can make whatever decisions I want. And right now, the best thing I can do is let my fans lead the way.

What do you think makes your shows so unique? My shows are very interactive. I have segments where fans yell stuff out and it starts conversation. There's one part of the show I call teatime, where I ask for people to share any queer gossip. We give them the mic to let them share, and with the queer community there's always drama.

At one of my shows a girl shared that she broke no contact with a situationship from five years ago. The clip actually went viral on Instagram. I think we like to share the drama because when you're growing up queer you miss out on that. Either we're not able to express it or don't even know we're queer yet. Music is a place where many people find themselves. I didn't have many queer musician role models growing up. That's why I want people to feel like they can come as they are to my shows. It's a place to celebrate pride and have fun.

As someone in the entertainment industry, do you feel a lot of pressure to label yourself and your identity? I have felt a lot of pressure. I think it's important to check in with yourself and make sure you're not letting what other people think affect you. Personally, I feel like people think I'm way more masc than I am. Growing up in a small town, it never felt like people understood me, and that happens as a celebrity as well. It adds an extra level of perception. People are very vocal with what they call artists and often think they know more about me than thev do. I know that's a big reason celebrities get in their heads; they hear so much feedback about who they are. I'm still trying to make sense of who I am. it's just a little harder with so many voices.

What message do you have for younger fans figuring out their identities? If a label makes you feel better, find the one that feels right for you. But you can also just be who you are. You don't have to feel pressure to find a label or to fit into a certain category. You just have to be present and honest with yourself. If it feels like a lot of pressure to find the terminology that matches you the most, you can free yourself from that and just be you.

Brooke Lynn Hytes: It was actually ballet that got me into drag in the first place. Before I was a full time drag queen, I was a company dancer with Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo, which is an all-male drag ballet troupe that parodies the conventions of romantic and classical ballet. After that I had the bug and, well, here we are today!

Glamorous as it looks, drag is your career, and people can get burned out on a career.

What is it about drag that keeps you engaged? Since drag is your job now, how has your approach to it changed? The creative outlet is something that always has and always will excite me. Piecing together the looks and performances for stage, television, just keeps my mind moving and stimulated! I also love being my own boss, I'm not sure I could handle someone telling me what to do!

Drag has always been a political statement. But these days, with the right-wingnuts attacking the art and the queens themselves from all sides, drag is in the spotlight and, at least in some cases, comes with some very serious issues to consider. How is this burning spotlight changing the world of drag overall, and how is it changing you personally in your career? I mean, drag has always been political. Our community has fought for decades for the rights we have, and now its our turn to continue that. I know for myself, things definitely changed when I was blessed with such a large platform. I absolutely feel a responsibility to defend my community and do my best to highlight everything I can to support it, especially initiatives to encourage voting!

On a less serious note, what's on your calendar right now? Are you working on any special projects? What's coming up



for you? And how did you get involved with Strut in Dallas? Well, LOTS of things that I can't quite talk about just yet, but trust that you will continue to see me touring the world and on your TV screens. I love Texas, and I am honored that Strut asked me to be part of their event!


"It's interesting because you have to navigate through this world as a man especially when she's in love with a man," Gonzalez said.

Choreographer Thang Dao brings his personal story in dance to 'Synergy'

horeographer Thang Dao will premiere his new piece "7 Percussive Thoughts in a Melody" this week which was commissioned

by Pegasus Contemporary Ballet. The piece is part of PCB's second annual Synergy which happens June 21 and 22 at Moody Performance Hall. But that Dao's piece will also premiere during Pride month is a bonus for the New York-based gay choreographer.

At Synergy, he will present his new piece "7 Percussive Thoughts in a Melody."

"It's an exploration of rhythm identity and in a way a metaphor," he said by phone from Barcelona. "This is a deeply personal piece as it reflects myself as a gay, Asian choreographer. The title speaks to merging distinct elements that work with one another so it's different facets of my own experience."

With the piece, he hopes to evoke a visceral response from the audience.

That he also gets to present it during Pride is a bonus.

"That's so rewarding to have this in Dallas. To work with this young company is already hopeful, but I think that for it to happen during Pride where it is celebrated in the open is a testament to how far we have come and still going," he said

Dao works as a freelance choreographer and educator. He received his formal dance education from the Juilliard School and Boston Conservatory. Among the companies he's choreographed for includes Ballet Austin, Ailey II, BalletX, Philadanco, Taiwan National University of the Arts, Jacob's Pillow, Missouri Contemporary Ballet and the Boston Conservatory.

Pegasus Contemporary Ballet is Dallas' only contemporary ballet company that also performs with live music accompaniment.

For *Synergy*, Dao has collaborated with percussionist and producer, Christopher 'Chill' Hill. After Dao had connected with PCB founder and artistic director Diana Crowder for this show, she

offered him a list of Dallas musicians to work with. When he heard Hill's piece "Knock Knock," Dao simply knew.

"I thought that this composer had such an interesting blend of sounds," he

said. "He has this mix of jazz, hip-hop and electronica that created this perfect auditory landscape. I'm so thrilled to be collaborating with an exceptionally talented musician."

Hill had to write the music while Dao's ideas percolated for the piece. For Dao, the combination of the music and the dancers and his own craft all came together rather smoothly.

"This energy that's happened has been so important. Chill [Hill's nickname] has made this beautiful soundscape for the dancers to play in, and I find them really open and inspirational. They've been helping me extract movements and ideas for this. The first time we met, we finished one section and that's quite a feat for


me," he said.

This marks the second year for PCB's *Synergy* where three pieces feature collaborations between choreographer and musician. The other musicians performing include Grammy Award-winning jazz violinist Scott Tixier and techno composer and producer Declan James. Guest choreographer artists include Dallas Black Dance Theatre's Daniel Palladino and freelance artist Michelle Thompson.

"Synergy achieved tremendous success last season, we knew this was something that had to be brought back," Crowder said in a press release. "We hope the audience takes away an appreciation for the creativity and collaboration that occurs as a result of artistic partnerships. Synergy exists to expose audiences to new art forms and genres through an accessible, engaging performance that highlights the vibrancy achieved when different artistic mediums collide in a new way."



community with an exhibition ball "to spread ballroom joy among the larger Dallas community."

He also mentioned that there will be information available to educate the community about the importance of taking this first step toward knowing their HIV status and what steps to take to access prevention including PrEP availability and safer sex options. For those testing positive, treatment information will be offered.

While AIDS activists have said for years that it's important to know your HIV status, Walker goes a step further and said, "It's important to talk about knowing your HIV status."

That's because current estimates are that 13 percent of people living with HIV are unaware they are HIV-positive. And the more people will talk about knowing their HIV status, the more will get tested.

HIV-statistics have always been slow to be released. Usually the latest available stats are two years old. But Walker said it's been even slower in recent years.



"We're still getting data from the pandemic," he said.

But of the 1.2 million people living with HIV, 13 percent includes a lot of people who could be in treatment and become less likely to spread the virus.

How do we arrive at that 13 percent figure of people who don't know? Where does that estimate come from? Walker said from contact tracing. When someone tests positive for HIV, it's reported to the county along with information on anyone that person may have had sexual

contact with.

The county's goal is to get anyone who tests positive to get into treatment. Most people on HIV medications will achieve low or undetectable viral loads. Those who are undetectable don't pass the virus to others.

Recently released statistics for Dallas County indicate 20,268 people were living with HIV in 2021. That includes 1,000 newly diagnosed cases.

Across the U.S., gay and bi men have been disproportionately impacted by HIV, making up more than half of all new cases. In Dallas, the numbers are worse for gay and bi men, who make up about 77 percent of all new cases.

Walker said the higher incidence of HIV among gay and bi men in Dallas may be a result of a number of factors. Among them is stigma.

"People are uncomfortable talking about sex," he said. "And people think they're invincible."

Public policy is another factor. Walker pointed to a bill introduced in the last session of the Legislature by state Rep. Venton Jones that would automatically include HIV testing as part of any panel of STD tests. Under current Texas law, you have to opt in, or ask for an HIV test to get one.

The goal by health professionals is to stop the spread of HIV by getting everyone infected with the virus into treatment.

"The only way to stop HIV is together," Walker said.

National HIV Testing Day will be marked in Dallas at Resource Center, 5750 Cedar Springs Road from 4-8 p.m. on Tuesday, June 25. Free.



How prevalent, or low-burn insidious (being more to the point) has homophobia-creep recently gotten in Uptown's beautiful bubble? — Go Joe Dawg Go

*Dear Dawgonnit*: The real truth, you say, eh? Well, firstly, let's just clear the elephant out of the room: These Donald Trump election years are always hell on minorities — gay, Black, Jewish, Latino, the physically handicapped, you name

it. Unless you're Caucasian, corpulent and can carp at your golf caddy, "Snap it Goombah!" whilst swallowing a Big Mac whole, glassyeved as a Gaboon viper, then you're already at a disadvantage. Chrys, Joe permit me go out on a limb here and take wild guess that your current residence

at one of those cheap Post horrors for fully two years during a recent remodel of our own place. Hellhole Gardens, I called said rental — charitably.

But listen: The leap from apartment

renters to home owners is always a nerve-racking experience under even the best circumstances. Bottom line, guys: As an interracial couple — a gay interracial couple — it's a tough row ahead, I'm not going to lie to you.

Of course, we all know discrimination is against the law, just as we all know there's no better real estate agent than a former hooker. (And they're all former hookers. But whichever one still bleaches her hair the flinty blondest, that's who you pick: more splintery than mesquite wood, just pay her the rate she tells you it's gonna take, and whichever high rise you choose, consider yourselves in!)

Highland Park's high-rise corridor parallels Turtle Creek for about a solid mile: Lush, verdant, luxuriant and sparkling, it bears no more resemblance to natural Texas topography than Neptune.

As with all residential

edifices, a building's vintage usually plays a key role into luring signatures onto a real estate sales contract. Would you prefer a newer building or an older building? Each comes with their pros and cons.

For example, in Dallas, a key divisional gauge separating what's considered

old sus new, is whether the building der consideration was built before or after battery-powered, electronic cement floor levelers first hit mainstream, high-rise construction in the mid-1980s. They were a game-changer.

At the box office, Julie Andrews and Julie Christie compete for No. 1; the future Katy Trail roars of train tracks' locomotive engines, and local phone calls don't even require area codes. An ebul-

lient Joan Crawford and husband, Alfred Steele, president of PepsiCo, wave from one of the spacious, wraparound penthouse balconies.

Ahh, the Turtle Creek High-Rise Corridor — swimmin' pools, football stars ... POP!

The bubble bursts. Reality is back. Our future's now.

Not a single Turtle Creek high rise is equipped to handle a full garage of EVs. "Electric vehicles?" sniggeringly scoffs Central Texas's blasé, fossil-reliant boards. "Honey, that day will never come here!" Indeed, rose may be the eyewear color of choice most preferred by Texans through which to view their world; albeit, denial little alters the fact that the very first target listed on the Xi/Putin American Annihilation Pact is Houston's oil refineries.

Yeah, but aside from that, Mrs. Lincoln, how was the play?

Guys, if it's the old Grande Dame high rises that tickle your fancy most, simply spend some Sunday afternoon on walkabout of your chosen favorite's lobby, grounds, pool, etc. Better yet, find someone on the inside to help you in evaluating your choice — a friend, or a friend of a friend or even a frenemy of a frenemy — who lives in the building and is privy to its most salacious secrets.

Grand Dame high-rises are notoriously difficult to run, say nothing of running well. And one should always first assess just how openly hands-on, and effective its HOA board is. Your inside source will know whether a board "coup d'etat" has taken place in the past few years and should equally be able to inform you whether the new board majority delivered on its promises — to fix the former regime's previous failings via implementing "financial-best" practices (to be interpreted however one so desires, as they mean absolutely nothing, whatsoever). Things like policy transparency, key staff retention, managerial excellence, candid concern and rightful respect for all homeowners, yadda, yadda, yadda.

Nowadays, when it comes to general managers, we've been reduced to nothing but blind luck of the draw. Some are pleasant enough, albeit, incapable of running even a lemonade stand. And others are but wolves in sheep's clothing, blessed with the anti-managerial gifts of rudeness, obfuscation and concealment.

But back to your question of homophobia, Joe: The wolves are unlikely to have any qualms whatsoever using the "F-word" against you once your back is turned: "Bougie fa\*\*ot!"

Hopefully, your inside source will already well know what's going on inside your favored choice of residence. And should there be a high level of dissent among the homeowners about the HOA board's performance, the management

company, and its general manager, beware!

As for the building I call home, its grounds and surrounding area are nothing short of gorgeous. The residents here (with but a few, rare exceptions) are kind, wonderfully accomplished people. Our building is the very nuclei of Uptown graciousness. Every tenant one meets here has the same aim: to live in the most desirous high-rise on Turtle Creek. We are all so very fortunate.

And for anyone requiring a reality check before turning molehills into mountains, I suggest taking a pleasant vacay this summer to one of those exotic wonders of reality-dose tranquility spots: Gaza, Ukraine, Nigeria, Russia, China, Israel or perhaps the tropical paradise of Haiti.

Now, guys, back to your hunt for the perfect high-rise space: Trust your instincts. If your initial concern regarding a building's general manager is, "Hmm, I dunno; something about him just doesn't feel quite ... right," then remember the immortally-prescient words of Oscar Wilde: "Only a fool doesn't judge by first impressions."



























