



### Addressing proper pet etiquette

DR. JOSH TALKS ANIMALS

ello, **Dallas** Voice friends! Welcome back to my monthly Woof column, edition. July This month, I want to address a topic that, while not directly medical, is still crucial for our pets and our interactions with the people around us: "Pet Etiquette."

There are situations involving our pets in public that may need solutions that rely on common sense, but this can sometimes be tricky. My goal is to provide some feedback that will hopefully help us navigate through these everyday scenarios.

Let's start right away!

When walking our dogs, we should be mindful of our surroundings and other pets. If you know your kiddo is not a big fan of other dogs, it's courteous to cross the street or move away when seeing another person with their dog walking towards you to avoid potential conflicts. Not all dogs are friendly with other dogs, and some might not tolerate dogs bigger or smaller than them.

It's also essential not to pet unfamiliar dogs without the owner's permission. Always ask first, and if children want to pet a dog, please make sure that the dog is comfortable with kids, and be sure to remind the children to be gentle.

Some dogs do not like kids and can show aggression towards them, even if the children are being careful. If the child is too young to interact in a calm and gentle manner, I would recommend avoiding any contact to prevent issues, because some kids can be rough with pets, and those pets can respond in a negative way.

Visiting dog parks or areas where leash use is optional can be challenging for some dogs, so please ensure your dog behaves appropriately and continually supervise your kiddo.

If your dog tends to hump anything that moves, bark excessively or act aggressively, they might not be ready for parks or similar social settings. On the other hand, if your dog is very shy or submissive, you will want to consider this, too, as parks can be more stressful

than enjoyable for them.

You may want consider training and/or behavioral management to help these furry kids through these situations. Additionally, there are supplements and potentially

even medications that your doctor may recommend. But these would be based on a consultation and further assessment of what may be going on.

Some of us may not have the luxury of having a private backyard and may need to walk our dogs outside in common, public areas. I want to share some insight on two common mistakes to avoid.

The first common mistake is not keeping your dog on a leash at all times, including inside until they are safely back indoors with the door closed behind you. This may seem excessive, but it's vital for preventing conflicts with other dogs or people.

If you walk your kitty on a leash, avoid areas frequented by dogs, as many dogs are not that friendly to cats.

The second mistake is leaving your dog's waste behind. Always pick up after your pets right away to prevent leaving potential parasites in the environment and to keep shared spaces clean.

You may think these rules are obvious, but unfortunately, we see these mistakes happen too often.

Some of our pets can have separation anxiety or stress and exhibit destructive behavior or bark/meow excessively. In an ideal world, this would be addressed

with behavioral management through an animal behaviorist. You can also consult with your veterinarian, who may recommend different routines, supplements or, if needed, prescription medications that could help your kiddo feel better. This helps us raise well-behaved pets, avoid conflicts with neighbors and ensure our pets' happiness.

As always, I hope this Woof column can help to improve our relationships with our pets and the people around us. If we follow these basic recommendations, we should have healthier, happier families, and I hope we are reminded to be considerate of those around us at all times. As always, take care and abrazos!

# Warped reasoning?

So-called Christian pastor condemns depictions of loving parents as 'child abuse' while suggesting that feeding the hungry violates God's word

s I write this, it is still Pride Month, a.k.a. June, and I have just spent the day at a Pride event in the city where my wife works as a teacher. It was a very small gathering at a picnic pavilion — no drag queens, no thumping dance music (unless you count La Roux's "Bulletproof"), no merch tables.

It felt like a family gathering: hotdogs on the grill, picnic tables set up with face painting and plenty of arts and crafts. I have seven temporary tattoos that I applied myself while my wife did a little decoupage, as one does at a Pride event.

As I sat there eating Skittles, kids came up to the table and asked if they could have tattoos, too. They thought I was a volunteer. I was more than happy to help. Most kids chose rainbows. At the face painting table, a kid maybe 9 years old asked for a bisexual Pride flag. The next kid asked for a pansexual flag. A parent standing by was wearing a shirt that read, "God loves you in a gay way."

I looked at my wife in wonder. Things sure have changed since we were kids.

I couldn't help thinking of how anti-LGBTQ conservatives would see this altogether very wholesome and homegrown event as something negative. For example, Christian Nationalist Pastor Paul Blair, who recently went on a rant against Pride Month on his Liberty Pastors YouTube channel.

According to Right Wing Watch, Blaire showed a photo of a child holding hands with an adult who is presumably his mother at a Pride event. The child is wearing a rainbow tutu and beads.

"This is child abuse," Blair said.

lihood that he is going to wind up on drugs and contemplating suicide because of his mother's abuse."

That is ... well, quite a leap.

If Blair and people who think like him really cared about addiction and suicide, let alone child abuse, they would push for public policy that actually addresses these issues. But they don't.

Conservatives are big on "personal responsibility." If you're poor, it's your fault. If you have an addiction, it's your fault. If you have a mental illness, it's your fault. God forbid that tax money should go toward, say, addiction treatment or the alleviation of poverty.


Nope. God would obviously want tax cuts for the rich, which is Republican doctrine.

And one Blair supports.

"Here's God's design," Blair said at an event in 2023. "It wasn't for a federal welfare system; the family is supposed to care for the family. Parents raise their children and provide for them as they're young, and then as parents get older, their kids are to honor their parents, which means to provide for their needs as they get old. Throughout scripture, slothfulness and laziness is condemned as sin."

He also recites a quote he attributes to Benjamin Franklin: "Hunger is a great motivator."

It's pretty callous to tell a hungry



person that they should stop being so lazy. Last time I checked, Jesus would have given that person food.

Blair then pulls up a photo of two dads with their kid on one of their shoulders. The dads are smiling, and the kid is leaning down to kiss one of them. Blair calls this "pedophilia."

It makes me really angry to think of all of the kids who really are abused when people like Blair call something like taking a child to a Pride event child abuse or a dad showing affection to his child pedophilia. How callous can you be to turn a blind eye to real suffering to punish people who don't think like you?

He points to two smiling people in the background, referring to one as a "wench" and one as an f-slur. "They ought to be intervening and putting [the dad kissing his son] face down on the concrete for abusing this child," Blair said. "I can't imagine that this is going on in the streets in the United States of America, and there's no one here that's godly enough or courageous enough to protect this child from this. One day, these men and these accomplices to the crime will stand before God and they're gonna give an account."

Maybe Blair is right. But something tells me that God is going to be much more concerned with how Blair thinks it's better to watch a person starve to death than to take a kid to a parade.

# **Duel** – identity

#### **BEYOND THE STAGE**

Playwright brings sword fights and queer love front and center in Prism Movement Theater's 'La Maupin'

ome serendipitous force must have been at play in 2020 for Kelsey Milbourn. During those high COVID times, the artist happened upon a podcast that covered lost history, and one particular episode stuck out to Milbourn so insistently that they could not get out of their mind.

"I even remember where I was when I heard it," they said. "We were rehearsing in my living room, and when this show talked about a bisexual duelist who was a famous opera star and renowned for fighting men, my ears perked up."

That was Milbourn's introduction to Julie d'Aubigny.

Four years later, Milbourn is telling d'Aubigny's story in *La Maupin: The French Abomination*, a movement play which opens July 11 as part of ATTPAC's Elevator Project by Prism Movement Theater.

The idea stirred in Milbourn's head, but at that time, the artist admitted, she was worried about telling such stories.

"Doing queer plays felt like a scary idea at the time. Trump was in office, and people being who they were, I just wondered then if this was the right time," Milbourn said. "Plus, I thought, would anyone see a queer play about this human and their experience living out loud."

But Milbourn couldn't let d'Aubigny go.

"She was this queer woman who had sword fights, and she also fucked with gender. That wasn't the language at that time, but she was this openly queer human in a different and more oppressive time," they said. "As a transmasc, nonbinary lesbian who is also a fighter, d'Aub-

igny was too fascinating for me."

Milbourn is an actor. They are a playwright and a director. They are also a fight choreographer who has worked with swords for years, as well. It seemed destined for Milbourn to tell d'Aubigny's story.

The process started as something else entirely, but Prism's artistic director, Jeff Colangelo, had a bigger idea.

"I told Jeff I had started writing about

Milbourn added that because of d'Aubigny, they now feel fearless.

Enough so that not only did they write the show, they direct, sound designed and star in the show as the titular character.

The arc of the show encapsulates d'Aubigny's entire life up to her death in her late 30s. The story includes her love affairs — most prominently with Madame la Marquise. Of course, Milbourn had to include the famed sword fight d'Aubigny had against three men — and won.

But while writing, Milbourn could put themselves into the story as well. Outside of their research, there are no recorded conversations or quotes by d'Aubigny. This gave Milbourn a freedom in their writing.



this woman and had this idea of putting movement and choreography to these fights," they said. "I kept finding so many details about this openly queer human. I had to write about her. Jeff suggested writing a whole play."

This idea seemed to open a floodgate for Milbourn as they uncovered d'Aubigny's story.

"I feel so connected to her, and she's a bit of a mentor to me now. Writing this has helped me come more into my own unapologetic loudness as a queer person," they said. "All the dialogue was created, so I could put myself into this story. Her bravery was what I connected to and her need to be seen. I see that in myself. I've had to come out in so many different ways.

"I felt like she always needed to prove to be worthy to herself. I get that, but she also gave me courage and inspiration to be my authentic self."

The show runs July 11-13 at Hamon Hall (tickets at ATTPAC.org) and then July 25-Aug. 3 at the Latino Cultural Center (tickets at PrismMovementTheater.org).

# **Study:** HIV cases still rising in Latinx communities

Latino health advocates say there is a need for how we approach HIV care in Latinx communities

xperiencing unstable healthcare is not something new to West Dallas resident Javier Enriquez, especially when it comes to HIV care. The added obstacle of homophobia in his community and the fear and distrust of engaging with the system also create a harder road toward getting





tested for the virus, saying, "When I first got tested, I was 25."

Liv Mortel also experienced difficulty getting tested in the DFW suburb of Red Oak where they were raised. "[For Latine people], any sexual thing is very taboo. It's very hush-hush," Mortel stated. "I had to go outside of my community."

According to the CDC, the estimated number of HIV cases in the United States had a 12 percent decrease between the years 2018 and 2022. However, in 2022, HIV diagnoses increased by 17 percent amongst Hispanic/Latinos.

And in 2021, the Dallas County Health and Human Services reported a 30 percent increase in male cases and a 6.5 percent increase in female cases.

"What we are looking at is the intersection of many different issues happening at the same time," Daniel Castellanos, vice president of Research and Innovation at the Latino Commission on AIDS, said. "There are some areas, like in the South, and Texas in particular, where there are [multiple] factors happening."

The Southern and Western states account for 73.8 percent of the HIV cases among U.S. Hispanics in 2021, according

to the Latino Commission of AIDS at the Institute for Latino Health Equity.

"We underfund prevention in this country," Evelio Salinas Escamilla, a

senior research associate at the Latino Commission on AIDS, states. "Access to getting screened for these types of services is seldom, so you never get to really find out what you're experiencing or having symptoms for until it's a little too late."

According to a KFF analysis, only 3 percent of \$43 billion United States federal funding for HIV in 2022 went to prevention.

"What needs to happen is funding has to be flexible

enough that communities themselves can develop their own strategies and can make decisions about how to address their needs based on their demographics, based on the availability of services and the availability of providers," Castellano states. "Funding needs to be distributed in a way that takes into consideration the context."

Health advocates seek consistent and redistributed funding and accessibility for the diverse Latino communities for HIV care to be easily accessible.

In 2014, Prism Health North Texas developed and implemented Viviendo Valiente, a program based in Dallas that aimed to reduce HIV disparities in the Latino community, with a focus on those who were of Mexican descent. The program connected people to HIV and STI care, healthcare education and health literacy in individual, group or community-level interventions.

The program was supported by the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program, Special Projects of National Significance (SPNS) Culturally Appropriate Interventions of Outreach, Access, and Retention Among Latino/a Populations Initiative. The program provided \$1,489,500 to be awarded between the years 2013 through 2019 at 10 different



sites across the United States.

"Being able to provide that culturally and linguistically appropriate care and service is important," Fernie Sanchez, clinic case manager supervisor for Prism Health North Texas, said. "[The fact that] what works for one population may not work with another is something that we've really focused on here at Prism Health North Texas."

According to Target HIV, at the individual level, 74 percent of those who participated in the program were kept in HIV care within a year, and at the community level, HIV testing among Latinos increased from 444 clients in 2014 to 721 in 2017.

"We get funding to do a special project, and then the funding goes away, and the emphasis diminishes," Sanchez states. "Being consistent in our messaging and keeping it out there — we have to keep a presence and remind folks that HIV is still out there."

The program may have stopped operating after 2019, but Sanchez notes that what Prism Health North Texas has learned from Viviendo Valiente isn't gone.

Prism Health North Texas offers prevention services, like HIV/STI testing, Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis medication and free condoms at any of their four locations: Oaklawn Health Center at

2801 Lemmon Ave. #200; Oak Cliff Health Center at 219 Sunset Ave. #116-A; South Dallas Health Center at 4922 Spring Ave.; and Worth Street Health Center at 4004 Worth St. #200.

Outreach in Latino communities persists in other ways. Natalie Sanchez, director of UCLA Los Angeles Family AIDS Network, has set out to create multilanguage online outreach for Latino communities to interact with. Sanchez's most

well-known work is *Sin Vergünza*, a telenovela web series that addresses HIV in Latino families, which reflects the stories of patients she has worked with in clinics. She wrote, created, and is the executive producer of the series.

"We developed the series with the intent of making it entertaining, making it relatable, and ... communicating what we see in clinics to those who are watching the series," Natalie Sanchez said. "Because of my recent work in working with women in HIV, I have a team, and we have a podcast called *Confessions*, *HIV-positive Women* — some are done in English, and some are done in Spanish, [and] our third season will be an all Spanish-[speaking] season."

Through the years, the Latino community continuously responds to programs and outreach that are culturally compelling, readily available and easily accessible to them. "Being able to make inroads of genuine trust with marginalized communities takes a lot of investment and consistency," Enriquez said.












# The **battle** to protect IVF

The vast majority of Americans support IVF, abortion access, but Republicans keep blocking both

started my family more than two decades ago via in vitro fertilization, or IVF, and I've watched with growing alarm as the U.S. Supreme Court's Dobbs decision, which overturned federal abortion rights two years ago, has also endangered access to this common fertility technique. Jennifer Klein, director of

the White House Gender Policy Council, spoke with me recently about the threat and the Biden administration's response.

The risk to IVF became clear this year when the Alabama Supreme Court

ruled on Feb. 16 that frozen embryos should be considered "children." Almost all IVF providers in the state immediately halted services, fearful of liability.

State legislation was quickly passed to provide legal immunity to IVF providers and patients, but some lawmakers and advocates remain concerned that it still does not sufficiently address the state's constitutional definition of embryonic personhood, as CNN reported on March 7.

The question of embryos also played into the June 12 vote by the Southern Baptist Convention, representing the country's largest Protestant denomination, to condemn the current practice of IVF because it may create excess embryos that are frozen or destroyed.

A whopping 86 percent of Americans believe that IVF should be legal, according to a CBS News/YouGov poll in early March.

Klein said, "These attacks on IVF are a direct result of Republican elected officials advancing a really extreme agenda, which is out of step with the vast majority of Americans. This is not

a controversial issue, although it seems to have become one."

On Feb. 29, Sen. Tammy Duckworth, a Democrat from Illinois and an Iraq War veteran who used IVF to have her two daughters, sought Senate approval for a bill she had introduced with Sen. Patty Murray, a Washington Democrat, to establish a federal statutory right to IVF and — critically — to an individual's use or disposition of their gametes and embryos.

Duckworth attempted to move the bill forward via unanimous consent, but Republican Sen. Cindy Hyde-Smith from Mississippi blocked it, asserting in a statement her "strong support of IVF," but expressing concern that the bill ran counter to "our goal to protect life and religious freedoms."

Republican Sens. Ted Cruz of Texas and Katie Britt of Alabama then, on June 12, attempted a unanimous consent vote on their own IVF Protection Act, which would have withheld Medicaid funds from states that prohibit IVF, but said nothing about the disposition of gametes/embryos. Klein explained that

the bill "allowed restrictions on embryo storage, implantation and disposal, so it wouldn't actually provide meaningful access to fertility services."

Murray therefore blocked it.

Democrats countered with the Right to IVF Act, introduced in early June by Democratic Sens. Duckworth, Murray, Cory Booker of New Jersey, Mark R. Warner of Virginia and Tim Kaine of Virginia. This incorporated Duckworth and Murray's earlier IVF bill along with three other bills, which as a whole would create a federal right to IVF access and gamete/embryo disposition, lower costs by requiring insurers to cover IVF, and further expand IVF coverage options and access for veterans, service members, and federal employees.

Senate Republicans, however, blocked that bill on June 13.

Klein observed that Republicans had also blocked a bill on June 5 that would have guaranteed a federal right to access contraception. She is adamant that "These attacks on reproductive free-

dom are a direct result of the overturning of *Roe v. Wade* and leaving matters of reproductive health to the states.

Such attacks "stand in stark contrast with this administration," she said, noting that on the day of the *Dobbs* decision, President Biden committed to signing federal legislation to restore the protections of *Roe v. Wade* as soon as a bill reaches him.

"In the meantime," Klein said, "we're doing everything we can to protect access to reproductive healthcare." This includes three executive orders and a presidential memorandum "to protect access and expand access to affordable, high-quality contraception, including over-the-counter birth control; strengthening privacy protections for patients and doctors; supporting and expanding access to medication abortion; supporting access to reproductive healthcare for service members and veterans; and supporting the ability to travel for reproductive healthcare."

The administration has also taken two actions specifically to protect IVF,

she said. First, it "expanded eligibility for IVF services for certain service members and veterans," although the cause of infertility must still be a service-related health condition. Statutory restrictions mean that further expansion must be through legislation, one of the things the Right to IVF Act would have provided.


Second, the administration "expanded access to IVF benefits and coverage for federal workers," something she hopes can also serve as "a model for other large employers across the country, because one of the major issues with IVF is affordability and insurance coverage." She noted that a majority of states — 29 — don't require private insurance to cover any fertility services.

While any administration is limited in what it can do in the absence of congressional legislation, Klein said that "We are working really closely with Democrats on the Hill to support their efforts."

"I remain optimistic that [IVF] is a bipartisan issue," she asserted. Citing a March 2024 Navigator Research study, she explained, "Four in five Americans say IVF should be legal, the vast majority of Americans believe that *Roe v. Wade* should not have been overturned and support reproductive freedom, and we've seen that in ballot initiatives across the country in a very diverse set of states," including Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, California, and New York. "When people have the opportunity to make their voices heard directly, they are quite clear that they want the ability to protect access to reproductive healthcare."

She urged people to continue sharing their views, adding, "As we've seen from unlikely people in unlikely states, people are speaking out to make it clear that they want the right to make decisions about their own body free from politicians. There are many more opportunities to do that."

Kristen Stewart to star in Sally Ride biopic

Kristen Stewart is the kind of movie star who can turn chameleon character actor anytime she chooses. She's played real-life people as unalike as Princess Diana, Jean Seberg and Joan Jett, and next she'll take on the role of pioneering astronaut Sally Ride in *The Challenger* for her first TV series starring role.

### Kate Winslet reteams with Todd Haynes for Trust

The last time Kate Winslet and acclaimed *May December* filmmaker Todd Haynes worked together, they brought 2011's expansive, stunning, longform *Mildred Pierce* to HBO. Now they'll collaborate again on *Trust*, a limited series based on the Pulitzer Prize-winning 2023 novel from Hernan Diaz.




